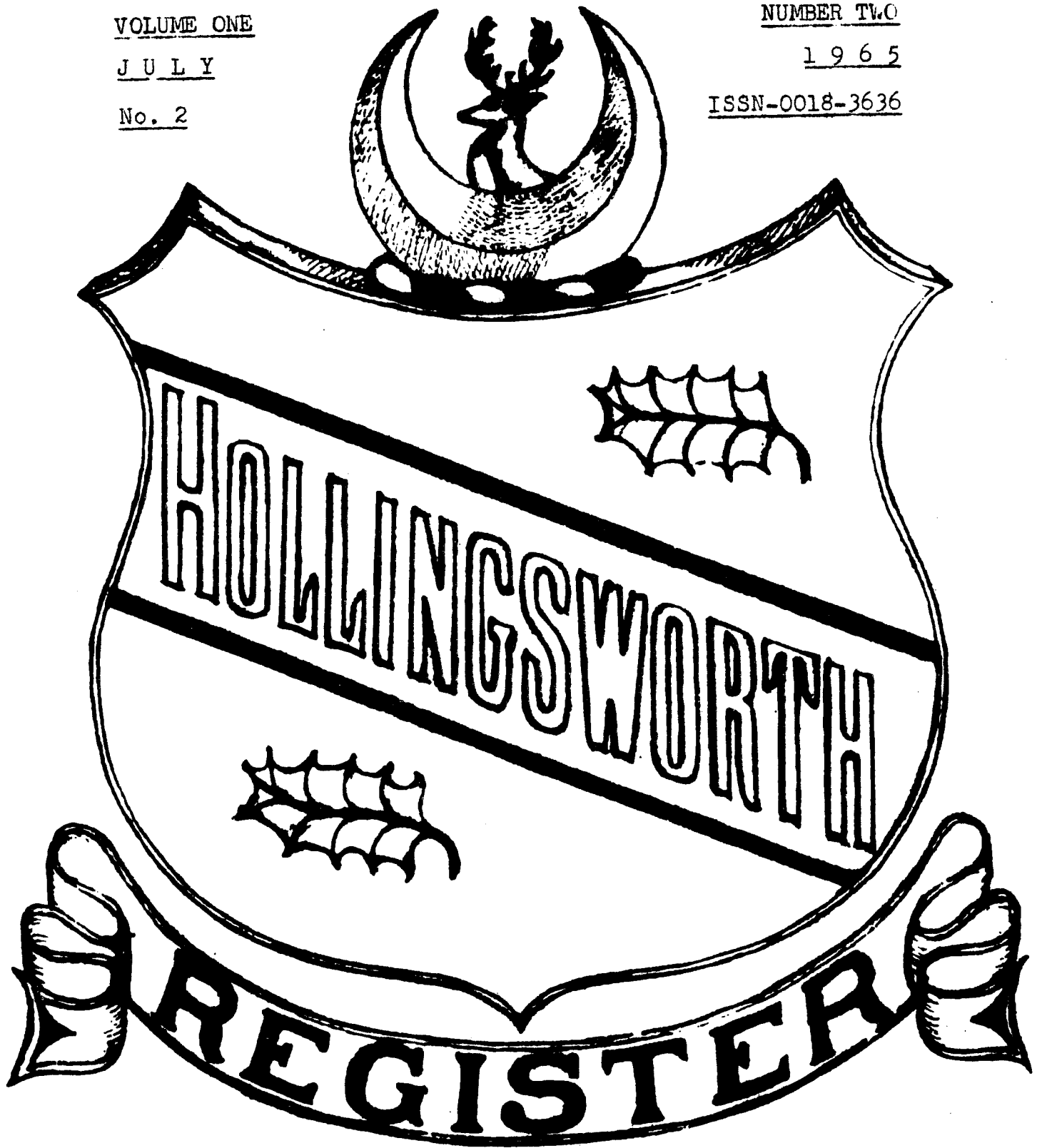

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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingsworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. (It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was a barren wasteland at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family surname. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Hologn (or Holyn), 'a holly bush,' and Worp (or Worde), meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the placename Hollingsworth in Cheshire. More loosely, it signifies "A farm enclosed by holly bushes," or "Holly Farm." The earliest form of the surname was Hollingworth, in the old orthography, Hollyngworthe, but in later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, not much earlier than the early 1600s. Five generally used forms, Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth, are found in the indexes to births, marriages and deaths for England beginning in 1837, and in most of the telephone or city directories of the large cities in England and the United States of America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present. Hollingsworth Register is now in its Thirteenth Year. Nearly every instance of the surname in the U.S. Census schedules, 1790-1870 has been published in this quarterly. About two million pages were searched to produce that result, not to mention searching all kinds of other records. We know of no other family magazine which has even attempted to do this.

FREDERICK HOLLINGSWORTH FAMILY - CONTINUED

In the last issue we presented the first installment dealing with personal information about Frederick Hollingsworth. We continue with a documented summary, and begin a biographical record of the second generation and a series of articles will follow.

GENERATION ONE FREDERICK¹ HOLLINGSWORTH, (probably son of Samuel & Anne (Earl) Hollingsworth, Ballinakill), the immigrant, born 1802/3, Ballinakill, Parish of Ballycanew, Co. Wexford, Ireland; died Feb. 2, 1869, Independence township, Jasper Co., Iowa, U.S.A., aged about 66 years; supposed buried in "Our Silent City," Kellogg, Jasper Co. Iowa, without a marker. Farmer, Miller, (Soldier?)

MARRIED, Apr. 17, 1836, near Door Village, LaPorte Co., Indiana, ELIZABETH BROWN, eldest child of Jacob & _____ Brown, natives of New Jersey. She was born June 20, 1820, "New Lisbon", Pennsylvania; died Oct. 15, 1892, Kellogg, Iowa, aged 72; buried, with a marker, in Our Silent City.

Emigrated from Ireland between June 4, 1823 - Feb. 8, 1835, (perhaps via Canada across the Great Lakes into Indiana.) Entered tract of 160 acres, "the S.E. Quarter, Section 10, Township 43 North; Range 2 East of the 3rd Principal Meridian," now called Cherry Valley township, but then called Butler Precinct, Winnebago Co., Illinois, Oct. 11, 1839, patented to him Nov. 10, 1841 (Dixon Land Dist. Tract Book 3, p. 49), at \$1.25 per acre (Total cost \$200.00) under the Pre-emption act of 1838. In his application, supported by his father-in-law, Jacob Brown Sr., and Joseph P. Griggs, founder and first settler of Cherry Valley, Ills., he stated that he had actually settled on said tract as of May 28, 1837. He sold this tract along with 40 acres he had acquired later, for the sum of Four Thousand dollars, (Book 38 of Deeds, page 2, Recorder, Rockford) Apr. 8, 1856, to David S. Penfield, Esq. On June 2, 1856, he purchased 192.51 acres in Section 28, Township 43 North; Range 1 East of the 3rd Principal Meridian, on the banks of the Kishwaukee river, in New Milford township, (now Rockford City) Winnebago Co., Ills. from James & Sylvia Works, for the sum of Four Thousand, Three Hundred dollars. (Book 38, ibid, page 85.) This was sold to John Edwards on Feb. 16, 1861, and for the price of \$3,465.00. Elizabeth Hollingsworth purchased from the same John H. Edwards, and Maria, his wife, of Winnebago Co., Ills., the S.W. Quarter of Section 1, Township 81 North, Range 20 West of the 5th Principal Meridian, (Independence Twp., Jasper Co., Iowa), 160 acres, for the sum of \$800.00 on January 24, 1861. (Recorded on Mar. 23, 1861, Book 16, page 425, Deeds, Newton, Iowa, Court House.) This she sold after Frederick's death, to sons Samuel & Edward Hollingsworth, & C. B. Mendenhall, & Levina W. Bond, for a sum of over \$1500.00, in 1869. (Books 54, pp. 197, 269, 270, 512, & 60, page 462, ibid.) The family moved to Iowa on Nov. 3, 1864.

GENERATION TWO

EDWARD EARL² HOLLINGSWORTH, eldest child of Frederick¹ & Elizabeth (Brown) Hollingsworth, was born June 26, 1838, Butler Precinct, now Cherry Valley township, Winnebago Co., Illinois; died April 6, 1902, 4 p.m. at Los Angeles, California, aged 63 years; buried without a marker in Rosedale Cemetery, Washington Blvd., Los Angeles. (Death certificate filed by year.)

