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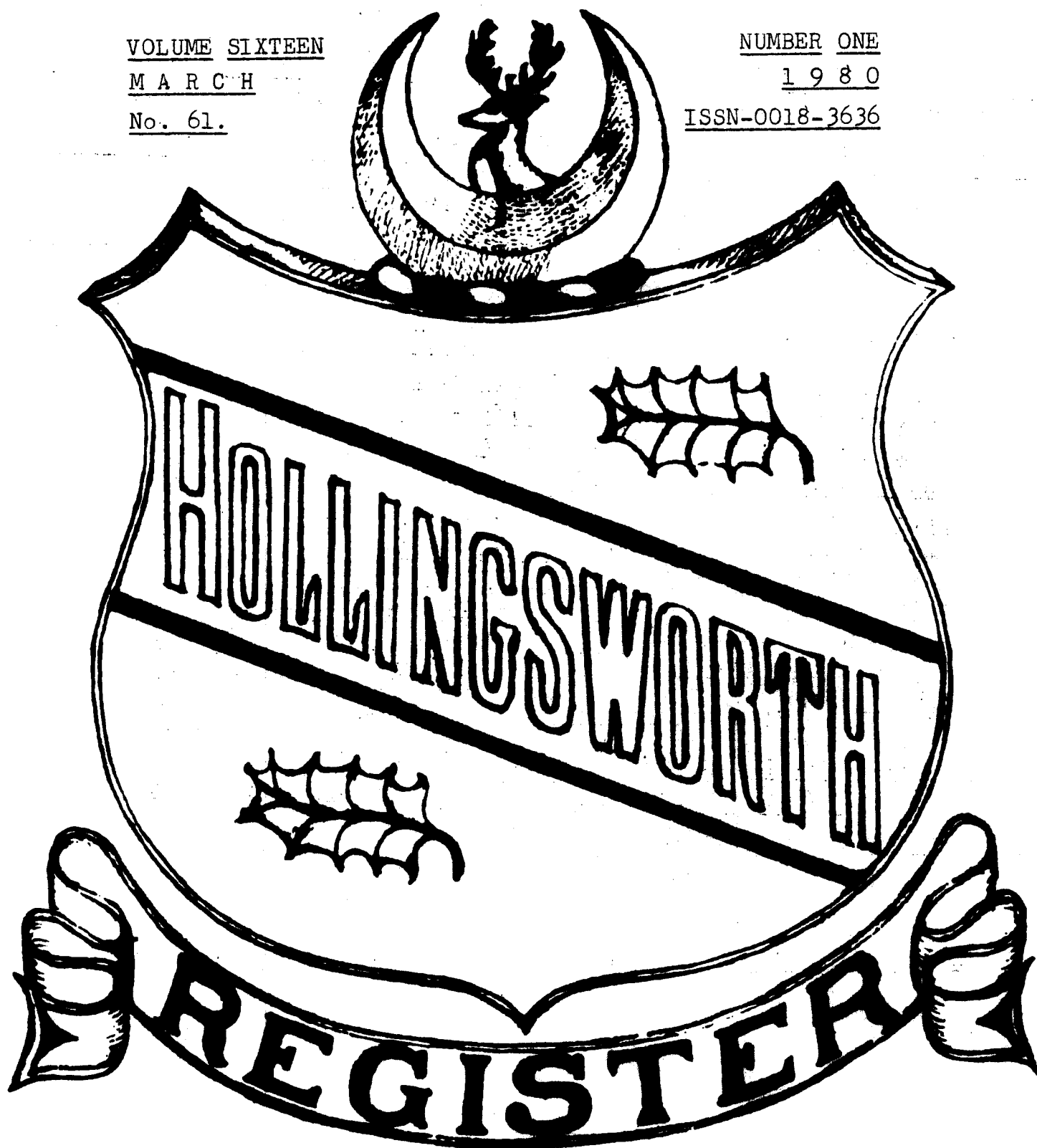

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Land Records of Ashe County, North Carolina

Mr Raleigh P. Hollingsworth of Bellevue, Washington 98008 has sent your editor his work on these deeds from the court house at Jefferson, N.C. In an earlier H.R. we published what we found on the microfilms in the custody of the Genealogical Society of Utah (HR 4:20 March 1968). But it was noted that "Deeds 1805-1813 seem to be totally missing" and mistakenly wrote this off to a possible fire. Not so. It is thought worthy to repeat all our finds with Mr. Hollingsworth's own here.

