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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingsworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), a Holly bush, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingsworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London, and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

Will of Henry Hollingsworth of Peoria, Illinois

Thanks to our correspondent, Mrs. Jane Gear of Littleton, Colorado, we can give you a transcript of the original will. This Henry is found on page 76 of Stewart's 1925 "Descendants of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr." He is six generations down, through John (who married Rachel Wright)⁵, George⁴, Abraham³, Thomas², Valentine. He was married five times; to Ada Skinner, Leah Littleton, Maria Sachel, Eliza Aberly and Phoebe Beecher. Mrs. Gear is working on the family. If you can help her, especially with the family of Jonah Littleton Hollingsworth, child of the second marriage, contact her at 3715 E. Easter Circle South, Littleton, Colorado 80122.

I Henry Hollingsworth of the County of Peoria, State of Illinois, do hereby make and declare this my last will and testament, in manner and form following, towit,

First, It is my will that my funeral expences and all my just debts be fully paid,

Second, After the payment of such funeral expences and debts, I give, devise, and bequeath unto my beloved wife Phebe Hollingsworth all my personal property of every Kind and description, consisting of household furniture, horses, cattle, hogs, Carriages, wagons, harness, farming implements, grain on hand, grain in the ground, together with all and every thing known as personal property, to her, her heirs and assigns forever, and I further give, devise, and bequeath unto my said beloved wife Phebe Hollingsworth the farm on which we now reside, situate in said County and Known and described as follows, towit, The East half of the North East quarter of Section Ten (10) the East half of the South East quarter of Section Ten (10) and part of the South East Quarter of Section Three (3) all in Township Eight (8) North of Range Six (6) East of the fourth principal meridian during her natural life, or so long as she remains my widow, and at her death the said farm shall be sold at public sale, after giving due notice of such sale, by my executor hereinafter named on such terms for payment as he may think (page 2 - Editor) best, but at least one fourth of the purchase money shall be cash, and out of said purchase money he shall first pay to my Son Jonah L. Hollingsworth the sum of One Thousand Dollars, and the balance of said purchase money shall be divided into eight equal shares, and shall be paid by my Executor as follows, towit, to my son Richard H. Hollingsworth, one share, to my son Lawson D. Hollingsworth one share to my daughter Harriett E. Thomas one share, to my daughter Sarah Ann Glasscock one share, to my daughter Mary Jane Crook one share, to my son Jonah L. Hollingsworth one share, to my son Warner L. Hollingsworth one share, and to my daughter Martha Ellen McIntire one share.

And lastly, I hereby constitute and appoint John A. M'Coy of the City of Peoria, County and state aforesaid Executor of this my last will and testament revoking and annulling all former wills by me made, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament.

In witness whereof, I the said Henry Hollingsworth have hereunto set my hand and seal this thirtieth day of July 1866.

Codicil: I Henry Hollingsworth being of sound and disposing mind and memory do make and publish this codicil to my last will and testament made and published by me dated July 30 1866 and witnessed by Alexander Allison and John C. Proctor.

Item Instead and in lieu of the sum of one thousand dollars devised and bequeathed in my said last will and Testament in Item second thereof to my son Jonah L. Hollingsworth I do hereby devise said sum of one thousand dollars to my Executor John A. McCoy and that said Executor loan said one thousand dollars out when good security and that my said Executor pay the interest accruing thereon to the said Jonah L. Hollingsworth during his natural life and that when the death of my said son Jonah L. Hollingsworth (sic) my said Executor shall pay over to my heirs at law the principal of said sum of one thousand dollars, to be divided equally among them, including in said division the children of said Jonah L. Hollingsworth. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and (page 2 - Ed.) and seal this Sixteenth day of September A.D. 1868

Other documents in the file:

(1) Affidavit of Decease (printed form, filled up in handwriting) by Phebe Hollingsworth, dated Jan. 20, 1872, stating that Henry Hollingsworth late of the Town of Logan in the County of Peoria departed this life at his home in said County, on or about the 16th day of January A.D. 1872. (Signed by signature.)

