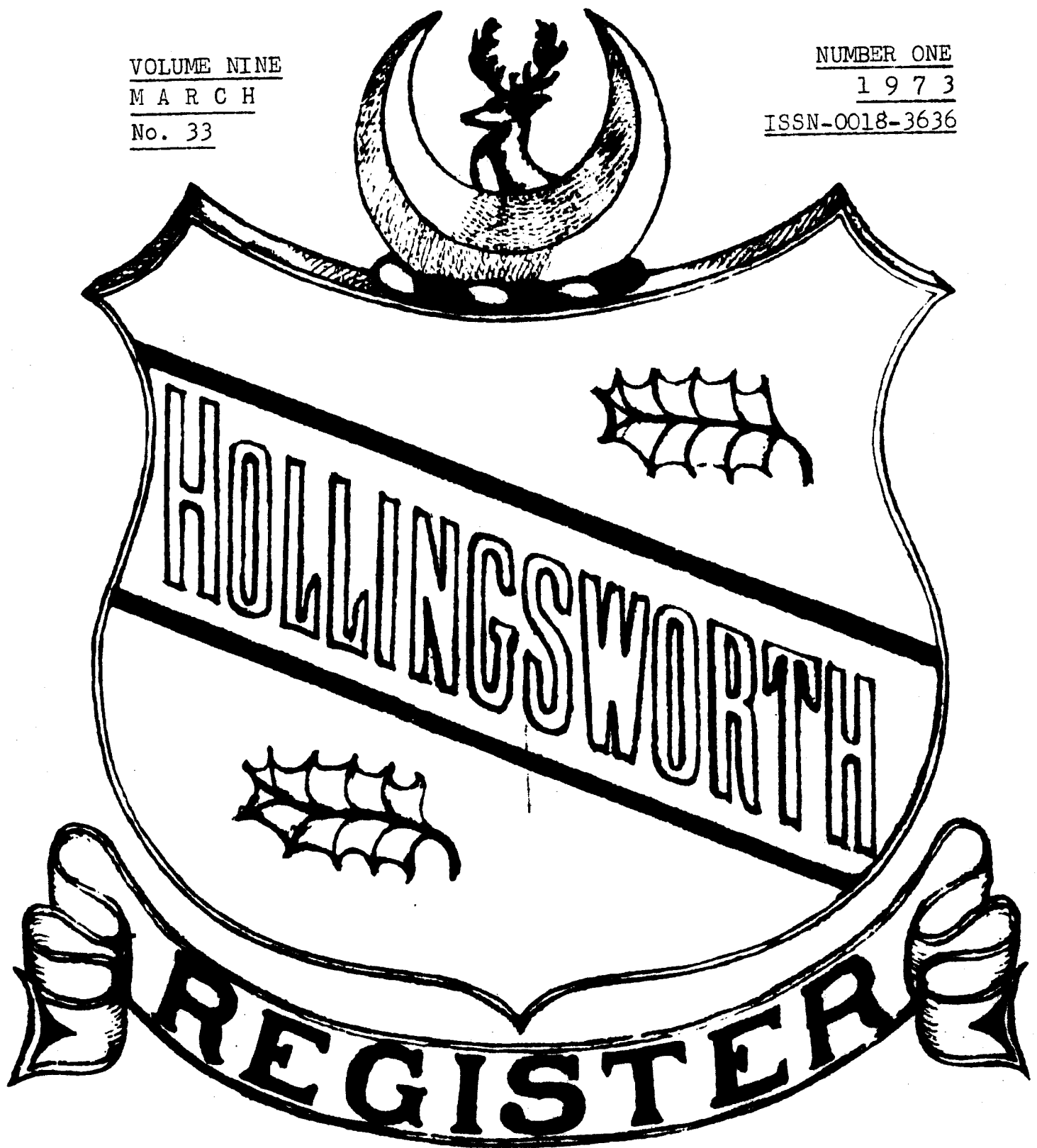

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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingsworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), a Holly bush, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingsworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

First Hollingworth on This Continent

After eight years of publication, Hollingsworth Register finally gets round to talking about Richard Hollingworth. He, you may know, came to this continent in 1635. I mentioned him briefly a couple of times. In the very first issue he is given his due credit on page 2. But what about his posterity, his life in New England, his ancestors in England? I can tell you answers to the first two queries, only a speculation about the last.

Richard Hollingworth was the first head of family ever to come to the shores of New England. Since his four children came too, I might split hairs and say that any one of them could have first set foot on American soil before Richard. That is beyond my power to ascertain. So to Richard goes the laurel of acclaim. The ship was the "Blessing" of London, John Lester, the master. (See John Camden Hotten: Original Lists of Persons of Quality, etc., familiarly called "Hotten's Persons," p.108, and The Founders of New England, by Samuel G. Drake p. 40.) There are thirty-one names listed as to be transported to New England on this ship. The date above it, actually given before the list of passengers to go aboard the "James," is 13 July 1635. I assume it is all one dated item in the original manuscript, and that the vessels sailed shortly afterward.

Before getting into discussion of Richard, I should salute first the vanguard of all Hollingworths. That was Edward Hollingworth, age 46, listed for the "Alexander" and dated May 2, 1635. (Ibid page 73.) Edward, however, was bound for Barbados. Nevertheless, he was No One of our surname to sail away across the Atlantic, of whom we have record. He may be the Edward Hollingworth baptized 24 Nov. 1589, at Mottram-in-Longdendale, Cheshire. (HR 2 p. 40, item 38.) Nothing is ever heard of him. I don't know if he ever sailed, or if the ship reached harbour safely.

Richard Hollingworth and his family came here 47 years before Valentine Hollingsworth. There were at least seven others who came between those two arrivals.

