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MEANING OF THE NAME

The surname Hollingsworth is derived from a place in northeast Cheshire, of the same name, supposedly the place called "Holisurde" in the Domesday Book for Cheshire, and pronounced "Hollis-worth," but probably intended to be "Hollinworth." It is in the Parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale, a few miles south of Manchester. It is possible that several separate families using this place as a surname came into existence at an early day. There are also two other places with this name in Lancashire north of Manchester. The Cheshire place was barren, and called waste at the time of Domesday (1086) and it was not until about the time of Magna Carta (1215) that we find any person using the name as a personal family name. This was "Tomas De Holinewurth" (here the name is transliterated into Latin) who was a signatory on a charter of about that period. The two Anglo-Saxon words, Holegn (or Holyn), a Holly bush, and Worp (or Worde) meaning an enclosure, or farmstead, are said to be the origin of the name for this place now called Hollingworth in Cheshire, or, "A farm (homestead) enclosed by holly bushes," or simply "Holly Farm." In later centuries a medial "s" came to be used by some of the families, but not as a general rule earlier than 1620. There are now five generally used forms: Hollingsworth, Hollinsworth, Hollingworth, Hollinworth and Hollandsworth. These are regularly found in the indexes to vital records from 1837 at St. Catherine's House, London, and in most telephone or city directories for large cities in England and America.

INTENT OF THIS QUARTERLY

Hollingsworth Register is now entering its eleventh year of publication. It started in April, 1965, and its purpose remains as it was at that time: To publish verbatim copies or abstracts of records of the family world wide from the earliest times to the present day. Nearly every name of our family from the U.S. Census, 1790 through 1860, has been published here. About 1,700,000 pages of census were scoured to produce that result. We think no other family has thus been served.

Editor's Comments

Tentative Opening date for Genealogical Library: As reported in our Sept. 1976 issue, the closing of the L.A. Temple (LDS) Genealogical Library in October, 1976, has seriously curtailed the editor's work. Collecting data for Hollingsworth Register, or correcting materials already collected against original sources, has become virtually impossible. Relying on printed transcripts is foolish, in our opinion. Besides, much material has never been copied and exists solely on film if one is lucky to find it even in this form. The main problem has been trying to cover our regular search in the census (see below) of 1870. News has come from the staff of the branch library that the opening may occur in mid May. Problems with contractors, blueprints and permits have bogged down the work to a standstill since December! Better late than never. This branch was founded in 1964 by E. Kay Kirkham and was the first and still is the largest of the branches of the (newly re-named) Genealogical Department of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. Difficulties probably will continue with HR editions for some time after the re-opening. Please expect a delay of up to two months in delivery. The March issue, 1977, may be delivered in May.

The Illinois Census of 1870, Part One: Most of the reels of film covered for this state were the new (M-593) National Archives Federal Copy, at one page per exposure. It is a good quality reproduction, as opposed to the primitive (T-8) first filming double page per frame, done in 1937 by the U.S. Bureau of the Census, when microfilming was in its gestation period. The second half of the Illinois extract will probably appear in our June or September, 1977, issue. Time collecting these entries is now scarce, because the editor now has to catch up on work for many clients. The idea of obtaining film loans from the Federal Archives, mentioned in the last issue, has been discarded.

Several favorable responses have come in on the subject of the article on Mega-Vitamins published last issue. Since then, your editor has continued to study the therapeutic value of gigantic (by pre-set medical standards) doses of so-called vitamins C and E through several more books. One in particular is The Healing Factor: "Vitamin C" Against Disease, by Irwin Stone (1972: Grosset & Dunlap, New York) now in paperback at \$1.95. Although Stone deals in Part One with the supposed "evolutionary origin" of both mankind and his need for ascorbic acid, with which the editor disagrees totally, the rest of the book is eye-opening. Medical case histories show the value of ascorbic acid, a.k.a. vitamin C, in large doses, in fighting: the common cold, viral infection, bacterial infection, cancer, heart problems, strokes, aging, allergies, asthma, hay fever, ulcers, diabetes, poisons, shock, bone fractures, even mental disease, and arthritis and rheumatic diseases. Your editor used to bruise very easily, and was also, as stated in the September article, an asthma sufferer for 44 years. Now, with 5 grams of ascorbic acid per day in his diet, no asthma and no bruising. The fact was demonstrated deliberately by having a friend hit him very hard on the upper arm. Very painful, but no bruise!

The above Jacob Hollingsworth died in 1836 in Dallas County, Alabama. Probate case shows his Administration Intestate was handled by his son HOSEA HOLLINGSWORTH. Widow was LYDIA, and children were MARY, wife of Samuel Davis; SARAH, wife of Riley Moody; Elizabeth, wife of William Edwards; Catherine Hollingsworth, Hosea Hollingsworth, John F. Hollingsworth, Joshua Hollingsworth, Stephen Hollingsworth, Zebulon Hollingsworth, and Ruth DAVIS, deceased, wife of William Davis.