(2) Bond of Executor (same) April Term of County Court, 1872. John A. McCoy as principal and John B. Smith as Security, sum of Two Thousand dollars, John A. McCoy as Executor of said will, etc.

(3) Petition (same) by John A. McCoy, for Letters Testamentary, stating the date of death of testator, leaving wife Phebe Hollingsworth as his widow and "the persons named in the will" as his children and heirs at law. (The full names ought to have appeared here on four ledger lines provided) Dated May 7, 1872.

(4) Oath of witnesses (same) by A. Allison and John C. Proctor, the witnesses to the will, giving date, etc. Dated Jan. 20, 1872.

(5) Oath of Executor, May 7, 1872, by John A. McCoy, etc.

(6) Probate of Will. Jan. 20, 1872, by Dr. Joseph C. Frye and H. Grove as to codicil of said will, dated 16 Sept. 1868 etc.

(7) Letter Testamentary in County Court April Term 1872, stating date of Henry Hollingsworth's death, appointment of John A. McCoy of Peoria, as Executor named in the will, issuance to him of said letter. Dated May 7th, 1872.

We publish this calendar to illustrate what a testamentary file in Illinois probate records contains in that period a hundred years ago Legislation can change, and this may not be illustrative of a file in

earlier or later periods. See our editorial for more Illinois news.

Mrs. Gear also informs HR that she found following burial records from Springdale Cemetery, Peoria:

Charles Merrick Hollingsworth, died March 11, 1941 (age 68).

Minnie (his 2nd wife) Hollingsworth died July 24, 1936.

Infant son died March 17, 1915. Sarah died April 9, 1926.

Charles is a son of Jonah L. Hollingsworth.

Phoebe Beecher Hollingsworth April 24, 1805 - July 23, 1893
Buried Christ Episcopal Church, Sec 4, Limestone Township, Peoria County.

Mrs. Gear also sent us file on Phoebe Hollingsworth estate, giving again her death date as above, except on July 26, 1893. M. S. Beecher is appointed Administrator. Administrator's bond, dated 13 Oct 1893, shows the name is Moses S. Beecher. Mary F. Beecher and Edith J. Beecher also sign. The Petition shows Phoebe died at Hanna City in the County, and was of Logan Township at the time of her death on the 26th of July. She left no husband, and M. S. Beecher, A.H. Beecher, Louisa A. Dimorest of Peoria and Mrs. Angeline H. Stear as her only heirs at law. Moses S. Beecher was her son. Therefore, Beecher was her former married name.

There is also a file in the estate of Laura C. Hollingsworth, the petition dated June 20, 1903, by Jessie Waldecker, showing Laura C. to be the wife of Jonah L. Hollingsworth, a survivor, with said Jessie Waldecker, Alice Cox, William and Charlie Hollingsworth, children.

Henry Hollingsworth's son Richard H. Hollingsworth has a sketch in HR 7:109. See his headstone inscription in same volume, page 55.

Albert A. Hollingsworth

Albert A. Hollingsworth is a native of Hendricks County, Indiana, born Dec. 7, 1844, a son of Mersey N. and Mary A. Hollingsworth, his father a native of Ohio and his mother of Pennsylvania. There were twelve children in his father's family, nine of whom are living — Asbury S., Albert A., John T., Samuel J., Mersey M., Maria L., Mary E., Sally A., and Emily J. Albert A. Hollingsworth was reared and educated in his native township. In July, 1862, he enlisted in the Fifty-fourth Indiana Infantry for three months, and was discharged the following September. In February, 1865, he enlisted in the One Hundred and Forty-eighth Indiana Infantry, and served till the close of the war. He was assigned duty at Columbia and Pulaski, Tenn. After his return home he gave his attention to agricultural pursuits, at which he has been successful. In 1876 he located on his present farm, where he owns 155 acres of valuable land, all under cultivation. April 13, 1869, he married Fidelia B. C. Towles, daughter of Robert and Harriet A. Towles. To them have been born six children — Harriet A., Ira A., Albert A., Nettie M., and an infant deceased. Mr. and Mrs. Hollingsworth are members of the Baptist church at Plainfield. (From History of Hendricks County, Indiana, 1885, page 743, Washington Township.)