These lists of "Persons" of the seventeenth century all contain the statement that they carried certificates "from the ministers and Justices of their conformitie in Religion" which stamps them as non-Puritans! They were conformists to the Church of England. They were wholly unlike the brave Pilgrims of the Mayflower, Speedwell, Fortune, and Anne, of fifteen years earlier, who, with few exceptions, opposed the State Church. This, I suppose, doesn't mean Richard necessarily remained under its domination after his settlement in Salem.

Yes, Salem, Massachusetts, was the town where Richard Hollingworth settled, and where he died in 1654. We know only a few facts about him while he lived there. Here they are, as I have found them.

First, here is a copy of the passenger list for the vessel in question, the Blessing. It almost certainly sailed from London.

The two Lewes entries simply must be accidental duplication. Richard Hollingworth, Junior, listed age 4 above, deposed, in 1673, in Salem, that his father had arrived in Salem "about 40 years since with a family of 12 and a good estate - was the first builder of vessels." (N.E. Register, 40:65 under Mass. Archives, LIX, page 127.) The Hunters are to be considered part of Richard's charges, I suppose. But That only makes a total of ten. Are we to assume that Thomas Trentum and Thomas Bigges are included? Enough of that.

How about the good estate he brought? Had he built ships in England? Probably. I am assuming this man was of Kent or the immediate London area. Many churches and their registers suffered destruction in 1666 in the Great Fire. It may be that Richard's records thus suffered, and that this is why men like Charles Banks, who attempted to find records for nearly all the early founders of New England, in old England, failed in this case. He did not perform exhaustive research, however. We know he was born about 1594; married about 1625.

In 1641, while engaged in building a large vessel in Salem harbor, (probably one of 300 tons which Hugh Peters induced the merchants to have built) one of his workmen, one Robert Baker, was killed. The charges of negligence were brought against Richard Hollingworth because the court felt he didn't have strong enough tackle. He had to pay ten pounds to the widow and children of the deceased. (Felt's Annals, Vol II, page 343 "Early Shipbuilding in Massachusetts.")

Hollingworth died in 1654, and an inventory was taken May 26th of that year. (Salem Probates.) He was about 59 at the time of death. Susan his widow seems to have survived him many years. She conveyed land to Humphrey Woodbury in 1667, and "Old Goodwife Hollingworth" was admitted to the cottage of said Humphrey Woodbury, Senior, in 1675, and he agreed to support her, if he died, she to be admitted an inhabitant. (Salem Town Recs. 12 Dec. 1675.) Somebody claimed Susan remarried one Rev. John Jones of Fairfield. The above convinces me she did not! In 1675 she was about 70.

Somewhere, years back, I saw a lengthy discussion of the probabilities attendant on this Hollingworth and Hunter connection. But I can't recall the source and can't find it now. Can any one of you? If you will, please notify me with book and page. As I remember it, the entire thing was conjecture, but some records from Salem did tend to support the ideas put forth. Of course, the Hunters were close kin. I can't escape that theory. But they can't be children by Susan by another husband, can they? Can they be step-children of Richard by a former wife. Yes. He was a decade older than Susan. Were they, on the other hand, her own brothers and sisters? Too many questions, no answers - just "maybe."

Donald L. Jacobus, the late Dean of American Genealogists, wrote a series "The History and Genealogy of the Families of Old Fairfield," Connecticut. In this set, he presents articles on our subject and his descendants from which I am going to draw heavily for the rest of the article here, with your permission. I know I am not being led up the garden path when I follow his lead!

Jacobus conjectures, with others before him (he wrote in 1932), that Richard Junior's testimony in 1673 was incorrect and that some of the "twelve" were born in America. He puts forth two - Mary and Mercy, who were hypothetically born in 1637 and 1640, the latter of whom married (1) Mr. Nichols, and (2) Thomas Disbrow, of Fairfield. I claim that the "family of twelve" necessarily included the parents. Surely not the parents and 12 others! Unfortunately there is no census of Salem Town which might show who were living under his roof! But if the home in England can be ascertained, the connections will be made plainer.

Now the descendants!

- 1) William Hollingworth, born about 1628, in England; died in Salem in 1667. His wife was Eleanor. She died 22 Nov. 1689, aged 59, according to a grave stone. He and his widow ran an ordinary, and Eleanor's licence was renewed many times in the court records. However, Salem records show the Intestacy of this William, granted to Elenor (sic) Hollingworth, took place in 1678, not likely he had died in 1667. Savage, in his Gen. Dictionary of New England, says he died 7 Nov 1683 aged 53. The age doesn't agree well, and it certainly is not Eleanor's William. There probably were three Williams in Salem at one time, another of whom was Captain William Hollingworth, an opulant merchant trader, who often sailed into Maryland and Virginia waters. Savage says he is "not the brother of Richard." D.L. Jacobus, getting back to our William, says he and Eleanor had issue, (1) William, born cl655, died 7 Nov. 1688, aged 33. Note this carefully! Three is often called Five in headstones work, and vice versa - Amen! Three is also a good looking Eight, two hundred years and many rainstorms hence. Even better vice versa.

Mary³Hollingworth, another child of William and Eleanor, married Philip English in 1675. Later she was accused of being a witch during the "Great delusion" of the 1690s. Susan³na³ was another child, born 4 March 1658/9. No other data on her life.