(1) Book A, page 271. Indenture dated 6 May 1802 from Stephen Reid (Reed) to WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH. 50 pounds. "A certain parcel of land containing fifty acres on the North Fork of New River, Beginning at a White Oak running thence East one hundred and forty polls crossing the River to a stake thence North fifty seven polls to a Buckeye and White Walnut tree on the bank of said River near said REED'S corner then West crossing said River one hundred and fifty polls to a stake thence south fifty seven polls crossing a branch to the first station." (Stephen Reed signed by mark; James Chapel, witness). NOTE: Items in parentheses are HR's own notes, from the 1968 issue. Purminas Howard, witness.

(2)(Book A, p. 430. WILLIAM HOLLANDWORTH a witness to an indenture, May 17, 1803, from Stephen Reed to Mary Powell.)

(3) Book A, p. 431. Indenture dated 18 Mar. 1803, from William Hubbard to VINCIN HOLLANDWORTH, (both of Ashe County) for fifty pounds, "A certain parcel of land containing fifty acres be the same more or less lying and being in the County aforesaid (Ashe) on the waters of the North Fork of New River Beginning at a Hickory on a drain of Rich Hill Creek running North twenty West forty four polls to a Spanish Oak then North sixty three West sixty polls to a Chestnut then South sixty West thirty six polls to a Maple then South forty five West sixty polls to a Sugar tree then South seventy two East one hundred and twenty six polls to a stake then to the first station." (Signed William (X) Hubbard, by mark; James Bunyan and John Bunyan,\*witnesses. Received in May Term 1803.) Record of transfer of this parcel away by Vincent Hollandworth not found by either researcher. \*Bunyard - R.P.H.

(4)(Book A, p. 432. "VINSON HOLLEN" a witness, 1803, to indenture from Matthias Carpenter to William Jones for 100 acres. See HR 15:64.)

(5) Book B, p. 16. Indenture 9 Nov. 1803. Stephen Reed to WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH. \$100.00. (Both of Ashe County.) "A certain tract of land Containing forty four and one fourth (44 $\frac{1}{4}$ ) acres lying and being in the County of Ashe situate on the North Fork of New River joining the tract said HOLLINSWORTH lives on Beginning at a White Oak a corner of the old survey, running West forty eight poles to a Buckeye then North eighty eight poles to a Red Oak then East eighteen poles to a Red Oak then North forty five East twenty two poles to a chestnut then East eighteen poles to a Hickory, then South seventy four East one hundred and twenty poles to a stake in the old line then west one hundred and fifty poles to the old corner, then to the first station." (Witnesses John Reed, BEASLEY HOLLINGSWORTH his X mark. Registered in November Term, 1803.)

(6) Book V, p. 429. Indenture dated 7 Dec 1800 (sic: probably 1808) from WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH to Elijah Powell. \$100.00 for the same 44½ acres described in Item 5 above, except the clause "joining the tract said Powell lives on" is to be substituted. (It appears we did not take into consideration in 1968 the fact that Deed Book V contains the deeds which ought to be in B or C - Editor. The films were rented by another patron and the General Index film was not among them so we just read each book, A, B, C, etc. V was not among them. Poor excuse!)

(7) Book V, p. 438. Indenture dated \_\_\_\_ 1808 from WILLIAM HOLLINGSWORTH to Elijah Powell. \$100.00. Fifty acres, the same legal description in Item 1 above. (Proved by John Reed, a witness, before the August Term of 1811 per Minutes, Pleas & Quarter Sessions.)