The Mystery of New Lisbon, Pennsylvania Solved!

or,
You, Too, Can Solve Your Most Vexing Genealogical Problems If You Keep
At it Long Enough, Live Long Enough, Or Get a Friend to Help You Do It.

In our issue of June, 1966 (HR 2:47) I gave you my agonized howls about all the problems which stopped my research into the Brown family. To be very brief: Frederick Hollingsworth was married to Elizabeth, a daughter of Jacob Brown. At that time, after nearly seven years of intensive research, I had utterly failed to (1) find the correct birthplace of Jacob ... "New Jersey or New York" (2) find the names of his parents (3) his brothers and sisters, (4) the name of his first wife - my ancestor, or (5) the birthplace of his daughter Elizabeth! Well, seven more years have passed, and one of those problems or mysteries has been solved, I hope! It is Number Five. I think I know where Elizabeth Brown was born. May I call it a step in the right direction? You see, genealogists are taught to go from the known into the unknown. The fifth problem would be the proper first step backward. Backward into research in the past, I mean.

In her own family record, published in her obituary (HR 1:42), Elizabeth wrote her birthdate and place "June 20, 1820, in New Lisbon, Pennsylvania." But I searched every gazetteer and atlas I could find, many Pennsylvania county histories, and even consulted the State Library and the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania, before I was forced to the conclusion I once voiced in these columns, to-wit "There never was such a place in Pennsylvania." But, Oh, Dear Reader ... there was! It is good to be wrong sometimes. Here I was, thinking Dear Elizabeth didn't know where she was born ... maybe thought New Lisbon, Columbiana County, Ohio, (now Lisbon) was in Pennsylvania, or maybe she meant the New Lisbon in Otsego Co., New York, Burlington Co., New Jersey, or near Washington, D.C. in Maryland. But I was wrong. The old girl knew.

I didn't solve this problem. My friends in genealogy did. Oh, yes, I wrote the last letter which led to the double documented proof of it. But without help, it would never have been solved.

Tri-State Trader, a nationally known newspaper on hobbies, published in Knightstown, Indiana 46148, publishes queries and other articles in its Genealogy section. A few weeks ago, I was absolutely floored to see a query titled "New Lisbon, Pa." A lady in West Palm Beach, Florida, was asking what I had asked! The staff answered with the same information I had, that there never was such an animal, and it might be the Ohio town which was meant. But the querist had quoted a biography which listed this place in Penna., as the birthplace of the mother. Now the answer didn't make sense any more. Here were two people born in the early 1800s claiming to be born there. Would both be so bewildered about their own place of birth as to mistake the state? No. I then not only wrote Tri-State Trader, but a gentleman in Pennsylvania who is an authority on the western portion of the state. This man I have not known many years, and consequently didn't think to resurrect the old question and ask him before this. His answer came back ringing: "Sherman Day's Historical Collections of Pennsylvania (1843) page 361, says Carmichaelstown, now Carmichaels (Cumberland Township, Greene County,) was once

New Lisbon." And so it was. I re-checked the 1888 History of Greene County for Carmichaels. No mention of the older name. But the Horn Papers, a well known but supposedly partly fictitious work, which I had failed to check, shows that the site was first settled in the 1780 period, by a man named Abraham Lisbon. It was then called Old Lisbon, but became New Lisbon by 1804, name discontinued about 1830 when Carmichaels was founded. Curiously enough, to my everlasting shame, a lady wrote to me in 1965, who had done Brown research for me in Ohio, telling me she thought Carmichaels was once called "Lisbon." I did re-check that but of course, failed to find any confirmation.