- 2) Richard² Hollingworth, born about 1630 in England, died at Milford, in 1683, aged 53. See further below.
- 3) Elizabeth² Hollingworth, born about 1632. No data given.
- 4) Susan² Hollingworth, born about 1634 in England. She married, 24 Nov. 1650, Robert Starr. Ch: Robert, Richard, Susannah.
- 5) Mary² Hollingworth, born cl637 in Salem. (Hypothetical. D.L.J.)
- 6) Mercy² Hollingworth, born "say 1640" in Salem, married (1) Mr. Nichols; and (2) Thomas Disbrow, of Fairfield. (Hypothetical.)
- 7) Hollingworth, (hypothetical) a supposed son. Evidence: Job Hilliard, Salem, by first wife Sarah, had a daughter Sarah Hilliard, married, by 1674, to Mr. Hollingworth. (DLJ)

Generation Two:

Richard Hollingworth, Jr. Son of Richard and Susan of Salem. Mr Jacobus calls him Hollingsworth. Born in England cl630; died in Milford, Connecticut, in 1683. He was married, 23 August 1659, in Boston Elizabeth Powell, daughter of "Elder" Michael Powell of Boston. She was born at Boston 16 June 1641, died Milford 10 Jan. 1706, ae 68. (A Grave memorial.) She had remarried, Richard Bryan, of Milford, and finally, Governor Robert Treat, on 24 Oct. 1705. Richard, Jr. was a mariner of both Salem, and Milford. He left a small estate including books in Latin. (Inventory 7 Sept 1683.) Estate of Mrs. Elizabeth Treat, late Hollingsworth (sic?) in Milford, granted 2 March 1705/6, to Mrs. Abigail Beard and husband Mr. John Beard, and a quietus est there, Nov. 1711, also to Mrs. Beard, have more data and proofs.

Children, which are of record in Salem, except Richard, in Milford:

- 1) Richard³ Hollingworth (1) b. 9 Aug. 1661 d. Aug. 1662.
- 2) Benjamin³ Hollingworth, b. 28 June 1663, died young.
- 3) John³ Hollingworth, b. 12 May 1665, died young.
- 4) Abigail³ Hollingworth, b. 1 March 1667/8; married John Beard. of Milford, Conn. Living there in 1711.
- 5) Joseph³ Hollingworth, b 4 May 1670; died in April 1698, at Milford, unmarried. Nuncupative Will and Administration. His mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Bryan, sister Abigail, aged about 29, and brother Richard (2) mentioned in the papers.
- 6) Caleb³ Hollingworth, b. 22 Dec. 1673; died cl731 unmarried. Administration granted on 28 April to Richard Hollingsworth. (Sic according to DLJ.)
- 7) Richard³ Hollingworth (2), born in Milford 1680, baptised 19 Sept. 1680. See below for more details.

Generation Three:

Richard Hollingworth 3rd, son of Richard and Elizabeth (Powell) Hollingworth. He was baptized on Sept. 19, 1680 at Milford, Connecticut. Was alive in 1733 in Milford (deeds.) Married Ruth Lewis, daughter of Philip Lewis, Fairfield, Connecticut. She married (2) Stephen Munson (1679-1768) of New Haven, Connecticut.

Richard Hollingworth 3d is said to have lived in Fairfield a few years. He conveyed his right to his brother Caleb's estate to his son Richard 4th, in 1733 in Milford.

Children:

- 1) Richard⁴ Hollingworth, married June 16, 1735, Ann Baldwin.*
- 2) Mary⁴ Hollingworth, m. 7 Jan. 1730/31, Thomas Hine, Jr.*
- 3) Elizabeth⁴ Hollingworth, m. William Hine, of Milford, and Derby, 20 April 1727.*
- 4) Joseph⁴ Hollingworth, bapt. 14 Jan. 1712/13, and died in 1776. See Fourth Generation.
- 5) Abigail⁴ Hollingworth, bapt. 2 June 1723, died at New Haven 23 Feb. 1793 aged 70 (grave stone). Married 21 May 1741, Samuel Munson. (Married at New Haven, called of Milford.)

*These marriages all at Milford, Conn. The first three children were baptized at Stratfield, 15 April 1711. The other two at Fairfield. Source: Op Cit page 290.

Generation Four:

Joseph Hollingsworth, son of Richard and Ruth (Lewis) Hollingsworth. (I call him Hollingsworth, for I believe that the name was truly by that time changed and fixed. If any subscriber or reader wants to challenge this and document it, let him contact me.) Born 1712/13, baptized at Fairfield, Conn., 14 Jan. 1712/13. Died at Fairfield in 1776. He married (1) on Nov. 4, 1734, Ann Jennings, who was baptized 12 March 1703/4. He married (2) Ruth. She is said to have died 20 July 1782, according to the Perry Diary. Inventory and Distribution of Joseph's estate in 1776 in Fairfield. Widow Ruth, daughters Sarah, wife of Abel Jennings; Mary, Ruth Jr., Abigail, Ann and Elizabeth. Each of the unmarried daughters received one-fifth of the house! I will tell you a little more of this below.

Children, all recorded in Fairfield records:

- 1) Sarah⁵ Hollingsworth, b. 31 March 1736, Fairfield. Died 9 June 1816, aged 80. She married Abel Jennings. Aug. 16, 1758. (This verified as to spelling of name in Fairfield Christ Church Register, in History of Fairfield by Schenk, p. 519.) More about this couple below.
- 2) Mary⁵ Hollingsworth, b. June 26, 1737, d. 25 Aug. 1826 age 89. Administration to niece, Grizzel Jennings.
- 3) Ruth⁵ Hollingsworth, b. June 6, 1741, died unmarried 1802. Will 28 Mar 1800, proved 28 June 1802, names, among others, her four sisters, Mary, Abigail, Anna and Elizabeth, and her married sister Sarah Jennings.
- 4) Abigail⁵ Hollingsworth, b. Jan. 16, 1743, d. 1826, Fairfield.
- 5) Ann⁵ Hollingsworth, b. Dec. 9, 1744, died before 1823, probably same "Miss Hollingsworth" died Aug. 1821. Abel Jennings, Administrator.
- 6) Elizabeth⁵ Hollingsworth, b. Jan. 18, 1748, died 1820. Administration to Abel Jennings, 24 Apr. 1820.

now had become extinct as to the Holling(s)worth name, and survived only through Sarah Jennings. I have not as yet tried to track down Richard⁴ Hollingworth of Generation Four, who married Ann Baldwin in Milford. But in all likelihood that line, too, is extinct in the surname. At least I can't find it turning up now.