(8) Indenture 12 Sept. 1808, from Joseph Calloway to VINCENT HOLLINSWORTH for \$5.00 "Situate on the North Side of the North Fork of New River be the same more or less bounded as follows, Beginning at a Stake on the North Bank of said River running West thirty poles to a stake then south fifty poles to a stake on the River Bank, then down the meanders of said River to the first station." (Elisha Callaway (sic) proved this deed as a witness thereto before the November 1811 session of the court. The name is "VINSON" in these minutes.) V, p.490. Joseph B. Bunyard and Elisha Collins, wits. R.P.H.

(9) Indenture dated 28 November 1808 from William Gray to WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH, for 165 acres at \$150.00 Book V, p. 496. "A certain tract of land lying and being on the waters of the North Fork of New River containing by estimation one hundred and sixty five acres be the same more or less. Beginning at a Beach (sic) in the conditional line between Calloway and WILLIAM HOLLINGSWORTH, tunnning along said line to the River in the conditional line of VINCENT HOLLINGSWORTH, then up the meanders of said River to the old line Reed Corner then South with the Reed Line one hundred poles to a stake in Ambros Collins, then East with his line to a stake in McLains line, then North with his line fifty six poles to a Spanish Oak his corner then East with his line one hundred sixty poles to a Maple his corner then South fifty six poles to a stake in Collins line, then East with his line sixty six poles to a stake, then North to the conditional line of the first beginning, then to the first station." Alexander Latham, Wm. Curnutt, witnesses.

(10) Book V, p. 497. Indenture dated 22 March 1808, from WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH to James Reed, "A Certain parcel of land lying on the North Fork of New River containing one hundred and thirty five acres be the same more or less, Beginning at a Hickory stump the old corner running West sixty two poles to a Beach, then North thirty five East twenty poles to the River Bank, then North thirty west up said River to the mouth of a Branch, then North up said Branch one hundred and thirty poles to the Old Line, then east eighty two poles to the old corner, then to the first station," for \$200.00. (This deed follows next item but was recorded first - Ed.) (Proved in Feb. Court 1812.)

(11) Book V, p. 500. Indenture dated 22 Mar 1808. VINCENT HOLLINSWORTH to WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH, 135 acres for \$200.00 - same land in Item 10. (Proved in Court Feb. 1812 sessions.)

(12) Indenture 17 Sept. 1810, WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH to James Reed, for \$200.00 - 165 acres, Book V, p. 498. Same land described in Item 9. Witnesses: Ambros Collins and Wm. Hubbard.

(13) Book V, p. 502. Indenture 28 Nov. 1808. William Gray to WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH, 56 acres for \$150.00. "A certain tract of land containing by estimation fifty six acres, Be the same more or less. Situate in the County Aforesaid (Ashe), lying on the waters of the North Fork of New River, Beginning at a Maple the old corner of McLains, running West one hundred and fifty poles to a Spanish Oak, then south fifty six poles to a stake to Ambros Collins line of his two hundred acre survey, then East one hundred and sixty poles to a stake, then to the first station." Witness: Alexander Latham.

(14) Book V, p. 505. Indenture 28 Nov. 1808, from WILLIAM HOLLINSWORTH to James Reed, for \$150.00. (Same 56 acres sold to him in Item 13.)

NOTE: Your editor's notes show that a deed from William Hollinsworth (Hollandsworth) to Amos (Ambros?) Collins passed the Court of February Sessions, 1812, for 160 acres. This might be the editor's error.

Remember: This family represents that of John Hollinsworth, or Hollingsworth, emigrant ancestor who came into Maryland in 1650 (HR 1:127).

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HOLLINGSWORTH MISCELLANY - Items of varied interest.

