(1) Frederick Hollingsworth of Carleton Place lost his life in a fire on the train. The train had caught fire on the inside, and when the trainmen saw smoke issuing from the car, they stopped the train immediately, and opened the door, to be met by smoke and flames. Mr. Hollingsworth's body was later recovered. It is believed he was suffocated. He was born in Wexford, Ireland Dec. 3, 1846 (NOTE: For correction of this date see page 117) and came to Canada with his parents when an infant. They settled near Athens, where two brothers still reside. The deceased had lived at Carleton Place since 1872. He was a Forester, and members of that lodge conducted the funeral with Rev. Canon Elliott preaching. (From The Athens Reporter, April 29, 1910, reprinted in a recent column in the same paper, "80 years ago," Apr. 29, 1970. Thanks to Marion Smith, Petawawa, Chterio, Canada.