Years ago I searched the entire state of Pennsylvania in the 1820 Federal Census, noting down every Jacob Brown listed. None of them fit with facts I know about my man. Naturally, after this momentous find, I searched Greene again. No Jacob! If Elizabeth was born June 20, of that census year, it stands to reason Jacob should be listed. So, you see, I'm still being cheated. One possible: Elizabeth was wrong about the year. Poor Eliza! I just don't seem to trust her, do I? But you see, in the 1850 census, she gave her age as 32, and in 1860, as 41. The 1850 is taken as of June 1st, age next birthday; the 1860 as of June 1st, age at last birthday. That indicates she was born June 20, 1819! Plenty of time for Jacob's departure. In her husband's estate papers, April, 1869, she listed her age as 49. Again, the evidence is substantial. The family record might be altered. The date is not perfectly clear - let me make that perfectly clear. A "20" could be over "19".

But another clue is rising Phoenix-like from the ashes of attempt. One John Brown of Centre Township, Morgan County, Ohio, wrote his will in 1841. He named wife Mary and gave her all his property, except one dollar each to his four children, John, Jacob, Sarah and Christina! Although I never could be sure that this means my Jacob, I eliminated most of the other Jacobs around there. This John was over eighty in the 1840 census enumeration. This is the same township where my Jacob's second wife, Mary Ann Keith, lived in 1825 when they were married. And John Brown turns up in tax lists the previous year. The will was witnessed by James R. Ball and Robert Blackledge. Both of these men are representatives of Quaker families, though they were not members, and, (now for the big clue) the Blackledges came from Bucks County, Penna., and first stopped in Jefferson Township, Greene County, Penna., only a couple of miles from New Lisbon! This James R. Ball and this Robert Blackledge also first turn up around 1825 in Morgan County, Ohio.

Yes, I consider that a major clue. But was John Brown a disowned Quaker of English descent? Some of the family claim my Jacob was a Swiss. There were English Quaker Browns and German descent Browns in the area! The name of Jacob was used by both! The Quaker Browns were coming from Loudon County, Virginia, on their way to Ohio. But the German Browns were the descendants of one Wendell Brown who had come to Washington County, Pennsylvania even prior to the Revolution. His descendants were very numerous, both in Greene County, Pa., and in Monongalia County, Virginia (now in West Virginia). The names in his family include Adam, Jacob, John, Michael, Christina, Mary, Sarah, Catherine, etc., which are almost all of those names used by Jacob - my Jacob - in his 15 children set. They are also the names used in the Keith family. The Wendell Brown family were Disciples (Campbellites). So was my Elizabeth and most of her family. Now where do I look?

Incidentally, in the next Tri-State Trader, a correspondent sent her information, that she had once received deeds from Greene County Recorder, wherein the descriptions mentioned New Lisbon, Pennsylvania, and upon writing to the County Historical Society - something I never did, sorry - they told her the news.

Eli Hollingsworth of Grant County, Indiana

Eli Hollingsworth is one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of Grant County, Indiana, and is a prosperous farmer of Franklin township. He was born in Darke county, Ohio Nov. 13, 1822 to Isaac and Jane (Coppock) Hollingsworth. The father was born in North Carolina but moved to Ohio at an early day and in 1837 located in Grant County, Indiana, near the Soldier's Home. He purchased 160 acres of land upon which he lived until his death in 1878 at the advanced age of eighty years. His wife had died in 1863. He was an earnest Quaker and held the office of elder in the church for many years, and was a man who was honored and looked up to. (See pp. 117, 118.)