MARRIED, Jan. 5, 1860, Kalmer Township, (near Byron), Olsted Co., Minnesota, Herman Haight, J.P., RACHEL McFADDEN, daughter and third child of William & Ann (Peterson) McFadden, natives of Crawford Co., Pennsylvania. Rachel was born July 29, 1841, Greenwood township, Crawford County, Pennsylvania; died July 27, 1924, at Los Angeles, California; buried on her 83rd birthday anniversary in Rosedale Cemetery, with a marble marker. Divorced Nov. 12, 1880, Waseca, Minn. (B-32)

Edward² Hollingsworth was raised on his parents' farm about 5 miles south east of Rockford, Illinois, which was then a small village with a few log cabins and shanties, surrounded by dense forest. His family were the only Hollingsworths in all of northern Illinois in that day. He was among the very first white children born in the county, which was settled about 1835, the first settler at Cherry Valley being the aforementioned Joseph P. Griggs of Ohio. (Regardless of this factor, the family name has not been located in any of the half-dozen histories of the county, written 40 years later!) Edward's school was a cabin built of logs cut from a virgin forest. He was the eldest grandchild of Jacob Brown, in a total number of 93!

He learned the carpenter's trade probably from his own father, but may have been apprenticed to another local resident. He followed farming concurrent with his woodworking trade, and remained near Rockford, after his father's family had moved to Iowa. He joined them there in 1866. It appears that he worked for a time as brakeman on a railroad which took him to Dodge Co., Minnesota, in 1859, where he met his future wife, Miss McFadden. After the marriage they returned to New Milford, Illinois. Upon arrival in Jasper Co., Iowa, in 1866, they farmed as tenants in Rock Creek, a township east of Kellogg on the railroad line to Grinnell, Iowa. Here, two of their nine children were born. After his father's death, he moved into Kellogg, Iowa. Marital discontent ensued, and the child called Belle, (Idabelle) was born at the home of her maternal grandparents, then living at Waseca, Minnesota. This was patched up, and the couple owned and managed a grocery store with saloon in Kellogg, during the years 1874-1876. (Andrews' Atlas of the State of Iowa, (1875) Patron's Directory, Kellogg, page 503.)

In 1877 the family moved over to Waseca, Minnesota. Edward opened up a carpenter's shop near the railroad. He was also a contractor and builder. (The editor owns one of his tools, a carpenter's "square," with his initials, "E.E.H." carved in it.) Again marital bliss was shattered, and this time for ever. Edward was the plaintiff, and Rachel did not appear to contest. Of the children, Annie was given for adoption to Sarah (Figley) Hoover of Mansfield, Ohio, who had lived near Grinnell, Iowa, with her husband, Samuel, until his death. Lucy (Lucinda) was sent to be raised by her grandmother Elizabeth in Kellogg, Iowa. Most of the others were in their teen age, but Charles was taken by Rachel, and Belle likewise. Thus, after twenty years of marriage and the birth of nine children the family was broken up. Jack Hollingsworth (John Benjamin³ the editor's grandfather) went to Los Angeles, California, in 1886, and liked it so much he sent for his wife and children. Not long after, Edward and his sons Levi and Fred made the same move. Nettie Hoy, another daughter, now Mrs. Richard Gibbons, arrived in Los Angeles in 1887 and it was probably upon her urging that her mother, Rachel, came out with Charles and Belle. Annie, then Mrs. Frank Hoover, returned to her parents in California in 1895. So all but two of the nine children eventually died and were buried there. (Later issues of the Register will tell the story.)

"E.E. Hollingsworth," as he liked to sign his name and be known, was a man of medium height, 5 feet, 9 inches, of slender build, with "piercing blue eyes" and dark hair, according to the Voter Registration Great Registers, 1888-1900, Los Angeles, and his daughter, Ann Belden. His pictures, of which the editor has seen only three, show him in each case hiding behind a very long, wirey beard! He looked not un-like President Rutherford B. Hayes, of the United States, with whom Edward was a contemporary in the style of beard and dress. (His brothers, Jacob & Samuel also hid their faces behind similar ambushes.) Their father, Frederick¹, showed the good sense to wear a "Lincoln" beard, which wrapped 'round under his chin and throat, but didn't cover his features. Edward played his violin (given to him by his father, who gave one each to the four sons), which was made in 1765 in Italy, (still owned by the family), like a fiddle for special occasions. He also owned & played the Albert clarinet, which he is shown holding in a tintype taken in 1880. The editor has this, in much poorer condition today, to be sure!

The series may also be rented from the central or branch libraries of the Genealogical Association, Salt Lake City, U.S.A., to be viewed on their premises.) This series is indexed only to 1846.

"COPS AND ROBBERS!""CATCHES MAN FIRST NIGHT ON FORCE..."

"On his first night on the police force last night, (Nov. 12, 1923), Probationary Patrolman Edward J. THE QUAKER HOLLINGSWORTHS

(PART TWO)

You should know about Quaker church organization. Early Friends Meetings were conducted without a paid pastor (some still are). They were un-programmed. The congregation met in silence. Any one could be moved to briefly address the meeting. The topic was usually of a religious nature, although not necessarily so. This is the simple meeting for worship. Several of these meetings could be a part of a larger meeting that met monthly. The Friends call these meetings the Monthly Meeting. This latter meeting is the parent body and looks after the spiritual and financial needs of the subordinate meetings. The Monthly Meeting is presided over by a leader that they call "Clerk." There is also an assistant Clerk whose principal function is to record the decisions of the Monthly Meeting. These recordings are our famous "Minutes."

The Quakers begin the Monthly Meeting by presenting a question. They call this their queries. There are usually twelve, one for each month in the year. A typical query could be ...

"Are love and unity maintained among you?"

"Do you manifest a forgiving spirit and a care for the reputation of others?"

"When differences arise, are endeavors made to settle them speedily and in a spirit of meekness and love?"

After the query of the day is answered, committees are heard from. The committee represents the functioning body. There is a committee on religious life. A committee that keeps in contact with the members. Other committees look into different concerns of the meeting.

Although Friends are democratic in their activities, they must live up to a set of rules that they call their Discipline. Other than that, the members may have extreme views. You might think this liberal approach would lead to disunity, but such is not the case. The self-criticism in the queries acts as a governor.

Several Monthly Meetings in an area join together and meet four times a year, to discuss and act on matters that concern their area. This is a Quarterly Meeting. And annually, all meetings in a larger area meet together in a "Yearly Meeting."

All the meetings (except the meeting for worship) keep records of their proceedings. These are our precious Quaker records.

It was to this group that Valentine Hollingsworth and his family identified themselves.

Quaker marriage ceremonies are unique. When the couple decides to marry, they present a request to their Monthly Meeting. A committee is appointed to look into the request and see that there have been no previous engagements or anything that would prevent the marriage. At the next succeeding Monthly Meeting, the couple make a second request. The committee is heard from and if the committee reports favorable, they are "passed," that is, they are permitted to marry. The time is left up to the couple, when they shall appear at a public meeting, usually called for the purpose, and each will make a public declaration, after which the certificate of marriage is signed by all who witness the ceremony. The signed certificate is not immediately given to the couple, but is handed to the "Recorder," who will copy it in the marriage book.

Over the years, certificates of marriage have taken on a slightly different wording. There is no marriage certificate recorded for Valentine Hollingsworth's marriage to Ann Ree. Lurgan, Ireland, Monthly Meeting, Births and Deaths, says that he married Ann Ree on the "seventh day of the fowerth month, Anno Domini, 1655." Ann Ree died on the "first day of the second month, Anno Domini, 1671," according to the same records. Valentine's second marriage, to Ann Calvert, is recorded in the Lurgan (Co. Armagh), Ireland, Marriage Book, and is as follows,

"This is to certify the truth to all people that Valentine Hollingsworth in y^e psh of Sego in y^e county of Armagh, and Anne Calvert of the same psh having intentions of marriage according to the ordinances of God, and Gods joining, Did lay it before mens meeting before whom their marriage being propounded, then y^e meeting desired them to wait some time, wch they did, so the meeting makeing inquiry between the times whether y^e man be free from all other woman, and the woman free from all other men, and so the second time they coming before the mens meeting, all things being clear, so they being left to their freedom. A meeting of the people of god being appointed and assembled together at the house of Murke Wright, in the psh of Shankoll the twelfth day of the fourth month in y^e yeare 1672 where they tooke one another in marriage in the presence of god and of his people according to y^e law of god, & we are witnesses of the same whose names are hereunto subscribed y^e day and yeare aforesaid

No Hollingsworths signed the certificate as witnesses, which leads me to believe that there were no other Quaker Hollingsworths in the area. Although non-Quakers could have been present and witnessed the ceremony, it is unlikely, at that early date, to have had non-Quakers in attendance. The Friends were a persecuted group, and to associate with them would probably have caused them to be suspect. Ann's father, Thomas, and her brother, John, were there and signed the certificate as witnesses.