Generation Five: (Jennings Family.)

Sarah⁵ Hollingsworth, born March 31, 1736, at Fairfield. She died June 9, 1816, at Fairfield, aged 80 years. Eldest of six children, only one who married. She married at Christ Church, Fairfield, on August 16, 1758, Abel Jennings. He was the son of John and Sarah (Fanton) Jennings of the same town, baptized 14 Dec. 1735 in Christ Church, Fairfield, according to DLJ and records, page 490 of History op cit.

Children included: Noah Jennings, Eunice, wife of Jonathan Willson, Ruth, Grizzel, Ann and Joseph Jennings, all alive on 7 May 1821, and named as heirs of Elizabeth Hollingsworth who died in 1820, their aunt.

The house in Fairfield was divided to the five unmarried ladies. Picture the decades they carried on in their dear memories, the fond recollections of youth and living there with their parents. There must be history here. Perhaps some novel sprang from this house as inspiration. The legal or titular Head of Household seems to have been Mary. In the 1800 Census of Fairfield, page 60, she is listed as Mary Hollensworth, with four females 45 years and up. In 1820 she is called Hollingworth, with 3 females 45 and up, on page 250 of the schedule. In 1810, it is Hollingsworth, on page 67, with 4 females over 45. In 1830 nothing. All is silence in the old house. Mary must have been the last survivor, four years earlier, who "closed the doors." Oddly, "Abigail Hallin" with 4 females, appears in the 1790 census of Fairfield, p. 15, Col. 1, next to Abel Jennings!

For Jennings, see op cit, pp. 331-336 Volume One, and 532-536 of Vol. Two.

Our subscriber, Mrs. William E. Jennings, of Orland Park, Ills., has informed me that her husband descends from Abel and Sarah (Hollingsworth) Jennings, and also from the Valentine Hollingsworth line! As she says, it is unique. Can any other reader claim the same thing? The line from Sarah: Son Noah Jennings, his son Lewis, next Allen, then Lewis, then Verne, and finally William E. Jennings. The gentleman's other line, in reverse order: William E. Jennings, his father Verne, and Verne's mother Esther Mae Beaman; her father, John Wesley Beaman; his mother, Frances Minerva Hollingsworth, of Elias⁶, Benjamin⁵, Elias⁴, Jacob³, Thomas², Valentine¹, of Henry Hollinworth^a of Ballyvickcrannell, Co Armagh, Ireland. William E. Jennings is eleven generations from Richard Hollingworth 1st, and the same from Valentine Hollingsworth of New Castle County, Penna.

Finally we have published the record of our real First American Hollingsworth Family. If further data turns up, it will find space in Hollingsworth Register.

Minnesota in 1860

Sorry to disappoint you. After a pretty thorough search of the legible portions of this census, we found not one family of our surname, nor any individuals! Even the illegible portions which are never completely blank, were scoured with negative results. Nearly all of the schedules for the southern counties - often the ones with larger population - were in worse condition than the northern counties. Some of the latter consisted of only a page or two. Aitkin County had only two names! Due to our time spent on these three huge states with so small results, we aren't able to take time to present Mississippi and Missouri in this issue. Nor would we have space! These are filled with H-worths.

Minnesota Research Tabulation: 2 rolls of film, 5 volumes of schedules, with 4,636 pages in all. Time: 2 hours and 54 minutes of research. Also on this film, at end of last volume, is what was to become Dakota Territory, and ultimately, North and South Dakota. There were 125 pages and we covered these too, for a total of 4,761 pages.

Hollingsworth Kin is Viet POW!

Major Thomas Collins III, prisoner of the North Vietnamese for seven and a half years, who was among the first released in February, is a descendant of Isaac Hollingsworth (1780-1866) formerly of Newton County, Mississippi. (See pages 14 and 21 for more details about the same family.) He is a son of Thomas Collins Jr., and grandson of Thomas Sr and Ellen (Smith) Collins. Thomas Sr. was son of John and Pernecie Ann (Riser) Collins. Pernecie Ann was daughter of Isaac Riser and his wife, Mary "Polly" Hollingsworth, the daughter of Isaac Hollingsworth. She was supposed to be a twin of William Smith Hollingsworth, whose grandchildren were feted at the Family Reunion mentioned hereafter. Major Collins returned to his wife, Donnie, and sons Marty 9, and Ted, 7, who had never seen his daddy! The family home is in Clinton, Miss.

Newton County, Mississippi Deeds - Part One

Many of our subscribers, faithfuls like Mrs. Jane Brent of Raymond, Miss., and Mrs. Leola Rayborn of Sumrall, Miss., will be very happy to know the following news: The L.D.S. (Mormon) Genealogical Society in Salt Lake City, Utah, have filmed all of the county courthouse records of the state of Mississippi within the past two years. Your editors December visit brought this to light. Mrs. Rayborn has already contributed the marriages. Now we begin to present all Hollingsworth deeds. The Courthouse burned in 1876, destroying all records. At the present time, the recent building has been razed and a new one is under construction. Isaac Hollingsworth (1780-1866) the progenitor of most of these people listed below, gave the land where this building stands, long before the Civil War.

It should be noted that many residents of the county brought in their original deeds and had them re-recorded. This is proved by the references made in the records themselves. The fire occurred Sept. 18, 1876.

F-15 Personnel Profile, from North American Rockwell NEWS, issue Sept. 26, 1969, Volume 29, Number 39, page 4 (weekly). (Pardon some sort of nepotism: this is the brother of your editor.)