(1) Under the heading Torture-Slayings of Five Girls Recounted, the Los Angeles Times, Wed. Mar 19, 1980, p. 3 part 1, (by Bill Farr, Times Staff Writer), reveals the gruesome details of the killings of four South Bay teenagers and one from Sunland, California. Much too terrible to recount here. Two men, Roy Lewis Norris and Lawrence Sigmond Bittaker, are in custody and one has confessed and implicated the other. The area is only a few miles from your editor, the scene of four of the kidnappings. South Bay Municipal Judge William R. Hollingsworth, Jr., presided at Torrance Municipal Court buildings.

(2) The London Daily Mail, Fri. Aug. 3, 1979, has an article in The Patrick Sergeant Column, titled The Bourne whence no Hollingsworth returned. "Last September, Ben Raven's firm, Raybeck, bid £11,300,000 for Bourne and Hollingsworth, and its splendid store on an island site in Oxford Street. Ten days after that offer went unconditional, Raybeck spent another £750,000 on buying the freehold. This week, they have just completed a sale and leaseback which values the store alone at £29,500,000.

"For Raybeck, the Deal of the Decade. For the Bourne and Hollingsworth shareholders, the Boob of the Year."

After this was said, Sergeant reported that the Bournes, who were the directors, and their bankers, Morgan Grenfell, advised other shareholders to accept Raybeck's 235p a share offer. In explaining the discrepancy in the figures, Christopher Knight, of Morgan Grenfell, said that B. & H. were sold to the highest bidder. The upshot is, however, that the Bourne name would continue emblazoned above the store and the Hollingsworth name "bit the dust." Now, simply "Bourne's," it is said that Raybeck is pumping new life into the store.

(3) The Daily Telegraph of London, England, has as its Defence Correspondent, CLARE HOLLINGSWORTH. Our own correspondent & cousin, Clare Hollingsworth, of Edmonton, Alta, sends us two cuttings from the well known newspaper proving that admirably (Tues Aug 14 and Tues Aug. 21, 1979 ).

(4) The Scott County Times (Mississippi), of Wed. May 23, 1979, sent along by our subscriber and correspondent, Mrs. Oliver H. Hopkins, of Forest, Miss., has a long column headed HOLLINGSWORTH SEEKS RE-ELECTION AS REPRESENTATIVE, DISTRICT 80 It is written by Billy W. Hollingsworth himself. It is his statement for re-election to the House of Representatives, District 80, covering Smith County and parts of Scott County including N.E. Forest precinct. Election was Augst 7, 1979 but HR has no result for you at present.

For State Representative, Billy tells us he is the son of the late Gladys Graham Hollingsworth and Hollis Hollingsworth and grandson of the late Hattie Lay Graham and Willie Graham, Ruby Culpepper Hollingsworth and Jessie (sic) Hollingsworth. He lives in Sardis Community of Smith Co., Miss. He graduated from Good Hope High School in Scott Co., and obtained a bachelors degree from William Carey College and Masters from Mississippi College. He is fifty, and has had four years experience as State Representative, 13 years coaching and teaching, and six years as principal. Engages in cattle farming and has served as manager of Tadlock Stockyards. Is pastor of Hiwonmee Baptist Church in Wayne County and has been for 24 years. He was chosen STAR Teacher two years in succession, and appeared in the 1867 edition of Outstanding Personalities of the South. He concludes "and if I fail to get by to see you, please take this as my plea to you for your vote and support."

(5) Across The Years In Prince George's County (Maryland), by Effie Gwynn Bowie (c1947) p. 354, mentions a Robert Hollingsworth who lived in Cuba in 1930, who owned 535 acres, on which Pleasant Springs, a large two story and attic house stood. The owner in 1850 was John Hilleary Gwynn. Who was Robert Hollingsworth?

(6) "On This Date," a column in a Canadian paper, not identified, but probably dated Nov. 8, 1966, states that on Nov. 8, 1907, David J. Hollingsworth, merchant and postmaster, died at Escott, in Leeds County, Ontario, at the age of sixty. (Probably sent to us by Evelyn Purvis Earle, Gananoque, Ontario, received Feb 11, 1967.)