The April issue of the "Register" spoke briefly of Thomas Calvert and Jane Glasford, and Ann, the second wife of Valentine Hollingsworth. More should be told of the Calvert family, as brother John came to Pennsylvania, if not with Valentine, very soon afterward. The Valentine Hollingsworth and the John Calvert families, in America, were close. John was an older brother to Ann; he was born 8 mo., 6th 1648, near Belfast, Ireland. The Lurgan records say he married, 3 mo., 29th, 1673, at the house of Roger Webb, Judith Stamper, daughter of Hugh Stamper and Bridget, his wife, of Lurgan. Judith Stamper was born 3 mo., 12th, 1652, at "bowlton wood," county Cumberland, England. (NOTE: "Bolton-Wood" is a place in the Parish of Wigton, 2½ miles from the town of Wigton, Cumberlandshire, England, which has (Episcopal) Parish Registers beginning in the year 1613. Ed.)

John Calvert (Ann's brother) removed with his family, late in 1682, to Pennsylvania (it is probable that he came with Valentine and his family), and settled in Upper Providence township, Chester county (now Delaware county), where he

owned 300 acres of land granted to him by William Penn, 1st month, 13, 1683. An adjoining tract of 300 acres was also granted, at the same time, for Thomas Calvert, the father, who probably did not come to this country. Still another tract of 100 acres, contiguous to the above, was granted on the same date to Margaret Calvert, probably the daughter of Thomas, and a sister to John and Ann.

It is probable that neither Thomas nor Margaret came to Pennsylvania, for, on 2 mo. 11, 1691, "it was ordered that a patent for the whole tract should be made to John Calvert, to whom it was made appear to belong." (Pennsylvania Archives, 2nd. Series, Volume XLX., page 66.)

A difference arose between John Calvert and Thomas Hollingsworth - a step nephew - over the division of their lands in Upper Providence township. Chester Monthly Meeting, of which John Calvert was then a member, mentions this difference in their minutes of 4.6.1687. But let the minutes tell the story: "There being a difference between Thomas Hollingsworth & John Calvert about y^e deviding their lands in y^e township of Upper Providence. This meeting now ordereth Bartholomon Coppock y^e younger, John Cashing, James Ginerly and Caleb Pusey to inspect and to hear y^e testimony in y^e said dispute and to give an account thereof to y^e next meeting."

And at the next meeting held at Walter Faucett's on y^e fourth day of y^e fifth month, 1687. "The difference opening between Thomas Hollingsworth & John Calvert was reported to y^e next quarterly meeting & that y^e said Thomas Hollingsworth & John Calvert be desired by this meeting to come at y^e next quarterly meeting as also John Cashing, Bartholomon Coppock, James Ginerly & Caleb Pusey."

It appears that John Calvert did not accept the committee's recommendation, as the Quarterly Meeting held at Walter Faucet's of Ridley, the first day of the sixth month, 1687, says, "Agreed that a paper of testimony against John Calvert be given forth to public view if after he had heard it read to him he gives not cause to the contrary," and it is further "Agreed that Caleb Pusey and Walter Faucet read the paper to John Calvert that is given forth against him and give account to the next meeting thereof..." This meant disownment. However, nothing further is said of the matter, and it was probably dropped, as there are later references to John Calvert in the minutes.

John Calvert and Judith (Stamper) Calvert had seven children: Ruth, Isaac, Thomas and Joshua, born in Ireland; Daniel, Mary and Judith born in Pennsylvania. The fourth child and second son, Joshua, born 8.18.1680 at Lurgan. At a Chester County Court held 6.25.1702, the sheriff made a return of an execution on the estate of John Calvert which was sold to Thomas, Joshua and Thomas Calvert for £243. In 1724, Joshua had 370 acres of the Calvert land in Upper Providence. He married, in 1709, Deborah, daughter of George and Elizabeth (Duck) Harland. Hannah Harland, an older sister of Deborah, married Samuel Hollingsworth, the oldest son of Valentine and Ann (Calvert) Hollingsworth. So you see that Ann's nephew, Joshua Calvert, married a sister to the wife of Samuel Hollingsworth. You will note that on page 6 of the April "Register", George Harland married Elizabeth Duck on 9.17.1678, and that Henry Hollingsworth had witnessed the ceremony.

Now let us return to Ireland, and witness the marriage of Valentine and Ann (Ree) Hollingsworth's first born and oldest daughter, Mary. The marriage took place one month, 4.28.1682, before the father, Valentine, requested the Monthly Meeting to give him a certificate of removal, for himself and family, to Pennsylvania, and it is probable, about two months before they sailed for America. A copy of that marriage certificate reads,

"Thomas Conway in the parish of Lisbourne and County of Antrim and Mary Hollingsworth in y^e parish of Sego and County of Armagh having intentions of Marriage (according to gods ordinance) did lay it before ye man and womens meetings who taking their said intentions into consideration, Desired them to wait a time, several friends

HOLLINGSWORTHS IN SCOTLAND?

Although very meagre at this time, we may confidently announce that our surname was and still is, represented in Scotland! In the 1850 U.S. Census of New Jersey, there appears a Joseph Hollingsworth, with wife Elizabeth, born in the land of the kilt. (More of him at another time.) Also there was the birth, Aug. 23, 1857, at 4 p.m., of Alice, daughter of John & Anabella (Caughie) Hollinsworth of Wardrop St., Beith, Ayrshire; the father an Ironstone miner. (Beith Dist. 581, p. 54 No. 160)

THE DEEDS OF IRELAND

Since 1962, the editor has been in the process of obtaining every deed on file in the Registry of Deeds, Henriette St., Dublin, Ireland, wherein our surname appears. Due to the difficulty of hiring private searchers who can get the work done in a minimum of time, and the fees for their services, this has been a very slow and discouraging process. In fact, not until early in 1965 was the process speeded up. This came about when the entire Index, 1708-1904, to the Lands and Names, was made available here in Los Angeles, California. The Genealogical Association, Salt Lake City, Utah, opened a branch library here in Westwood, and this series of Deeds indexes may now be loaned at 50¢ (3s 6d) each roll. Of course, there are hundreds of rolls, and the process is still slow. After the names and lands are searched, it is then necessary to send to Ireland and have the deeds searched! This is because the Irish government would not consent to have the original deeds filmed! But it must be said that, even with this difficulty, more deeds have come into the editor's possession in the past four months, than in all of the other years in which he has been working to get them! Any of our readers may buy their own copy or copies of any of the Deed Memorials below summarized, directly from the Registry in photostatic reproduction. Each page costs about 80¢, but we warn you that it is accompanied by an enormous fee of nearly Eight Dollars (52 shillings and six pence to be exact) for "travelling!" This is because, in Ireland, only one photo-machine is used between the Four Courts and the Registry. It is designated to be used by both facilities for copying. This is wonderful, until you realize that the two buildings are a mile apart! The machine is in the Four Courts, and the fee pays the expenses of the agent or deputy who carries the precious old documents from the Registry to the Four Courts. Although Ireland claims to be "free" from British rule, she still hangs on to this decidedly ancient Victorian law, which was enacted in about 1844! So, save your money, and if you want photostats, wait until you can afford to buy about twenty at one time, the expense fee being the same, no matter how many are ordered, I suppose.

The Registrations are cited by Book or Volume number; page number, and the longer series of figures represent the actual registration numbers.

Mr. Richard J. Hayes, Director of the National Library of Ireland, Kildare Street, Dublin, has sent a photostat of a page from the 1631 Muster Roll for Onealland Barony, Co. Ardmagh, Ireland, wherein the name of "HENRY HOLLINGSWORTH" with "sword & callener," is listed with 23 others. (See the accompanying illustration of the whole page.) This vindicates the Quaker Records, which state Valentine Hollingsworth was born in Seagoe Parish, (Barony of Onealland) in 1632, "son of Henry."

The above is an interpretation of the old document which is given overleaf in facsimile. A pike was a spear. A snaphance was a "flintlock" firearm, or more correctly, the ancestor of the flintlock. We have not been able to find out what a "callener" or "collewer" was. You will note that Henry Hollinwort was able to use both a sword and a callener! Is it possible he was killed in the Rebellion which took place at Lurgan in 1641? Perhaps this led his young son Vallentine Hollingsworth into the frame of mind which caused him to accept the preaching of George Fox and his immediate followers! Note also that there appears to be no person of Irish lineage in the above list. All are English, apparently.