Eli Hollingsworth was one of 10 children, 5 sons and 5 daughters and was a lad of 14 when his parents located here. He acquired a common school education having to walk one mile to school, which was a long building whose light was obtained through greased paper set into the building where a log had been omitted.

He remained on the home farm until his 22nd year, when he was married and moved on the farm now owned by Henry Shugart. He owned this farm and lived there 6 years when he went to Wabash county and engaged in farming several years, returning finally to take charge of the old homestead and care for his father until the latter's death. In 1897 he moved to his present location where he owns 130 acres in partnership with his son in law John Wilson. 115 acres are under cultivation, a large amount of stock and farm produce being raised each year.

Mr. Hollingsworth has been a Republican since the organization of the party, but has never been an aspirant for political honors. He is a member of the Quaker church and an Elder for a great many years. He was married at the age of twenty-two to Miss Hulda Jones, who bore him 10 children, six of whom survive her, viz: Mary Jane, wife of Isaac Crompton; Rachel, wife of John Wilson; Amanda, wife of Allen Unthank, superintendent of the Soldier's Home farm; Ruth, wife of Stephen Curry; Margaret, wife of Alfred Osborn, who conducts a blacksmith shop in Marion; and Clara, wife of William Retliff. Mr. Hollingsworth chose as his second wife Mrs. Mary Malott, widow of Hiram Malott, and daughter of John and Lydia Pearson. His third alliance was with Miss Mary J. Peebles, who is the present Mrs. Hollingsworth, a lady whose pleasing manner makes her a favorite in the social and home circle.

Deceased was born at Chadd's Ford and came to West Chester about 17 years ago. His son, J. K. Hollingsworth, who is at Cape May, was telegraphed for and will arrive here this evening. (Daily Local News, West Chester, Pa., June 24, 1882) — The funeral of Caleb Hollingsworth took place on Tuesday afternoon (27 June) from his late residence, corner of Miner and Walnut streets this borough, was largely attended. The remains of deceased were taken to Kennett Square and interred in Friends burial ground. (Ibid June 28, 1882.)

(5) Merlin Everette Auten

Our own cousin, once removed, died January 21, 1973, aged 79 years, 7 months and 10 days. He was born June 10, 1893 at Kellogg, Iowa, a son of Edward Lyman Auten and Lucinda Hollingsworth. (For a full biography, please see HR 8:166.) He died of a stroke, and was found by his wife Emma, on the floor. She was able to speak to him before the ambulance took him, and he lived just two days. He leaves his wife, and two children by his first wife, five grandchildren and one great-grandchild. He had made his home in Arcadia, California, for nearly forty years. He was a very witty and charming man, and we cherish all his letters as permanent keepsakes.

(6) Fenelon Anthony Hollingsworth

Again, the editor's own first cousin once removed. He died Sept. 5, 1973 at the age of 79 years, 3 months and 28 days. "String" or "Holly" Hollingsworth was born May 8, 1894 in Los Angeles, a child of Frederick and Elizabeth (Firsich) Hollingsworth. Frederick was elder brother to Lucinda; wife of Edward Auten, noted above. With these losses, two of Frederick Hollingsworth's great-grandchildren have been added to the ever growing roster of departed ones. Only 3 full-blooded great-grandchildren remain, of the 23 great grandchildren born.

Holly Hollingsworth suffered two strokes, the second one proving fatal. His remains were cremated. He is survived by his wife Audrey, in Westchester, California, and his daughter by former marriage, Mrs. Nina Jean Haddock.

His death is most deeply regretted. He was very kind to your editor, and was helpful with the family records, recollections and pictures, right from the beginning, and was interested enough to read and subscribe to Hollingsworth Register from its inception. In a later issue we will mention his lifelong interest in baseball and his unique hobby.

At Last! Recognition in Rockford!