"Here's the airplane, now how are you going to put it together?" This is how John Hollingsworth sums up the situation he walked into last January when he was transferred from the Space Division to LAD's F-15 Program as development manager for Fabrication and Assembly.

"What was involved was dissecting the airplane and breaking it down in a manner that would return the most cost effective methods of tooling philosophy, fabrication techniques, and assembly methods," says Hollingsworth. According to the 31-year veteran of North American Rockwell projects, a major concern of his Manufacturing group's effort has been the effective application of NR's total manufacturing resources to the F-15 task.

While at Seal Beach, Hollingsworth was manager of final systems installation and tooling for the Saturn S-11 rocket project. He originally began his career with NR in 1938 as an employee in Manufacturing sub-assembly. He served as Manufacturing manager of the X-15A-2

John and Henry - the Two Backsliders!

Two of Valentine Hollingsworth's sons, John and Henry, turned away from their father's Quaker faith. John was converted to the Welsh Baptists, somewhere around 1712. Descendants went to what is now Cumberland County, North Carolina. (See HR for Sept. 1969.) His eldest half brother, Henry, returned to the church of his ancestors, the Protestant Episcopal Church, American name of the Established Church. Below are two notices we found in the Acts of the Privy Council of England, Colonial Series, dealing with them.

A. Address of the Inhabitants of the County of Salem, in New Jersey, to Governor Hunter, Jan. 1, 1712, signed by many persons, including John Hollingsworth. (His wife, Catherine Tyler's parents, lived in that county.) (Vol. 1711-12, page 189.)

B. Minister and Vestry of St. Paul's Church, Chester, Pennsylvania, to the Bishop of London - Chester, March 25, 1706. Henry Nicols, Minister, in a complaint against the Quakers. (!) Also signing was Henry Hollingsworth. (Vol 1706-8, page 168.) Your editor would like to find the parish register or vestry minute book for this church. So far, no luck. Why did Henry turn so passionately against his own father's faith? Or was he obliged to sign against his will?

From the Old Home Farm

Some time back your editor attempted to get in touch with a Mr. John O'Brien, of Gorey. He is the present owner of the farm called Ballinakill which was the home of our Hollingsworths from at least 1746. He did not answer. We did, however, obtain nice letters from the present owners of the former Hollingsworth farms in Illinois and Iowa. The first letter here is from the owner of the farm which was originally granted by the U.S. Government to Frederick Hollingsworth in 1839, but sold by him in 1856, to David S. Penfield. The second letter is from the owner of the farm bought by Frederick's wife, Elizabeth (Brown) Hollingsworth, in 1861, in Independence township, Jasper County, Iowa. She exchanged this farm for her husband's farm in New Milford township, Winnebago County, Illinois, to John H. Edwards. It will be nice to visit these farms and meet the people one day.

Dear Mr Hollingsworth:

We received your most interesting letter regarding our farm but due to an illness which has kept me in bed for the past five weeks, I have been unable to obtain the information you ask for. As soon as I am able, I shall pick up the abstract and read it to see if there is anything in it which would be of any interest to you.

We have never been able to locate a grave here on the farm, but a neighbor, Julius Anderson, whose farm is located between here and Cherry Valley says there was evidence of at least two graves on their farm. We have asked him to check with some Cherry Valley residents to see if they might know anything about these graves.

This road we live on has been called Penfield Road as far back as we can recall, but about four years ago someone on the County Road Committee decided to change it to Linden Road without consulting any of the residents who live in this vicinity.

The barn on this farm was constructed of hand hewn logs and has been kept in good condition but wouldn't have any idea what year it was built. However, we are going to get in touch with some of the older residents in the neighborhood and will write you again.

We have just finished building a new home on the corner of Perryville Road and Linden Road which is about two blocks south of the farmstead.

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth

You are correct that Dave Allspach owns the southwest quarter of Section one in Independence Township, Jasper County. The farm is now 140 acres and is all tillable. There has never been a sign of a graveyard on the place. There are several small cemeteries around here. Some have been disposed of and farmed over. We have been unsuccessful in finding any with the name of Frederick Hollingsworth on a stone.

There are no old barns or house on the property. Everything on the farm was built by Mrs. David (Anna Sanderman) Allspach's parents. The soil is Tama Muscatine, and very average farmland for this part of the country. It is all rolling land, cleared for crop. There is no wooded area on the farm.

There is just one piece of land we use for pasture that we think is prairie that has never been broken. Road was put from mud to gravel and widened in 1948 and 1949. In 1876 a school house was built on the west side of the road in Section 2, and went until 1940. It was torn down in 1950 and just this spring the highway commission widened the corner. We had hay there this year.

A word about Mr Allspach. He bought the farm from his wife's parents' estate in 1931. They have one son (Richard) who farms the farm, and also owns Section 2 on the west side of the road. Richard (writer is Richard's wife: Editor) is married and has a daughter.

Mrs Allspach died very suddenly in 1969 and Dave has been living alone since. He is 81 years old and still going strong. He is very healthy and is hauling the corn in from the field and runs the 2-row corn picker, besides plants all the corn.

I'm sorry I was so long getting you an answer. If you have any questions, please let us know. Also, when we go to the bank we will check the deed to see if the farm has your relatives name on it.

Note by Editor: Elizabeth Hollingsworth, Fred's widow, sold the above farm in two parts, in 1872, and moved to the town of Kellogg, Iowa, where she died twenty years later. Therefore, she had moved four years before the old schoolhouse was built, and Dave Allspach was born in 1891, the year before she died. The reason for this letter was to make one last desperate attempt to find Frederick's grave. The letter written to the Hartwigs in 1962 had a similar aim. We thought perhaps he had been returned to Illinois for burial. But with all of our work of 14 years, we have never proved: his date and place of birth, his parents or his brothers and sisters names, or his place of burial. (Good circumstantial evidence for part of this data, only.) Pretty bad score, no? Yes! The Hollingsworths were not clannish. Wherever we find them they seem to be separating, moving out by ones to distant parts. No wonder so much history is lost. (This is not a reference to Valentine Hollingsworth's family, but to the County Wexford family only.) Unless some miraculous records turn up, what hope is there to learn these simple facts about Frederick Hollingsworth?