The family record pursues only the lineage down from Jacob's son Stephen. HR 1:136, 1850 U.S. Census of Clarke County, Mississippi, shows Lydia, aged 70, born Georgia, in house of son Stephen, 31, born Alabama. Nearby are John, aged 37, Hosea, aged 41, and Zebulon, 29, first two born Georgia, Zebulon born Alabama.

This gives family in part:

Catherine Hollingsworth, unmarried in 1836.

Joshua Hollingsworth, (born c1814, in Georgia; went to Texas).

Ten children! Joshua above might be same as "Joshua W. Hollingsworth, aged 36, born Georgia, living in Anderson County, Texas, 1850, with wife Elizabeth, born Alabama, and children Henry, 8, Alabama, Lettia A. 6, born Mississippi, and George M., 1, born Anderson County, Texas." We reflect that possibility above in parentheses.

Lydia is listed in the 1840 U.S. Census of Alabama, Macon County, with 1 male 10-15; 1 male 15-20; 1 female 20-30; 1 female 30-40; 1 female 40-50; and 1 female 60-70, who would be Lydia herself. (HR 3:17, page 2 of schedule.)

The 1830 entry (HR 2:111, entry 2 for Alabama, page 76 of schedule) shows Jacob Hollingsworth, 1 male 5-10; 2 males 10-15; 2 males 15-20; 1 male 20-30; 1 male 50-60 (Jacob himself); 2 females 20-30; 1 female 40-50 (Lydia, who should be in 50-60, but was, in 1830, just fifty, in fact, not quite 50 when census was taken). The other daughters were apparently married by this time.

Jacob Hollingsworth appears in the state census of Alabama, 1820, Dallas County, page 380, 1 white male 21 and over; 1 white female ditto, 5 white males under 21 and 5 white females ditto. Total 12 whites.

Your editor believes that this Jacob came from Burke County, Georgia, and was probably a son of Zebulon⁴ Hollingsworth, son of Stephen³ Hollingsworth (Henry², Valentin¹, Henry^a).

"The Hollingsworth Family of Screven County, Georgia," by the late C. D. Hollingsworth, Sr., of Sylvania, Georgia published by his son Dixon Hollingsworth (1952: Sylvester, Ga.) pages 12 and 13, give us a theoretical account of the children of Stephen³ Hollingsworth, who had children, Lydia, who married John Ross; Henry, who married Mary Murrah (or perhaps, Murray); James, who married Elizabeth Thomas; Zebulon, who moved to Panther's Creek, now in Burke County, Georgia, in about 1770, and petitioned there for land under headrights, claiming a wife and six children. C.D. Hollingsworth believes that Stephen in Burke County, later Tattnall; Zebulon and John in Bulloch County, Jacob of Tattnall, and William of Burke County, were sons. Jacob of Tattnall could be our subject, although, of course, not among the six children born in North Carolina before emigration to Georgia. Stephen³ also had sons Valentine and Timothy.

C. D. Hollingsworth descends from Valentine Hollingsworth⁴ and seems to have obviated any possibility of his having a son Jacob⁵. We, therefore, assume that our subject is Jacob⁵ Hollingsworth, son of Zebulon⁴ Hollingsworth, as above. Burke County, Georgia, suffered a courthouse fire in 1858. No census schedules, originals or Federal copies, exist, as far as is known, for 1810, for Alabama or Georgia. This seriously hampers our knowledge of where the family resided at this date, but obviously in Georgia. The 1805 Land Lottery for the State of Georgia (HR 2:18) shows Jacob Hollingsworth, residing in Burke County, Ga., drew two blank lots, which means he was a free, white male married, with wife and/or legitimate children under 21, a U.S. citizen, and had resided at least 1 year in the state.

The above could be our subject, as Lydia would by then have been 25 years old. In 1820, as shown by the state census, they had 10 children under 21, and thus, if we figure about 2 years between births, we arrive at a figure of almost twenty years to bring out 10 children, hence, the marriage of Jacob and Lydia would occur about 1801.

Other readers are encouraged to send in any clues about this family.

C. L. HOLLINGSWORTH

One of the most substantial and energetic residents of Baldwin Park (California - Ed.), and one who has done much for this thriving little town, is C. L. Hollingsworth, grocer, farmer, and owner and manager of a prosperous cannery, where the new breakfast food, "Shuster Wheat," is prepared for the market. Mr. Hollingsworth has lived in Los Angeles County several years. He came first in 1884, but soon returned to his former home in Kansas, where he was prominently identified with his home town for twelve years. In 1911 he returned to California and located at Baldwin Park, where he has since made his home. He is one of the enthusiastic boosters for this section of the county and is giving his best effort, his time and his energy for the general promotion and development of his home community.