Hollingsworth Register has to thank Mrs. Hazel Hyde, and the Rockford (Illinois) Historical Society (editorial address 1325 Cosper Av., Rockford, Ill. 61107) for publication of a brief sketch of our ancestor, Frederick Hollingsworth, appearing in their September-October and Nov-Dec. 1973 issues, Volume 10, Numbers 5 and 6. Interested persons with Rockford and Winnebago County ancestors, write about memberships.

Frederick Hollingsworth landed in what is now Cherry Valley township, just east of Rockford, on 28 May 1837, but not once did his name ever appear in any of the 19th or 20th Century histories of the town, city, county or region... Until the close of 1973, recognition of his true pioneership was not forthcoming; 136 years is a long time to wait, but refreshing to achieve.

FRANK E. HOLLINGSWORTH⁴

Frank E. Hollingsworth was the second child and eldest son of Jacob Ellerton³ Hollingsworth (Jacob², Frederick¹, Samuel^a Hollinsworth, John^b) and his wife Carrie Bell Day. He was born August 3, 1905, at Woodruff, Phillips County, Kansas; and died July 28, 1961, at Ottawa, Franklin County, Kansas, aged 55 years, 11 months and 25 days. He was buried in the cemetery in Ottawa, Kansas.

He married, Sept. 6, 1934, at Garnett, Anderson County, Kansas, Frances Mae Nutt, daughter of William F. and Carrie Maud (Fanning) Nutt, both of them natives of Kansas. Frances Mae was born Dec. 16, 1915, at Waverly, Coffey County, Kansas. She resides at Ottawa, Kansas (last known, 1964..)

Frank E. Hollingsworth was raised in Woodruff, Kansas, and, after a few years during which he sojourned in the State of Idaho with his family, he came to Ottawa and remained there until death. Unfortunately, just after your editor made contact with Jacob E. Hollingsworth, the father of Frank, then in his nineties, Frank passed away. Not many years after that, his brother "Red" (Lynn) Hollingsworth died, and his father, leaving only Ruby Hollingsworth his sister, now residing at Wellsville, Kansas, surviving.

Family. Jefferson Davis

David Marshall Hollingsworth, a prominent citizen of Mississippi, served in the Mexican War in the company of Capt. John M. Sharp, in the 1st Mississippi Regiment, commanded by Col. Jefferson Davis. Davis became the first and only president of the Confederate States of America. After the war he retired to Beauvoir, near Biloxi, Mississippi. His exploits in Mexico at the battles of Monterey and Buena Vista were renowned. David Marshall Hollingsworth became his lifelong friend. David applied for a Mexican War Pension under the Act of Congress, Jan. 29, 1887, and Mr. Jefferson Davis was happy to sign an affidavit for Hollingsworth. Hollingsworth Register is proud to publish this document by courtesy of Mrs. Byron W. Frizzell of Johnson City, Tennessee. Our reproduction is reduced by cropping out points 3 through 4, which are blank, being irrelevant. The original signature is clear. Note that Davis dictated the answers to the routine questions very candidly as a man with years of distinguished authority would be expected to do. Mr. Hollingsworth had engaged in the battle of Buena Vista. He was a son of James and Elizabeth (Newberry) Hollingsworth, of Bibb County, Georgia, and grandson of Jesse Hollingsworth (parents untraced) an early settler of Jefferson and Twiggs Counties, in the same state. Jefferson Davis died a little over two years after he signed this affidavit, on Dec. 6, 1889.

HOPKINS GENEALOGY

The Genealogy of John Hopkins, of Cambridge, Massachusetts, (1634-) by Timothy Hopkins, published in 1934, publishes, on page 540, the following Hollingsworth connection:

Ludd Hopkins⁸ (Simeon Wright⁷, Matthew⁶, Nehemiah⁵, Ebenezer⁴, Ebenezer³, Stephen², John¹) born 13 Sept. 1832 in Licking Co., Ohio, married second, in 1865, at Rensselaer, Indiana, Mary Catherine Austin. Their child, Nora Austin Hopkins, b. 21 Aug. 1867 at Rensselaer, m. 26 Sept. 1889, there, GEORGE KANNAL HOLLINGSWORTH, b. there 26 Sept. 1868, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Kannal Hollingsworth, who was in the real estate business in Chicago, Presbyterian and Republican. Their children were:

1. Donald Hopkins¹⁰ Hollingsworth, b. 30 Oct. 1891, m. 17 April 1916, Dorothy Fox.
2. Thomas¹⁰ Hollingsworth, b. 24 Feb. 1894, m. 10 Sept. 1926, Martha Oursler. He served in World War One, Sergt 1/c, Ordnance Dept. Enlisted in Oct. 1917, served in France 15 months.

Ye Hollingworth in Ld. Leicester's Train

Those who viewed educational television (now Public TV) a couple of years past will remember the wonderful series about Queen Elizabeth the First. The Earl of Leicester figured heavily, played by Robert Hardy, a fine actor. In history, Leicester had a brief period of triumph, and, as it might be, one of our clan was along for the occasion. His name was Reinold Hollingworth. He was among the "train" of Cavalry belonging to the Earl of Essex, who were paid at The Hague on 20 Jan. 1586. Who this Reinold Hollingworth might be is not possible to say, but we hazard a guess that he might be the identical "Captain" Hollingworth who helped ravage Ireland only six years earlier. (See HR 7:1) The Earl of Leicester (Robert Dudley) had gone to Holland to help the Dutch fight off the Spanish, after the assassination of William the Silent. It soon appeared Leicester was more of a court fop than a soldier, and he was recalled. He was, incidentally, the husband of the Countess of Essex, (widow of Walter Devereaux) and was thereby the stepfather to Robert, 2nd Earl of Essex who had apparently been in Ireland as a youth when Hollingworth was there.

Reinold Hollingworth of 1586 was listed in the "Cavalry under the Earl of Essex" printed in E.M. Tenison, "Elizabethan England," VI, Royal Leamington Spa, 1937, pp. 22, 204-213, 220-221. St. Dunstan's, Stepney

This is the parish of the English mariner. All that sail the sea are said to belong to Stepney, Middlesex. Judging by the size of the parish registers, we think all the sailors in the world worshipped there. It lies just east of the Tower of London and contains Limehouse, Ratcliff and Bednalgreen and other interesting hamlets. The river Thames is its south boundary line. SLC film 595,417 contains baptisms from 1568 through 1656. The marriages have all been printed. Here are most of the baptisms of Hollingworths, and all the marriages.

EDITORIAL 1900 Census is Open to Public! (With Strings.)

You may not know that on Dec. 3rd 1973 the National Archives was authorized to release the 1900 U.S. Census schedules and the Soundex Index which covers it. For many months, however, they will only be available to those able to travel to Washington, D.C. or to hire agents to search for them there. Genealogists, historians and biographers may examine the records after signing a statement agreeing not to use the information taken to the defamation of those enumerated, etc. No photo-stats will be allowed. Films may never be available to the general public, but copies on film will be, we are told, available for search under the same restrictions, in the various branches of the National Archives. This will take some months, even years, to prepare, we are sure. This is repressive, to be sure, but at least now, the matter has passed from the notice of the Congressmen and Senators who stopped the full release of the census on schedule in June, 1972. (This is one thing they can't blame Mr. Nixon for!) Now, Dear reader: Vote those men out of office. We still maintain, despite the fact that it may be odious to some of you, that a big LOBBY of genealogists would do more than fifty million letters could ever do. History proves that Congress listens to the lobbyists and dumps the letters in the trash. Remember, this is the same Congress which has shown its incapacity to govern by stampeding to the attempted lynching of Richard Milhous Nixon. No telling what they will do next to destroy our freedom. So get a lobby together and jump in and kick, scratch and bite if you want to keep your rights from being flushed down a Senate or House Office Building toilet!