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth,

During the course of my genealogical research, I have worked on innumerable Hollingsworth groups. Having a low threshold for frustration, I have been happy to see that the problems with most of these lines have been resolved. However, others have me utterly baffled. In this connection, I would like to outline what I know about some of the more obstinate lines. I would appreciate your printing this sketch in a future issue of the Hollingsworth Register, with any annotations that come to mind, in the hope that some of your readers can clear away some of the cobwebs.

1. The Hollingsworths of Edgefield County, South Carolina. According to Stewart's book, the Edgefield Hollingsworths begin with James Hollingsworth, who came "from Winchester, Virginia, about 1786, and settled in the Meeting Street District of Edgefield County, S.C. He left one brother in Virginia, another went to North Carolina, a third to Ohio, a fourth to Kentucky, and one to Mississippi." James married Agnes Evans and died in 1821. Based upon the 1800 Census for Edgefield County, James was born before 1755. This is confirmed by the fact that his eldest child was born in 1773. I have checked the Winchester (Frederick County), Virginia, (area) for James and have come up emptyhanded.

Editor's comment: So did I, years ago. There were Quaker Hollingsworths in that area (Frederick County, Va.) from Valentine. But this James was no Quaker. He and his descendants owned slaves, one member owning the largest number ever held by a Hollingsworth to our knowledge. (John Hollingsworth of Edgefield had 77 slaves in 1830 -HR 2:115 S.C. line 8.) The names Alexander, James, John, while used in some cases by Val's family, were also used by the family of County Down, in Ireland. This is just a thought, in case the tradition of coming from Virginia falls flat. If James had a brother going to Ohio in 1786 it makes him one of the originals, and this doesn't hold water.

2. The Hollingsworths of Shenandoal Co., Virginia. George Hollingsworth of Shenandoah County was born between 1775 and 1795 and died in 1829. He had children named Barbara Catharine, Mary, Jane, Susan, George, James, and Amanda Jane. He is supposed to have had a brother named Jonah and is reputed to be a descendant of Abraham³, of Thomas², of Valentine. Most of the family later moved to Vigo Co. Indiana. Other than an entry in the 1820 Census for Shenandoah County, (HR 2:61, Va. 1820 Census, items 3 and 13. George had a slave-Ed.) I have not found any confirmation to family tradition.

3. The Hollingsworths of Dauphin County, Pennsylvania. This line was brought to my attention in the Hollingsworth Register (Vol. VII, page 158). According to this biography, Levi Hollingsworth came to Dauphin County from Philadelphia. The 1810 Census indicates that Levi was born before 1765. (HR 1:165 Penna. 1810 item 11-Ed.) Levi

was married three times, siring 8 children by the first marriage and 3 more by the second one. The given names in this group are reminiscent of those found in the Zebulon³ of Henry² of Valentine line.

4. The Hollingsworths of Cannon County, Tennessee. Apparently, the progenitors of this line are two brothers, Peter and John. Both brothers were born in Virginia, Peter in 1793 and (John in) 1788. Peter's wife was named Mary while John was married to Elizabeth. Before coming to Cannon County, they probably lived in Wilson County. Using their children's birth as a yardstick, it would appear that John and Peter settled in Tennessee no later than 1816.

Editor's note: See HR, vol. 5, pages 54 and 55, for the 1850 census schedules on this family. Also, for 1840, see Vol. 3, p. 56, Tenn. items 15, 16, and 19. At that time, John was in Cannon County, but Peter was in Wilson County. A letter from Mrs. Doris Davis, 1222 Hill, Hannibal, Missouri, 63401, Mar 20, 1967, contained the following brief gleanings under "Early Tennessee Marriages" from the Orlando Public Library, Orlando, Florida:

Lebanon, Wilson Co., Tenn.

1810 William Hollandworth and Jensey Walker, Witnesses, James and William Hollandsworth.

1821 March 19. Peter Hollansworth and Polly Miller. Wit: James Knight.

1825 Isaac Hollandsworth and Allimenta Justin. Wit: William Hollandsworth.

1827 Ranney Hollandsworth and Joel Fustin. Wit: Isaac Hollandsworth.

n.d. _____ Hollinsworth and Minnie Fant.

There is a William Hollingsworth, 26-45, with 10 in his family listed in the 1820 census of Wilson County, page 383 (HR 2:60) who may fit into this puzzle.

5. The Hollingsworths of Grainger County, Tennessee. According to Mrs. Pearl Nicley of Washburn, Tenn. this family came to Tenn. from the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. Ann Hollingsworth (her maiden name) married _____ Hollingsworth. Ann's husband died in Virginia and she came to Knox County, Tennessee with her only child, William. William was born between 1800 and 1815 in Virginia and died in 1898 in Grainger County. Although this branch is rich in family tradition, I am having a devil of a time verifying it.

6. The Hollingsworths of Patrick County, Virginia. This Southside Virginia family seems to stem from Thomas Hollingsworth, Sr. According to the 1830 census, Thomas was born between 1740 and 1750. He died during the 1830s. He had at least two sons, James, born in 1770, and Thomas, Jr., born between 1770 and 1780. There may also have been a son named William. Much of this family moved to West Virginia after the Civil War.