HOLLINGSWORTH HEADS OF FAMILIES IN 1800, ACCORDING TO THE SECOND U. S. CENSUS

The information & statistics below represent the work of ten hours reading micro-films of the entire extant U.S. Second Census, A.D. 1800. A complete copy of this census is on file for public examination at the Genealogical Library, Westwood, California. The census of 1800 is contained on fifty (50) rolls of film. Only the state of Vermont schedules have been copied, printed, indexed and bound. This left it to the editor to sit and go over about 20,000 pages of manuscript on micro-film to glean the names of every Hollingsworth and Hollingworth head of a family then within the borders of the United States. Due to difficulties in this type of research, we can't "guarantee" that entries were not missed, even though the search was a careful one. Some of the material had already deteriorated before it was ever filmed.

The schedules for Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, New Jersey, Tennessee & Virginia are missing for 1800. It is known, from other sources, that there were people of our surname in most of these states. We are able to supplement the loss of the census here in only the case of Kentucky. It would be extremely expensive and time-consuming to try and gather together tax lists to fill the gaps for other states.

After the names of Heads of Families there appear the statistics relating to the number and age of persons in the household. Here is an explanation. This is also identical for the Census of 1810.

Example: "VINSON HOLLANDSWORTH - ^(M) 12101 - ^(F) 21001 - 00"

There are twelve columns of statistics. The males ("M") appear in five columns; the females ("F") in identical five; and columns numbered "6" & "7" pertain to others. Col. 1 represents "Free white males under 10 years;" 2: "Free white males of 10 and under 16;" 3: The same, "16-26 yrs;" 4: "26-45;" and 5: "of 45 and up." Nos. 3-5 include heads of families. The female column is identical. Column 6 represents "All other free persons, except Indians, not taxed." Column 7 is for the number of slaves. In the event these columns are blank, we substitute a "zero" for clarity. Vinson Hollandsworth had 1 male under 10; 2 males 10-16; 1 male 16-26 and 1 male over 45; 2 females under 10; 1 10-16; 1 45 and up; no others and no slaves, in his household in 1800. Vinson, the head of family, is probably the "male over 45 years," which calculates to us that he was born before the year 1765.

HOLLINGSWORTH RECORDS IN COUNTY WEXFORD, IRELAND 1762 - 1965



This is a tremendous collection! We are proud to own it and to be able to present it in this publication. It is the result of over five years work by many people in the Republic of Ireland, mostly, and of your editor, whose sweat and blood is mixed in it. We are presenting all of the collection, births, deaths, marriages, baptisms & burials, from the earliest to the most recent. Mr. Basil O'Connell, who worked unstintingly in the Genealogical Office, Dublin Castle, for a number of years after his retirement from government work, advised that this collection be published as quickly as possible. There are nearly three hundred separate records! But this is not a complete collection by any means. At least, we hope not! For there are many gaps; such as many children born to couples for whom no marriage record has yet been discovered. The licence-bonds indexes cover only marriages for which a Prerogative or Diocesan licence was issued, not covering those which were simply celebrated after the posting of "Banns." These records would appear only in the Parish register of the church where the ceremony was performed.

In this array of records, (which, by the way, pertain almost exclusively to the old Saxon Hollingsworths of the clan from which springs your editor's line, as well as the Brockville, Ontario, Canada, family, and the "Scotch Plains," (New Jersey) family,) there are several types, each of which should be explained before we pres-

ent them. We will qualify our collection by referring to alphabetical listings.

(A) Marriage Licences, Diocese of Dublin. Index printed in Appendices to 26th & 30th Reports of the Deputy Keeper of the Public Records in Ireland, names of "Hallenmorth," "Hollandsworth," "Hollingsworth," "Hollinsworth," on pp. 423-425, 26th, and Addenda of same; and pp. 491, 509, 30th. The licences themselves all perished in the 1922 fire. This index is virtually all that remains, but is very useful. Only the year of the licence is given. Diocese of Dublin extends south through County Wicklow and takes in part of Co. Wexford, including the Parishes of Inch & Kilgorman. (See page 13.) In Public Records Office, Four Courts, Dub.

(B) Ferns Diocese Marriage Licences. An index was compiled by Henry C. Stanley-Torney, F.R.S.A.I., for the Journal of the County Kildare Archaeological Society, in whose columns it appears. The original Ferns Marriage Licences likewise perished in 1922. Ferns Diocese covers that remainder of Co. Wexford not covered by Dublin Diocese. In P.R.O., Dublin, & National Library of Ireland, Dublin.

(C) Index to Marriage Licence Grant Books, Diocese of Dublin, 1672-1741. Again, the Civil War fire has taken care of the original books and bundles, leaving us the index. Only one marriage, as below, on page 215 of the index, is listed. PRO.

(D) Publications of the Dublin Parish Register Society. Volumes 1-12 present old Dublin Church (Protestant Episcopal) records, baptisms, marriages & burials. These supply a few records not found elsewhere. In most large libraries.

(E) Marriage Licence Bonds Index, Dioceses of Ossory, Ferns & Leighlin, 1691-1845. Pages 649-651 list the variant spellings of our surname. The original bonds are in ashes! But this index is almost as valuable. Ossory & Leighlin Dioceses cover parts of Counties Kildare and Wicklow. In P.R.O. Dublin.

(F) Old Parish Registers, Church of Ireland (Protestant) in County Wexford. The records are listed chronologically by dates of events. The records consist of baptisms, marriages & burials. The churches listed are: Ballycanew, Church of St. Mogue, adjoining the old graveyard. We quote the Hollingsworth memorial stones in this yard to supplement the gaps in the registers. Ardamine, Donnaghmore & Killena (We quote by name of Ardamine only, as these parishes are united) at Killena S.E. of Ballycanew. Killmichaelogue, Christ Church, Gorey is the structure, NE of Ballycanew. Ferns, S.W. of Ballycanew, Cathedral Church of St. Eden, the seat of the Dean of Ferns. Toome, (alias Camolin) N.E. of Ferns. Kilnashue, alias Hollyfort, one of largest parishes in North Co. Wexford, registers at Christ Church, Gorey. Kiltennel, registers at Ardamine. Wesleyan Methodist Church, Gorey. The earliest of these registers, (Toome) begin in 1770. The 1st test, W. M. E. Gorey, about 1830. Ballycanew registers are reported to begin in 1733, but we have not seen any evidence of this.

(G) Protestant Marriages, Act of 1844; 1845-1965. Filed at Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford, and in Office of Registrar-General, Custom House, Dublin. Film copies U.S.A.

(H) Catholic Marriages, 1864-1964. Filed at Wexford County Council, Wexford, and at Custom House, Dublin. Film copies in United States of America.

(I) Births & Deaths, Ireland, Act 1863. 1864-1965. Wexford Council and Custom H. Do.

Putting the above series together chronologically makes a grand tapestry of about 200 years. We are indebted to the following persons for the collection: (In order of receipt.) Rev. Sidney R. W. Madden, Ardamine; Rev. W. B. Furlong, Ballycanew; Very Rev. T. H. C. McFall, Dean of Ferns, (by Mr. John C. Warren, Camolin), Rev. W. H. Parker, Christ Church, Gorey; The Incumbent of Wesley Methodist Church, ibid, Margaret C. Griffith, Deputy Keeper, PRO, Dublin; Mr. R. J. Hayes, Director, National Library, Dublin; The Registrars of Custom House, Dublin; County Council, Wexford, and Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford; Mr. Robert Hollingsworth, Dublin, Miss Jane Hollingsworth, professional genealogist, Salt Lake City, Utah, U.S.A., & Mr. Anthony Hollingsworth, Meteorological Station, Rosslare Harbour, Co. Wexford, Ireland. A lesson learned by the above citations is that Irish records are scattered all over that green isle! Never give up the hunt! Only this curious fact prevented a very great catastrophe should they all have been deposited in Four Courts PRO, in the fateful spring of 1922 when the bomb went off in the great records room!

BURIAL STONES IN OLD BALLYCANEW PROTESTANT CHURCHY RD., COUNTY WEXFORD

We interrupt this presentation of written records for this brief record in stone. The churchyard at Ballycanew adjoins the little slate building of the Church of St.ogue. Services have been carried on here for well over 150 years. The Hollingsworths were in this parish before 1746! Of all the burials recorded on the old register books, only the following have memorial stones erected over their graves. Three separate visits were made to this cemetery, and reports made subsequently to the writer. (1) Mr. John C. Warren, Clonhenritt, Camolin (Toome), Co. Wexford, by letter 16 May, 1962. He was unable to move two huge slabs which measure 8X4 feet, upon which he could see the Hollingsworth surname. (2) Mr. Bob Hollingsworth, of Donnybrook, Dublin, by letter 19 Oct., 1964. He and his family visited there and by dint of hard labour with block and tackle, etc., produced from the boot of their auto, managed, after considerable time and effort, to up-right one stone off of the other, making the inscriptions on both visible. (3) Mr. Tony Hollingsworth, Rosslare Harbour, Co. Wexford, by letter 30 June, 1965, the last visit made on Tuesday evening, 29 June, 1965. Because his description has the almost full content, we use his remarks. But we present Mr. Warren's and Mr. Bob Hollingsworth's figures where a difference appears.