(7) Quaker Life, July-August 1978 p. 20, mentions the Third Annual Conference of the Friends Fellowship of Healing, convened by Dr. Thomas Hollingsworth & Dr. Robert Painter, Nov. 3-5 etc. Picture of Dr. Hollingsworth is same as that in the July-Aug 1979 issue, p. 24, announcing Thomas H. Hollingsworth, M.D. and Dr. Painter, conveners for Alternative Models of Wholistic Life Styles. Nutrition was discussed there, and this is heartening to your editor. Glad to know of any Medical Doctors who stand up for nutrition, despite the American Medical Association's opinions to the contrary! B R A V O. (From Doug Hollingsworth, Bangor, Maine.)

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#### W H O   W A S   A . J .   B U R N E T T ' S   W I F E ?

Our correspondent and subscriber, Mrs. Hazel L. Ray of Long Beach, California, has sent her quotations from History of Greene County, Missouri, (1883) by Western Historical Company, pp. 137 and 159.

Page 137: In the meantime, Uncle Billy Fulbright had got about three weeks ahead of them, and stopped at the Fulbright Spring. His brother, John Fulbright had settled at another spring near by, and had a cabin up; and his brother-in-law A. J. Burnett had succeeded in putting up a small oak-pole cabin 12 X 15...

Page 159: (March 11-14, 1833 - 1st session of County Court) The County judges took the oath of office before Esq. A. J. Burnett, an acting justice of the peace in and for the County --- Of these officials, Mr. Burnett died in Jacksonville, Oregon in April 1877, aged 89 years.

Mrs. Ray wants to know how A. J. Burnett could be a brother-in-law to William Fulbright. She shows Burnett was definitely not husband of any of William Fulbright's sisters - five of them. Was he, therefore, the husband of Ruthy Hollingsworth Fulbright's kin, a sister? Burnett came from Tennessee with William and Ruthy and William's four brothers and their families and Mrs. Fulbright, William's mother and at least three of William Fulbright's five sisters and their husbands. (A wagon train full!) All eventually settled in Laclede, Pulaski & Camden Counties, in Missouri except A. J. Burnett and William Fulbright.

Ruth Hollingsworth was the daughter of Samuel Hollingsworth of Haywood County, North Carolina. Burnett was born in 1788. Was Mrs. Burnett a sister of Ruth ... and of Isaac and Jacob Hollingsworth of Mississippi?

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth:

Please forgive the delay in returning the pictures, but so many people wanted to see them. The Fred Hollingsworth (Frederick - ancestor of your editor (1802-1869) in picture #1 looks like the family of Thomas James Hollingsworth. Our grandfather, John Hollingsworth, we believe, was older than 8 years when his father died.

I have a story that my grandfather John and his brother Dan came over from Traverse City, Michigan, by horse, to Plum Hollow to buy horses and stopped off at the "Witch of Plum Hollow" a fortune teller and had their cups read. She told them of a death in their family which concerned the both of them. They returned home and found that their father Samuel Hollingsworth had taken ill of a hernia attack and his own good doctor couldn't be located and so died within 3 or 4 days.

Our great grandfather Samuel worked for a Ferry Hannah in a logging camp during the Civil War days, around Traverse City, Michigan. Major Nale (Neil), who operated a hotel across from our old Homestead at Escott, married our grandfather's sister. I do not know her name. Another sister married Horace Burtch.

Another story has it that Thos. D'Arcy McGee, the Father of Confederation, on the eve of election shoved a \$50.00 bill in the pocket of my great uncle Sam Hollingsworth to treat the boys to a barrel of whiskey. These stories may not mean much to you but I thought they were quite interesting. My older brother Francis told them to me. He is about four years older than I. My dad had a great memory for stories told him by his grandparents. I myself do not remember my grandfather. I can just remember my great uncle Jim. My grandfather was known as Western John because of the big western hat he always wore. My Aunt Beatrice is the only living relative who can connect us with the past generations. I will try and get a picture of my dad and send it to you. I'm sorry I can't be of more help to you. I am 37 years old and was only 17 when my father died. Trusting I will hear from you again, I remain,

Dear Mr. Hollingsworth:

I received your letter of May 27. I was down home on Sunday and found a lot of correspondence dated back to the 1900s. I have read it and found some information which I hope is helpful to you.