Editor: I always thought this family came from the Maryland bunch, no relation to Valentine, because three of them served in the Revolutionary War from this area. Before that date, an aged William, of

Pittsylvania County, parent county to Patrick County, and to Henry County, where some of this family also dwelt, was mentioned in some kind of court records. This might be the place to look, too, for the Edgefield Hollingsworth progenitor, just in case!

7. Joel Hollingsworth of Vermillion County, Indiana. He was born in South Carolina on Nov. 25, 1801, and died in 1875. In 1820, he married Lydia Sprague in Franklin County, Indiana. I have been working on the assumption that Joel is the brother of Enoch Hollingsworth, who was living in Union County, Indiana, in 1850, and is the son of George⁶, of Abraham⁵, of George⁴, Abraham³ Thomas², Valentine. It should be noted that George's brother Levi also lived in Vermillion County, Ind.

This list of course does not even begin to exhaust the Hollingsworth lines that are still badly snarled by missing records or in sufficient interest. If anyone has any information or thoughts about one of these branches of the family, I would appreciate their contacting me.

Who Was Val's Mother?

The other day it dawned on us: Was Valentine Hollingsworth named after his mother's maiden surname? We know that Valentine was born in August, 1632, at Ballyvickcrannell, Seagoe Parish, Co Armagh, Ireland, only known child of Henry Hollinworth (or Hollingsworth) and Katherine his wife. One story says she was a Cornish, daughter of Henry Cornish, High Sheriff of London. That is balderdash. (Another version says Valentine's first wife was Catherine Cornish, which has been debunked.) This doesn't mean her surname wasn't Cornish, however. There were Quakers in America named Cornish. For a long time we speculated that her son's name was a family name, since we found a Valentine Hollingworth living in Claypole, Lincolnshire, in the late 1500s who died in 1627 there. But what about the usual factor in those times, where children bore their maternal parent's surname? Could Henry Hollinworth's wife be Katherine Valentine?

In the south of Ireland in the 1600-1700 period, there was a Quaker family named Valentine. Our searches into early County Armagh and other nearby county surviving records have turned up no Valentine family so far. However, over in Lancashire, in the parish of Eccles, there was a moderately large family of Valentine, as evidenced by the number of wills in Chester Diocese, and the published parish registers which start in 1564. Two Katherine (Catherine) Vallentynes were baptised there, in the 1590s, and one was married in 1619. Although neither of these persons is probably the mother of the Irish born Hollingsworth, it is interesting to note that a Hollinworth family also lived in Eccles Parish, and one Hugh was born there in the late 1500s. Remember a Hugh Hollinworth served in the Dublin army in 1643.

The Arklow Hollingsworth Family
(Part Five from Vol. 7 p. 151)

GENERATION FOUR - CONTINUED

Thomas⁴ Hollingsworth, 4th son of John³ Hollingsworth of Rock Big, Arklow Parish, County Wicklow, Ireland (of Daniel², of Samuel.) He was born about 1809/10, at Cronelusk, in that parish, and died in 1890 or early 1891, at his farm in Escott Township, Leeds County, Ontario, Canada, aged about 80 years. He is possibly buried nearby in the Mallorytown Cemetery. This information hasn't come to light.

He married, Nov. 9, 1833, at Lambs Pond, Ontario, by Rev. William H. Gunning, Anglican Missionary for the Johnstown District, Margaret Carberry, parentage unknown. (See HR 7:33) She was born about 1817 in Ireland, and died before her husband. She was living in 1871 according to the census. It is possible that the following records pertain to her parents:

"James Carberry, of Glinstown*, Parish of Motehill*, County Waterford, with 2 females. He has two brothers, Thomas and John Carberry, residing at Glinstown aforesaid, and he is known to Richard Wilson, Esquire, of said place." (Colonial Office records, 384, Irish Emigration to British North America, Vol. 13, page 113. Applicants, 1829. From Record Office, London, film copy (B-885) in Dominion Archives, Ottawa.) These applicants are among hundreds of others who were asking the British Government to provide a free passage for them to Canada. This surname is sufficiently unusual, in Ireland and in Canada, to warrant our presentation of this evidence here. (*Glenstown, Mothel!)

Thomas Hollingsworth himself was a bachelor upon his arrival in Upper Canada. That must have been about 1832. We assume he came out with his two brothers, Samuel and Daniel, of whom, only Samuel was at that time married. Until we located the above marriage, we had assumed this arrival to be about 1836.

One of the nine sons of John Hollingsworth of Arklow Parish was under-gamekeeper for Lord Carysfort. It seems that the head gamekeeper was making a practice of selling off the game on the estate. The crime was uncovered, but the culprit was able to place the blame on young Hollingsworth, and he was fired immediately. He then emigrated. This sorry state of affairs was communicated to us by our cousin Mrs. Maria (Hollingsworth) Hollingsworth, Coolanearl, Red Cross, County Wicklow, in her 1964 letters to your editor. This young man could very well be our subject, Thomas Hollingsworth.

Thomas was a farmer. He held a good farm of 100 acres in the south half of Lot Number 14, Concession Number 1, of Escott Township. Several transactions were made on this land. (HR 6:40; 7:84) In 1845, he built a flatted log house on the property, according to the census schedules of 1851 and 1861. (HR 1:189, 190.)

The family belonged to the Anglican Church, the Canadian counterpart of the Church of Ireland. Several of the children were baptized on Feb. 19, 1862, at Gananoque by Rev. John Carroll (HR 2:164). This probably is because the church was served by missionaries at that time and it was difficult to arrange a ceremony. On the other hand, the

eldest child baptized at that time, was fifteen. Inexplicably, of the six children born to Thomas and Margaret, and living in their teenage, only one, the youngest, Thomas James Hollingsworth, seems to have survived. Thomas, the father, made his will April 8, 1890. It was proved by the oath of the witness, (nephew William James Hollingsworth) March 31, 1891. He gave his 100 acres in Lot 14 to his son Thomas James, as well as his personal property. He made him his executor too. Thomas signed the will marking his x. (See the full copy in HR 4:173.) C.K.Hughes was the other witness - perhaps a relative for the Hughes family was related in Arklow, Ireland, in some way. Maybe Thomas' mother was one.