Mr Hollingsworth is a native of Iowa, born in Cedar county, April 4, 1865. When he was fourteen years of age he removed to Kansas with his parents, locating in Montgomery county. When he was nineteen he came to California, joining an uncle, Stephen Townsend, at Long Beach and working for him in the beach city, where Mr. Townsend was a grading contractor. At that time Long Beach contained only about a dozen houses, all of a very primitive character, and the first work on the grading of Ocean Avenue was done by Mr Hollingsworth. He also assisted in the laying out of the town. For two years he remained in the county, engaging in grading work, and then returned to Coffeyville, Kansas, where he engaged in dairying and farming. He soon assumed a place of prominence in the community, taking an active part in public affairs. For a period of twelve years he was a member of the school board, and did much for the welfare of the public schools. One of his most thrilling experiences was the raid by the Dalton gang, on the First National Bank of Coffeyville, Mr Hollingsworth happening to be in the bank at the time.

It was in 1911 that Mr Hollingsworth returned to California to make his permanent home. He bought a small tract of land at Baldwin Park, and also an acre near the school house, both of which are very valuable pieces of property. In 1912 he opened a grocery store in Baldwin Park, and has since conducted a flourishing business there, meeting with much success and giving splendid service and satisfaction to his patrons. Here again he has assumed his rightful place in the community and takes a prominent part in public affairs. He is a member of the school board, having rendered valuable service as chairman of that body. He owns and operates the Baldwin Park Cannery, in which a specialty is made of handling peaches and tomatoes, and where also the new breakfast food known as "Shuster Wheat" is canned. This is a novelty, being the first breakfast food to be put up in cans. It is made from the whole wheat and is ready to serve when taken from the cans. The cannery has a capacity of two thousand cans per day.

Aside from his business connection Mr Hollingsworth is well known in social and fraternal circles, where he is deservedly popular. He is a member of the Woodmen of the World, and is one of the most progressive and public-spirited men in the community. (Historical and Biographical Record of California, (1915: Historic Record Company, Los Angeles), Volume 3, page 674. He was Charles L.⁹ Hollingsworth, son of William⁸ and Rosa (Townsend) Hollingsworth, (Richard⁷, Henry⁶, John⁵, George⁴, Abraham³, Thomas², Valentin¹, Henry^a). His mother died and his father married (2) Effie Hotz (Stewart says Hutz) in 1872. His grandfather and grandmother were Richard and Rebecca (Hastings) Hollingsworth, who came to Coffeyville, Montgomery County, Kansas, and died and are buried there. (See Stewart, pages 76 and 77, and HR 7:109 for details. On page 134 of William B. Hollingsworth's "Hollingsworth Genealogical Memoranda in the United States, 1682-1884," (1884) there is the following entry:

"Amherst County, Va., and North Carolina
William Hollingsworth and Joseph Hollingsworth --
Brothers. William went to Nashville, Tennessee
Joseph Hollingsworth, ancestors unknown,
born in Amherst County, Va., about 1765 to '70.
Died 1819, in Stokes County, North Carolina married
Mary Mathews in 1793. Children: Aquilla, James M.,
Tandy, Mary, Daniel and William R."

It should be noted also that Ambrose Campbell died in 1812 in Nelson County leaving property to his wife Margaret for life and then 100 acres to his son Peter and 74 and 3/4 acres to his daughter Lucy. Lewis Hollingsworth obviously married Lucy Campbell between 1812 and 1816.

Lewis Hollingsworth, 2 males under 10; 1 male 26-45; 2 females under 10; 1 female 26-45.

William Hollingsworth, 1 male & 1 female 26-45.

William Hollingsworth, 1 male 10-16; 2 males 16-26; 1 male 26-45; 1 male 45 and up; 1 female 10-16; 2 females 16-26.

Taking this data together with later census records, I conclude that William Hollingsworth was born between 1750 and 1760 and that he married twice, first to Jamima ____, and later to Fanny Wright. Between 1814 and 1820, William and most of his family moved from Virginia to Davidson County, Tennessee, where William died after 1830. William had

at least seven children and probably at least ten. The names of some of the children are probably:

Joseph born 1770-1780 may have married three times.

William born 1780-1790 married Lucy Robinson. Moved back to Amherst County, Virginia.

Lewis, born 1790 married Lucy Campbell.

George, born 1795 married Susan Harvey, moved to Henry County, Tennessee.

Sally, born 1795-1805 married William Alford.

Polly, born 1800-1805 married Joel Matterson.

Henry, born 1808.

I am still trying to trace the parentage of William and his brother Joseph Hollingsworth and would appreciate any help that the readers of Hollingsworth Register can give me.