My grandfather, John, had a brother Thomas Hollingsworth who on

Nov. 21st, 1900 lived at 3751 Wallace Street, Chicago, Ill. Thos. had a daughter Hazel who was ten years old at that time. Thomas in writing to my grandfather said "I suppose you have heard of Mother's death. She has been dead about twelve years and is buried in the same lot as Father is." Thos. was a licensed engineer, but worked at any trade. Thos. had an uncle George Duiten if that means anything to you. He mentions in his letter that Hannah Hollingsworth is married to a man named Dell Hartwick and living at Newberry, Michigan. Ed Hollingsworth is also married and owns a farm at Alpena, Mich. This letter was written on paper with the heading Delaware Cycling Club, Club House, 780 Thirty-Fifth St., Chicago.

My grandfather John apparently had a half sister Hanah Avery who had 4 children: Fred Avery 20 yrs. old Aug. 2, 1900 who lived at Fife Lake, Michigan, Mamie & May Avery 18, lived at Newberry, Michigan, and James Avery of Traverse City. My grandfather's half brothers - one lived in Chicago, and one left his first wife who was a widow when he married her. She had a boy John Hollingsworth 19 years old when this letter was written on August 2, 1900. This boy's mother is now Mrs. Clouse.

My grandfather had a sister Mary Hollingsworth. His half sister Hanah Avery goes by the name of Mrs. Dell Hasket (Hartwick? see above) of Newberry, Michigan. A letter addressed to my grandfather John from Perry Hannah - Traverse City, says that my great grandfather was buried in Traverse City, lot No. 131, Block 1, indexed to Mrs. S. Hollingsworth.

My grandfather had a niece Fannie J. Cain of Fife Lake, Mich. There is quite a bit of correspondence from her. She in turn had a cousin Mary, of Honor, Mich. This was written in 1901. Ellen Hollingsworth was the wife of John Neil. My grandfather borrowed money from Neil and so there are lots of legal documents with his signature and his wife's. Neither of them could write apparently because they have marked an X where someone has written their names. Another brother of my grandfather's was Edward Hollingsworth who was 6 ft. 2" and weighed 190 lbs. He lived at Alpena, Michigan, 200 miles from Traverse City. This letter was written in 1901. Jim Hollingsworth, another brother of Grandfather John's lived at Bliss, New York.

Ellen Hollingsworth's niece was Caty Warren, mentioned in her will. Another brother of grandfather's was Tom Hollingsworth. I guess I've already mentioned him. He writes to my grandfather in 1904 asking whether he had relatives by the names of Annie Gainford or Charlotte James or Lizzie Gorman. Apparently there was an estate in Ireland and they were looking for relatives.

My grandfather's first wife's name was Harriet Davis. She has her signature on one of the mortgages. My grandfather's brother Daniel's wife's name was Cora. Edward Hollingsworth, another brother of my grandfather, had a son Hannah, at Traverse City. Grandfather John's nephew, Frederick J. Cain of Fife Lake, Michigan speaks of Aunt Eliza, Aunt Mery (sic), Aunt Jane and Aunt Essa.