Stone 1. "Here lies the body of ELIZABETH HOLLINGSWORTH who departed this life in November, 1781, aged ___ years.

"ALSO the body of JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH (Wm.?) of Ballinakill, who departed this life May the 12th, 1791, aged 78 years.

"This amiable couple lived in peace and tranquillity & died lamented.

"SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, died March 25, 1815, aged 45 years. (48)

"ANN HOLLINGSWORTH, relict of SAUL HOLLINGSWORTH, died April 1st, 1849, aged 85 years." (Stones 1-3 enormous flags 4feet by 8feet, flat.)

Stone 2. "Erected by JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH of Cranacrower in memory of his beloved mother ELIZABETH HOLLINGSWORTH who departed this life February the 12th 1803 (1805) in the 52nd year of her life and his father WILLIAM HOLLINGSWORTH who departed this life March 19, 1827 in the 70th year of his age.

"Also JOHN HOLLINGSWORTH, Cranacrower, their son, died Nov. 19, 1865 (1863), aged 70 years - Esteemed by all who knew him.

"and ESTHER HOLLINGSWORTH his beloved wife who died June 14, 1868 aged 74 years. Happy thro' life and her end was peace."

Stone 3. "Beneath this stone lieth the remains of THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH of Tonduff, who departed this life in July, 1822, aged 82 years.

"Also his wife ALICE HOLLINGSWORTH who dpt. 18th June, 1834 ae 82."

Stone 4. "To the memory of MARGRETTA HOLLINGSWORTH of Mt. Nebo, who died 31st August, 1847 aged 40 years - Also her husband SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH who died 30th Nov., 1870, aged 73 years." (Upright marble slab.)

The Prerogative & Consistory original wills of Ireland, as well as many of the Administrations - literally thousands and thousands of documents, perished in the 1922 fire. This left the indexes, and in a few cases the copies of wills made in will books, and many made in the Registry of Deeds. The Prerogative Wills also were abstracted, for the years about 1575-1800 inclusive, by Sir Wm. Betham, former Ulster King of Arms, Dublin. Below are all the records we are aware of, in which the surname Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth or Hollingworth appears.

Consider also the fact that Friends were not war-like, and not given to carrying a carload of weapons with them for defense in case of sudden attack!

THE NON - QUAKER HOLLINGSWORTHS

(A brief summary)

Since we have presented so many of the Quaker records, and lest we offend those of the families of Hollingsworth in America who are not immediately descended from them, we will make a quick summary of those who are not of the Quaker faith. Most of these are from Valentine. Many were left out of the books about his descendants, simply because the records of the Quakers are silent about them. And too, because the records of their new faiths weren't kept well, or kept at all. This is the sad legacy of pioneering peoples: They didn't leave many records; too busy pioneering! But we do have some trace of them, and here is what we have.

The first Baptist Hollingsworth in America, as far as we know, was JOHN, the youngest surviving son of Valentine & Ann (Calvert) Hollingsworth. John married Catherine (or, Katrin) Tyler, supposedly about 1706. The request to marry was made before Newark Monthly Meeting of Quakers, but no further record appears. Then, in the records of the Welsh Tract Baptist Meeting in New Castle County, Delaware, we find that the two of them, "John & Cathoring Hollingsworth," had signed the Baptist confession of faith in 1714! John's death in 1722 is reported in this same book. Thereafter, Catherine removed to the Philadelphia Baptist Church. We hear no more about her until her death. She apparently re-married one ROBERT EDWARDS, who also preceded her in death. At the time of her death she resided in Bladen County, North Carolina, and apparently was a member of the "Welsh Neck" Baptist Church. The latter church is said to have been organized by one "Rev. Stephen Hollingsworth." He was a zealous primitive Baptist all over that area. We have no proof, but suspect that he was a son (a bachelor!) of John & Catherine. His name also appears in the list of those who removed to Philadelphia from New Castle Co. Delaware in 1726. Catherine Edwards (nee Tyler and formerly Hollingsworth) left a will, probated in 1755 in Bladen County N.C. In it she named her son Robert Edwards (Junior), and the grandchildren, Isaac, John & Samuel HOLLINGSWORTH. We do not have any proof, but suspect that these grandchildren belonged to perhaps two of Catherine's sons. One of the two was Samuel, who died about 1753/4, in old Craven County, South Carolina. (This county or district has long since been discontinued.) He names a son Samuel, and "another child" which was not yet born at the time he wrote his will. Hence, he died quite young. But he indicates only two possible sons in his will which was probated at Charleston, S.C. So we are left to speculate which of the "three grandchildren - John, or Isaac," of Catherine Edwards, was the 2nd son to Samuel, born after his death, and which one was the 3rd, a child of another son! Catherine evidently had another son, Valentine Hollingsworth, for he was an executor of her will, and Samuel, her son, in his own will, names "(his) beloved brother Valentine Hollingsworth." A daughter, Ann Hollingsworth, married a Mr. Sutton. After this, the picture grows hazy. But if one examines the 1790 and 1800 U.S. Census reports, (see pp. 15-18; 63-65,) he will be struck by the large number of families in the Carolinas - many of whom we cannot identify with Valentine's descendants at the present time. So some of these, perhaps most of them, may be the "Baptist Hollingsworths," descendants of John & Catherine (Tyler) Hollingsworth! We invite information on this subject!

Another non-Quaker group, also believed to be descended from Valentine, are the "Old Pickens District" Hollingsworths. They are a prominent family. Some of them are wealthy manufacturers around Greenville, South Carolina today, and their names have been in the news recently. But they are non-Quaker. A check of their immediate ancestry, as it can be traced, reveals that they have fought in the wars of the Union and Confederate States, for over 180 years! We believe they all are the descendants of Elias Hollingsworth, who fought in the American Revolution of 1775-1783, from South Carolina. His name, along with Joseph, Aquilla, Jephtha, Ben-

jamin & Zebulon, appears upon line records. Examination of records of the Quakers will reveal that in 1776, about the time the war got started, Elias and Aquilla of Cone Creek, S.C. were disowned. This was probably for having taken up arms in the revolution - for which disownment was prescribed. In 1780, Benjamin, son of Elias, was disowned, as well as Elias, son of Elias! The latter in 1783 at the close of the war. Every time we see an Elias he gets disowned! We wonder if this name was "jinxed," at least, from the standpoint of Friends.

In examining the Pension Records of the National Archives, we noted two files for men named Elias Hollingsworth. One of them was a Revolutionary file, which pension was denied. Another was for an Elias who served in the War of 1812 from South Carolina. So this is sufficient to show or imply that the family of Elias of Cone Creek were early disowned from the Quakers. They evidently made their home in the old District known as Washington, which, in 1798 was divided into Pendleton and Greenville Districts. Note Elias was living in Pendleton in 1800! In 1826, Pendleton was broken up into what are now known as "Pickens & Anderson" Counties or Districts, as you prefer. Among South Carolinians, "District" is the preferred term, so we will use it. Pickens District was the home of Elias Hollingsworth until his death in 1876. He was born about 1797, and hence may be the man who served in the War of 1812. His sons named in his will are Daniel, Thomas & Benjamin, and a daughter named is Lucinda Harper. Of Daniel, who was born about 1817 in "Pickens" District, according to the 1860 census, we know his great-grandchildren are living today in Piedmont, Greenville County, S.C. which is just over the line out of Pickens District, but was originally part of it. We have letters stating that there is a Hollingsworth Burial Ground near Pickens Courthouse, S.C. We know that Daniel's brothers and some of his family must have fought for the South in the War Between the States, 1861-1865. We would like to get their names. Not enough information is in our possession to warrant any further remarks now.

Isaac Hollingsworth, a gunsmith by trade, was the very first man of his surname to inhabit what is now the state of Mississippi. He was a non-Quaker. In fact, his descendants all are staunch Baptists, and we suspect his relationship to John & Catherine (Tyler) Hollingsworth. Will welcome confirmation or denial! He was in Mississippi Territory before 1816, when his name appears on a petition to the Congress of the United States for aid. He apparently went through the War of 1812 and the Creek Indian War in that area, suffering considerable deprivation. He was born about 1780 in North Carolina, but a son William was born in South Carolina about 1804, and a daughter Elizabeth in Georgia about 1810! The rest, born from 1812 onward, all were natives of Mississippi according to the census records. Isaac is reported to have had two brothers - Abraham & Jacob. Although we do not know anything about their children, we know that Isaac himself had a large family. (See page 47, Query #6511) Most of them lived at Decatur, Newton Co., Miss.