- 1) Mary Ann⁵, born about 1838. Living in 1861.
- 2) John L.⁵, born about 1840. Ditto.

- 4) Margaret Jane⁵, born about 1847, bapt. Feb. 19, 1862, as described above. Married, Mar. 23, 1868, Albert Landon. (HR 2:164.)
- 5) Ellen⁵, born 1849. Living 1861.
- 6) Thomas James⁵, born May 12, 1846/7? (See HR 7:155) Died Aug. 28, 1915, Front of Yonge, Leeds County, aged '55 years.' (He was probably nearer 70. See HR 7:34 for death certificate.) He married, about 1884, Ellen Jane Stennett, born May, 1862, died May 18, 1907. They had the following children:

(5) Richard Hollingworth, of Calverley, 1557.

In the name of God Amen: The xxijth day of August in the year of our Lord god 1557. I Richarde Hollingworthe, of Cau'ley, seke of body and hooll and pfect of mynde and remembrance, thanks be vnto God, doth ordayne and maike this my last wyll and testament in maner and forme folowinge. Fyrst and pryncypally I comende my soull vnto allmyghtye God my creator, to Jesu Chryste my Redemer, to our lady St Mary and to all the holy and blessed company of heauen, and my body to be buryed wthin the pyshe churche yerde of Calu'ly aforesaid. Also I will that my goods be devided in iij equall pts, whereof one pte I giue vnto Jennett my wyffe. The seconde equall pte I giue vnto Richerd, Willm, Thomas, Nicholas, Robert and Margaret, my chyldren, equally to be devided amongs them, and the thyrde equall pte I res've vnto my selfe and to brynge me furthe, and that whiche dothe remayne of my said thyrde p'te, I beinge honestlye brought furthe, I gyue and bequeathe vnto Margarett my doughter. Also I ordayne and maike Jennett my wyffe, Richard, Willm, Thomas, Nicholas, Robert, and Margaret, my chyldren, to be executors of this my last will. Thes wytness's, John Mosse, Thomas Haire, and John Myers. Proved 27 April 1558, by the widow. Grant reserved to the chyldren. (Register of Wills in York Registry, Vol. XV. ij, folio 191 a. printed in the Thorsby Society, Vol. 27, pp. 153-154, as part of "Leeds & District - Testamenta Leodiensia.") See HR 5:8, item 9 for his son Nicholas' will - 1584. NOTE: The third part which testator mentions was called "the dead's parte," used to conduct the expenses of a decent funeral and burial, which often provided bread, cakes, and drink for the attenders!

(21) William Hollingworth, St. Nicholas, Nottingham, Weaver 1594.

IN DEI NOIE AMEN, The xith day of June the yeere of our Lord god one Thowsand fyve hundreth Nyentie and fower, I Willm Hollingworth of the parish of St. Nicholas in Nottingham weaver being of good minde and pfect memorie make my last will in maner and forme following ffirst I bequeath my soule to Almightye god and my bodie to be buried in the church yeard of St. Nicholas in Nottingham, and my funerall expences and all my debts or dwties wch I ow to anie pson or psons whatsoever be well and truelie contented and paid of my whole goodes by myne executors hereafter named. And after my debts paid and funerall expences pformed I giue and bequeath to John Bowman and Agnes his wief my daughter, the lease of my house wch I now dwell in after my death. Itm. I geve vnto Marie his daughter the best fether bed I haue, one bolster two pillowes, two pillow beeres, one paire of meedling sheetes, one paire of blancketts one Cou'lett of the best and one flaxon sheet. Itm I geue vnto Ellin Bowman his daughter, one fetherbed one bolster, two pillowes two pillow beeres one paire of meedling sheetes one paire of blancketts one of the better sort and one other of the worse one Coverlet and one flaxon sheet and to eith^r of his forenamed daughters either of them two napkins and either of them one of the best Coffers I haue, either of them one of the best bedsteads I haue, and either of them one of the best framed tables I haue, either of them one pann, either of them one pot either of them one hanging kettle, and either of them two pewther dishes, all of the best. Item I geue and bequeath to Richard Bowman and Willm Bowman his sonnes either of them one ewe and a lambe either of them a litle round table and either of them a Coffe

and all necessities I haue belonging to myne occupation. Itm. I geve and bequeath and my will is that if anie of his forenamed children do die before they be married, to the rest wch do remaine living, to haue all wch I haue geuen and bequeathed equallie devided. Itm I geue and bequeath vnto my daughter Alice Deane one mattres one bolster one paire of blancketts better and worse one paire of hempen sheetes one best Coverlet. I haue two execepted and I geue vnto her sixe yeards of Danist Russet to make her a gowme, one hat, one patlet, one apron, Itm I geue vnto Isabell her daughter VS And all the rest of my goodes vnbequeathed I geue vnto John Bowman and Agnes his wief, except one drincking cloth one brasen chafindish of brasse wch I geue to his daughter Ellen Bowman, and I make the said John Bowman and Agnes his wief my lawfull executors of this my will and testament, and I make & ordaine Oliver Bradshaw and Willm Oldham overseers to see that this my will be fulfilled, and for their paines I geue and bequeath to them iij s iiij d. Witnesses to this my will John Lambe pson Oliver Bradshaw Willm Oldham. Eisdem die et Anno dcus decanus cert de approbacion huius testi p testiony Willm Oldham testis in dco testo iurat uir etc. (John Bowman sworn Executor, saving the right of Agnes his wife.) York Wills, Vol. 26, folio 20. See HR 5:7.