We should add here, some omissions committed in our opening article of the April issue, pages 1 & 2, regarding early Hollingsworths & Hollingworths: We left out the fact that a William Hollingsworth was in Delaware in 1661, at "Sand Poynte in Delaware Bay," from which place he wrote a letter warning of Indian attack. He is described as "Mr. William Hollingsworth of New England;" of course, this probably referred to the whole area south to Delaware, in those early days. This makes a total of 5 settlements in America before Valentine Hollingsworth (1682), if you chose to count the "Carries" Hollingsworths reported in Maryland about 1662. He may have been some man as John who came to Maryland in 1650. None of these persons were Quakers. Finally, (See Query 6523) we cite Abraham Hollingsworth, early migrant from North Carolina to Tennessee, and settler of Illinois in 1824, with sons Alexander, Avenant, Abraham, John & Samuel, all of whom fought in the Black Hawk War. Of the early settlers, (before 1825), these are the "Non-Quaker Hollingsworths!" (References on next page.)

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"FRANCIS HALLINWORTH, GENT."

The book titled "A Census of Ireland," in the year 1659, by Seamus Pender, on p. 512, lists "Francis Hallinworth, Gent," as a resident landholder, in that year, of Rathdowne-Edward, Rathaspick, County Westmeath, Ireland. This is in Moygoishe Barony. In the townland where he resided were 12 persons - 2 of them English and the rest Irish. He was the only person listed of this surname. Very few names are listed; generally only the very prominent men. Was this man the same man who was a soldier in the Regiment of Colonel Lord Lambert at Dublin in April, 1644? (See p. 49 of April Register.) Being a Gentleman meant he held lands; perhaps he received them for his services during the Rebellion of 1641-49. It would be interesting to know more about him, for he might be related to Henry, the father of Valentine Hollingsworth, and the near relation of the ancestors of all the County Down and County Wexford and Wicklow Hollingsworths!

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According to our correspondent, Arthur McGowan, in Nottingham, England, one of the men who worked for the Hollingsworths of Rathfryland, Co. Down, Ireland, in the late 1700's was a Mr. "Prontay," who was the grandfather of the "BRONTE" sisters - Emily & Charlotte!

THE ARMS OF HOLLINGSWORTHPART ONE

The subject of Heraldry is a science in itself, and your editor doesn't pretend to understand or to be able to teach all of its varied aspects. On our inside cover, we have made a quotation from Burke, (THE GENERAL ARMOURY, 1884) where he describes three emblazonments of arms: two for HOLLINGSWORTH, and one for HOLLINGWORTH OF HOLLINGWORTH (formerly HOLLYNWORTHE.) Plate One represents our idea (unfortunately devoid of the colours or tinctures themselves) of the coat which is emblazoned (described in Heraldic terms): "Argent. A chevron ermine between three stags trippant proper. Crest: A crescent argent. Motto: Lumen accipe et imperti."

In a layman's language, the coat is as follows: Shield of silver. A chevron of ermin fur with tails showing, set between three stags in a trotting attitude. Crest (the symbol attached to a wreath of the colours which crowns the helmet) a crescent silver. Motto: (from Latin) "Acquire wisdom and impart it." (Stags natural)

This coat is ascribed to "Surrey & Hartlepool, Co. Durham." No other information is given. The editor has scoured every heraldic source he knows about, but has never seen another description outside of Burke. No year is given, nor is there a mention of the Herald who granted the arms.

Our cousin, Tony Hollingsworth, now of Rosslare Harbour, County Wexford, saw this reference in Burke and had a copy done for his family. A copy of it was the first your editor had seen. It was a surprise to learn of another coat outside of the one shown in the two Valentine Hollingsworth books! We think it is a very beautiful one, albeit there is a bit too much "argent" in it. Mr. Arthur H. McGowan, who resides in Sherwood, Nottingham, England - not a stone's throw from the ancient lair of Sir Robin of Loxley Hall (alias Robin Hood), also had seen this coat. His late uncle, Robert Hollingsworth, an historian even before the turn of this century, probably knew of it too. But neither instance can be traced beyond the reference in Burke! Surrey is a shire which covers part of the city of London. County Durham, on the other hand, is many miles North, near the Scotland frontier! Yet this Arms emblazonment is ascribed to both places - evidently "seats" of the family. Who these men were, or in what way they may or may not be related to us, we cannot answer. As space permits, we hope to present plates showing the other two emblazonments.

But, before we close this section of our series, let us set forth some very much needed corrections to what are felt to be "gross errors" of some decades' duration! We beg the pardon of those who would like to claim a descent or relationship to the so-called "great" families of Europe & England. But a clearcut report of facts is always the better way to begin any search into the cloudy past.

First of all, as to our own County Wexford-Wicklow family. The editor has been in correspondence with his cousins in that vicinity for about four years. Those remaining at the old sites first settled by their ancestors over 200 years ago, are still maintaining the traditional professions of farmers, labourers &c. They have said that in all their memory or experience there was no "Family Coat of Arms." At least, not for their branch of the family. No emblem appears over the door of Hollyfort House or on the headstones of old Ballycnew Churchyard where the oldest members are buried - two of the likeliest places to display the family colours! The wax seals made by three of them are reproduced upon the old deed (see page 42 and the information about these persons) dated 1823 have no motto, emblem or coat of arms impressions upon them. Yet "William Hollingsworth, Cranacrower," was one of the wealthiest of the group, an heir of his father's lands, and a Gen-

tleman farmer. He would be one of the likeliest men to bear an Arms. Yet, none was displayed by him.

It would be "impertinence," to put it mildly, for a British subject to claim a coat of arms belonging to a pedigreed family. In fact, it would be illegal! The Herald of old (and in a milder fashion, even today) held the power to levy a steep fine on any person found using the arms of another unrightfully. It was called "piracy." So we must pass briefly by this subject. We cannot speak for the line of any other of the Hollingsworths. But we do know that if your surname is "HOLLINGSWORTH," and you can trace your ancestry step by step back to the family who lived in the "Old Hall," (also called Nearer Hall) or to "Hollingworth Hall," at Mottram-in-Longdendale, Co. Cheshire, England, you may claim their arms as having belonged to your ancestors. But if your line doesn't proceed from the eldest son (and most American lines do not), you will have to write the Herald's College in London and find out what a "differenced Arms" would cost to be granted to you.

Another error, or series of errors, was committed in the book "Descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr.," by Joseph Adger Stewart (1925 - J.P. Morton & Co., Louisville, Kentucky, U.S.A.) Let us briefly correct them. We hope not to make more errors in the process!

Firstly, Mr. Stewart opens his narration on an un-numbered page, with the words "The Hollingsworths have held their own all along the ages..." There follows a long paragraph full of errors. Then on page 1 and 2 the actual genealogical facts about Valentine begin. There are not so many errors here, except the misinterpretation of the "Old Style" dates used in Quaker records. But the fact which must be brought out here, is that, the first two pages of text, and then pages 1 & 2, seem not to be the writing of Mr. Stewart! At least, they are in no way original to his 1925 book, and they do not appear in the 1884 pamphlet upon which nearly all of the rest of the book is based. Those four pages were printed, almost word for word, in "Colonial Families of the U.S.A.," Volume 7, edited by Mackenzie, and copyrighted 1920 - five years before Stewart's book! The glaring mistake is realized when one reads the words on page 1 "He (Valentine) was the son of Henry Hollingsworth of Belleniskerannol, Parish of Legoe, ..." The correct spelling is, of course, "Segoe," not "Legoe." This SAME TYPOGRAPHICAL ERROR is in the Mackenzie Volume 7, pp. 291 - 300. (This vol. was edited by Nelson Osgood Rhoades, successor to Mackenzie, who died before its production.) The apparent writer of the article was Joseph Edwin Hollingsworth, 328 North McNeill St., Memphis, Tennessee, for his name is given as the article begins.

Other errors follow and precede this minor one. Mention is made of "Hollingsworth Hall," in Mottram. This is incorrect. The name of the Hall, now in ruins since 1944, was "HOLLINGWORTH HALL." The letter "s" never was used by the old family who once lived in it. Mention is made of a roll for Mottram Parish, c1580, wherein "Robert Hollingsworth" and "John Hollingsworth" are mentioned. (The Mackenzie work used the spelling "Hollinsworth.") The editor has not seen the original rolls, but "History of East Cheshire," 1886, by J. P. Earwaker (2 vols) makes quotations to the effect that their name was "HOLLINGWORTH." See also pp. 47, 48 of April's Register, for the predominant spelling used by Cheshire families. Mr Earwaker tells us of two pedigreed families, and the Harleian Mss. prove him correct. Both spelt their surname "Hollingworth," originally "de Hollynworthe." He also, however, makes mention of "yeoman" families nearer Manchester, of the name. These bore no official arms and had no pedigree registered. The American clans may have sprung from one of these.

The official Arms of Hollingworth are: Azure. On a bend argent, 3 holly leaves slipped vert. Crest: A stag lodged proper. Motto. Disce ferenda pati. This, being interpreted, means the Shield is blue as the sky; a diagonal bar of silver traverses it from the upper (shield's) right as held by the user, to the lower left.

On this bond are painted three green holly-tree leaves, with stems. The part worn on top of the helmet, or the crest, is a stag in a crouching position, in its natural colour. (Same as for the Hartlepool coat.) The motto is interpreted "Learn to bear what must be," or "Learn to suffer what must be borne." This arms was the property of the Hollingworth family of Hollingworth Hall, and, since they owned a chapel in old Mottram Church, they emblazoned it (painted it in its colours) on the wall of the chapel. There also is described a "Quartered Arms," for the house of "Hollingworth-Heywood." In this arms, the shield is divided into four sections, and two depict the familiar 3 holly leaves, while the other two depict the "two bars" of the Heywood family. This came as a result of the marriage between John Hollingworth (died 1599) and Katherine, daughter and heir to John Edmund Heywood of Mackley in Cheshire. The Heywood arms is emblazoned: "Argent, two bends within a bordure gules." (Silver shield, diagonally crossed by two bars in a border of red.)

A final error perpetuated in the Stewart & Mackenzie works is as follows: "The late owner (of the hall), Captain Robert Hollingsworth, the last representative of the English branch of the family, died in 1865." Mr. J. P. Earwaker, in his very authoritative work above cited, clarifies this error. He shows us that "Hollingworth Hall" was sold by the Hollingworth family to another owner. From this owner (not the Hollingworths), the place was purchased, early in the 19th Century, by a person named "Captain de Hollyngeworthe," who claimed to be a blood descendant of the original family. His name doesn't appear upon the pedigrees! (Note the curious "ancient" spelling of his name!) Of even more surprising note, is the fact that this Capt. De Hollyngeworthe planned to do some rather extensive and expensive architectural work on the Hall, which he apparently never had enough sterling to accomplish. But he did publish a painting of his hall in a book called "Twycross' East Cheshire Mansions," which depicted the structure as he would have liked it to appear, not as it was. You can imagine your editor's chagrin, when reading this news, after having believed so implicitly in what was in the Stewart book! So, beware! If you catch your editor in a mistake, call his attention to it; but document your correction.

Be not dismayed by this awful truth! Yet a ray of hope stirs the darkness. Referring again to the Burke 1884 The General Armoury, we note another Arms of "HOLLINGSWORTH," with the beloved letter "s" - that mysterious sibilant. This coat is over 100 years older than the "Hollingworth" arms (which latter was first noted officially about 1613, by the way), and it is almost identical. The only difference is that the Crest is a "stag couchant argent," that is, silver, and there is no motto whatever, and, the charges are not "holly" leaves, but simply "loaves." It is ascribed to York Herald, in the time of King Richard III. This would mean it was recorded in a York Herald's roll of arms about A.D. 1483-85! Somehow, with experience behind him, this writer feels that Burke himself may have erred in transcribing a "differenced" coat of "Hollingworth," and added the letter "s." This could easily come about, because, in 1884, our surname was much more prominent. Even your editor has had to correct this copy several times, after having added an "s" where it shouldn't be. The cost to have an official bona fide search in Herald's College is 5 Guineas, or about \$16.00 (Sixteen Dollars) in American funds. If anyone cares to have this old 1483 coat traced, let him please report his findings to us. It is a matter of money which has prevented this up until now. We feel that this York coat is actually a differenced coat, (the official "difference" probably being the crest change of colour) for a younger son (second son, third son, etc.) who left the Mottram family about that time. So, maybe our Irish Hollingsworth lines may claim descent from this branch. Keep your chin up!

"HOLLINGSWORTH, Joseph, farmer, P.O. Lebanon, was born in South Carolina, May 25, 1802; he is a son of Abraham and Eunice (Steddom) Hollingsworth, who emigrated to Warren County in 1804; he was raised on the farm and received a liberal education as the schools of the township afforded. He married, in 1833, to Miss Sallie Furnas, of Montgomery County, Ohio, by whom he has had 9 children - five of whom are now living. He is a Republican in politics, and, with his wife, belongs to the Society of Friends; he owns several farms, amounting in all, to 725 acres."

"HOLLINGSWORTH, Jabez, farmer, P.O. Oregon, was born in Turtle Creek township, Sept. 3, 1811-; He is a son of Abraham & Eunice (Steddom) Hollingsworth, natives of South Carolina. They settled in Turtle Creek Township in 1804. His father was born in March, 1776, and died November 28, 1849. Mrs. Hollingsworth was born in 1769 and died in 1814. Our subject was reared on a farm, and obtained his education in log school houses built with a fireplace and greased-paper window lights. Mr. Hollingsworth has always followed farming and the raising of livestock to some extent. He owns a farm of 260 acres and is an enterprising citizen. Notwithstanding his excentricities (! - Ed.) he is classed among the better citizens of Warren County. His portrait will appear in this work." (NOTE: His portrait did appear on page 443. - Ed.)

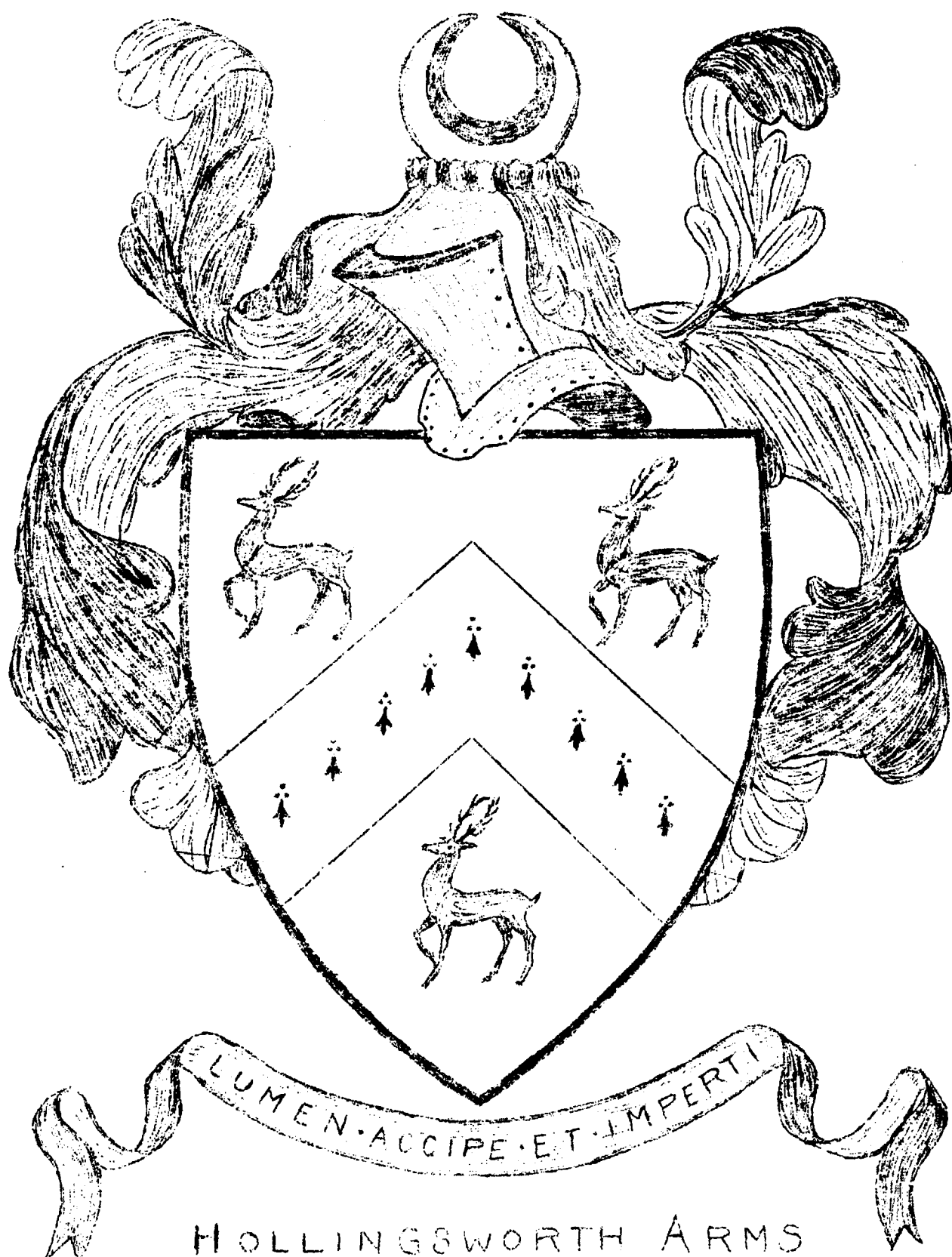
THE PARISH REGISTER OF WARRINGTON, LANCASHIRE, ENGLAND

HOLLINGSWORTHS OF SCOTCH PLAINS, NEW JERSEY

It is our proposal to here publish every piece of original data pertinent to the genealogical history of this family now in the possession of the editor. It is scattered material. But much interesting data are to be found. So with no further delay we launch into the presentation.

From: "Hollingsworth Genealogical Memoranda in the United States, 1682-1884," ed. by W. B. Hollingsworth, Baltimore, Maryland, U.S.A. (1884).

Page 144: "DANIEL HOLLINGSWORTH

"A son, SAMUEL HOLLINGSWORTH, married MARGARET FERNELY.

"A son, EDMOND VALENTINE HOLLINGSWORTH, 39 Dey Street, New York, born February 14, 1830. Married ELIZA JANE WILSON, June 4th, 1857. No Issue."

This reference was reprinted in J. A. Stewart's 1925 book (see p. 86 of this issue) on page 171, out of context with the 1884 setting, with address removed, and garbled to make it appear as if Edmond were a brother of Samuel, rather than a son, as other records show he was. Also, Stewart here implies that this is a line from Valentine, which the 1884 book does not. Evidently he was mistakenly prompted by the "Valentine" in his name. But this man was born on "St. Valentine's Day," 1830, and this is the only reason for the name!

At any rate, Daniel Hollingsworth lived in County Wexford, Ireland. We suspect him to be the Daniel who died in 1811 at Coolock, Parish of Killena, and who was buried in Old Ballycanew that year, at the age of 75. (See the Burials of Ballycanew in this issue.) The son, Samuel, was born about 1796/7, also in Co. Wexford. He married Margaret or Margaretta Fernely, before 1830, but no marriage record can be found; evidently by banns, and in a register not examined.

Samuel & Margaret Hollingsworth remained in Ireland and died and are buried in Old Ballycanew. (See the article above cited.) They had five children, perhaps more: three sons and two daughters, all born in County Wexford, Ireland.

Their names, in order, were:

If there were other sons or daughters, the records in Ireland have not been found to give any indication.

Edmund V. & Loftus emigrated to New York City, U.S.A., before 1860, and boarded (in 1860) in the 4th Ward, in the Boarding House of a Mrs. Margaret Hughes, also a native of the Emerald Isle. Since Edmund married Eliza J. Wilson in 1857, we believe the brothers came here before that date, since Eliza was a native of New York. In this boarding establishment lived other Wilsons, and the future wife to Loftus the 3rd brother - Miss Agnes Johnson, whose profession was that of a milliner. It causes us to wonder if she was the inspiration for the Hollingsworth family's launching into the hatters'-fur trade.

Shortly before 1870, the brothers went over to North Plainfield township, Somerset County, New Jersey, and established their Brook Mill, which was to flourish for over half a century. From what we have been able to learn (with very little cooperation from the family), it seems that Edmund maintained an office at 39 Day Street in New York, to sell the finished furs. Here, probably, he was contacted by W. B. Hollingsworth of Baltimore, who was working on his "Hollingsworth Genealogical Memoranda," from which we quoted above. Loftus was the manager of the Mill in New Jersey, and was associated with his brother Henry Samuel, who later returned to live in Brooklyn. Of the three brothers, Edmund had no children; Loftus had 9, and Henry had 8. We cannot at this time display the names of any but two of Henry's children. The last child of Loftus is living in Westfield, N. J. at this writing. As of 1962, the last child of Henry was living in Brooklyn. Both of these last survivors are very elderly. The grandchildren of both of these men are scattered all over the United States. It would have been so helpful if some of them could have told about their ancestors, particularly since we have reached an impasse with Daniel, the father of Samuel. We follow this article with every source we now have in our possession.

It was established in 1869, employs about 30 hands, 2 wood-workers, and 2 machinists. The company build their own machines, run by water power when Green Brook affords a sufficient supply, but have additional steam-power. The fur is brought from New York, and the manufactured goods returned to that city for market; LOFTUS HOLLINGSWORTH, business manager."

PERSONAL LETTERS

(1) From Mr. Samuel R. Hollingsworth, Cincinnati, Ohio, dated May 16, 1962:

"My great-grandfather lived in Wexford County, Ireland and I am informed that his name was Samuel Hollingsworth. He had four boys who came to this country and settled in the Brooklyn, New York area. My grandfather's name was Loftus, he was the third oldest & later moved to Scotch Plains, New Jersey. The second oldest was Ben. (? - Ed.) My grandfather had five boys and four girls, the oldest of the boys being my father, Loftus Frank Hollingsworth. The other four boys were named - Samuel, Frank, Albert, & William. The girls were named - Louise, Agnes, Elizabeth & Nell. Of the family, Elizabeth, now about 92, and Samuel, now about 84, are living and my uncle Sam is the one who gave me this information and who will give me more information which I will send to you regarding the names of my grandfather's brothers and the time when they came to this country. (NOTE: No further was ever forthcoming. Ed.)

"My uncle, Samuel Hollingsworth, is living in the Park Hotel, Plainfield, N.J. and at this hotel he apparently ran into someone who was familiar with the family and told him this story - which is just a story... It seems that the Hollingsworth family originated in England. In about 1400, A.D., during the wars, (Does he mean the Wars of the Roses? c1455-1485 thirty years' duration; date of end of wars coincides with approx. date of Coat of Arms described on p. 87 Ed.), a land grant was made in Ireland. In order to take advantage of this it became necessary that this land be occupied and consequently the family was split, half remaining in England and half going to Wexford County, in Ireland.

"Of all of the male relatives to whom I have referred to above, only Loftus and Albert had children and I have one cousin, Albert, by name of Hollingsworth. He has no children. I have a son and two daughters and therefore my son, Samuel, will, I believe, be the only remaining male Hollingsworth of the four brothers who came here from Ireland." (NOTE He overlooked the descendants of Henry Samuel of Brooklyn. See next letter. - Ed.)

(2) From Mr. John Henry Hollingsworth, 43 Chestnut St., Brooklyn, New York, dated Dec. 9, 1962:

"In answer to your letter of Oct. 25, 1962 it looks like you are on the right track. At this time I do not have all the information you request but the following will help. On stone in Cypress Hills Cemetery, Brooklyn, N.Y. ... (He then enumerated the entries already given above: for Henry, Catherine & Daniel.) Henry S., ... my grandfather; Catherine J., ... my grandmother; Daniel H., my uncle; Christine, my mother; My father, who is still with us is Benjamin C., Sr., born April 4, 1872, aged 90. 43 Chestnut St., Lester P., alive, 6 Paddock Lane, Lake Success, L.I., N.Y. my brother; Benjamin C., Jr., 124 Forbel St., Brooklyn, my brother, born Aug., 3, 1906; John Henry, self, born Apr. 13, 1908; George S., my brother, 43 Chestnut St., born April 20, 1910; Arthur F., 3333 S. Florida Av., Lakeland, Fla., my brother, born Mar. 8, 1912; August A., 128 Aspen St., Floral Park, N.J., my brother, born July 6, 1915; Lester has no children; Ben C. Jr. has dau. Doreen, born Dec. 15, 1959; John Henry, self, son John B., born Aug. 22, 1933; 507 Meadow St., Ithaca, N.Y.; George S., no ch; Arthur F., no ch; August A., daughter Christine, born Jan. 14, 1950; son Robert, b. Nov. 21, 1953; (my son) John B., has son Larry J., born May 21, 1955; and son Tim A., born Aug. 16, 1957.

"Edward Hollingsworth is retired from the Police Dept. now in Florida, 301 S.W. 12 St., Pompano Beach, Florida. (See page 54 Ed.) I never met Edward, got address from friend. Loftus, who is my father's uncle went to Scotch Plains, N.J. do not have address at this date. Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year - Cordially, John H. Hollingsworth, etc."

So ends our file on the "Scotch Plains Family." More data is desired. The line back of Daniel (1736-1811) is the same as that of your editor and many of the subscribers & readers of the Register. For the births of the above described 3 Immigrant brothers, and their sisters, or rather, their baptisms, see page 72, Nos. 70-73. If the above Land Grant story is true, we all may be close cousins!