I've probably repeated myself. But I've taken this information from letters and documents. I think from the letters they've done well in their writing and spelling. My brother Francis showed me the letter

you wrote to him. He is so busy with studies right now that I doubt he will be of much help. I go home just about every Sunday and question him. He's not much for writing letters. I think he said our grandfather John Hollingsworth came out here right from Ireland during the time of the Irish Rebellion. Daniel Hollingsworth, a great uncle of mine had one son George who died about 2 years ago leaving his wife Violet who now resides at Colborne, Ontario. I remember my dad saying that when George looked us up and came to see us he knew he must be a Hollingsworth because of his height. He must have been close to 7 feet tall and about two hundred and some pounds. Did anyone give you John or Alice Greene's names as a possible source of information. They are my Aunt Hattie's children. They never married but live at Lyndhurst, Ontario. They would possibly have dates of birth and dates of deaths regarding their grandfather, mine and his wife Harriet Davis. I do trust I have been of some help in your worthwhile project and do write again. My great uncle Jim Hollingsworth had a nephew - James C. McAvoy, who lived at Mallorytown.

Apparently Thomas E. Hollingsworth and his daughter are buried in Traverse City because this Mrs. Fannie Covey (Cain) of Honor, Benzie County, Michigan says her little girl is buried beside them. She was first married to an Alexander Green when she was sixteen. Did I mention another great uncle, my grandfather's brother, Edward Hollingsworth, of Alpena, Michigan? He writes in his letter of Jan. 1901 to see whether John Hollingsworth has the deed to his father's grave lot. If not he will have to buy it because they are trying to sell it. Well I'd better close for this time.

P.S. I did not get the name of the Birtch, but will try to; also the name Nale, which should read Neil.

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NOTES: These two very informative letters were sent to us long before HR was conceived, and tucked away in our own Canadian-Irish collection. There is no relationship to the Valentine Hollingsworth family here. Most of the County Wexford family who emigrated did so to "British North America," as they termed it. They did not like the Yankees; were staunch Loyalists and Protestant as could be. The above Samuel Hollingsworth, Nora's great-grandfather, was the emigrant ancestor of his branch of the Wexfords. See a sketch of what is known about him in HR 7:147-151. He was son of John Hollingsworth of Cronelusk, Arklow Parish, Co Wicklow, Ireland. John was the son (probably) of Daniel Hollinsworth (sic) of Coolookbeg, Co Wexford, Ireland, whose father was Samuel Hollinsworth (died 1799) of Coolookbeg. The last Samuel was a brother of John Hollinsworth of Ballinakill, Ballycanew Parish, Co Wexford (1714-1791) your editor's fourth-great-grandfather. The South Ireland Hollinsworth can as of now only be traced to this John, and brothers Sam and William Hollinsworth, wealthy Protestant farmers of the 18th century. Their supposed father was Thomas Hollinsworth, of Cronelusk, Co Wicklow, alive 1768. Thus the editor has done a lot better with Valentine's lineage than with his own, for which he started doing lineages in the first place. VERY FRUSTRATING!

OBITUARY:

(1) John B. Hollingsworth, Lennox, California - 1933.

PIONEER OF CALIFORNIA DIES HERE - John B. Hollingsworth Ends Colorful Career On Tuesday - WAS 72 YEARS OLD - Came To California When Los Angeles Was Very Small -- Death wrote the final chapter in the life of one of Southern California's pioneers when John B. Hollingsworth, 72, 10807 Lemon avenue, Lennox, was called to his reward on Tuesday morning (June 13, 1933 - Ed).

Born in Wisconsin\*, at an early age the deceased went to Minnesota where he wedded Mary McGovern at Waseca.\* At the age of 26 Hollingsworth came to Los Angeles in a train that was 10 days enroute, considered remarkable speed at that time. After becoming established here he soon sent for his family and resided in Los Angeles where the plaza is now. The family later moved out to Ninth and Main streets, then considered "out in the country."

Mr. Hollingsworth was the father of three\* children, Florence, who preceded him in death, Albert, Lennox merchant, and Harry Hollingsworth, well-known actor. Besides these and his widow, Mary Hollingsworth, the deceased leaves to mourn his loss four grandchildren, Leonard and Berneice Hollingsworth, son and daughter of Albert Hollingsworth, and John and Henry\* Hollingsworth, sons of Harry Hollingsworth; Ann Belden, a sister, of Los Angeles, Bell McPherson, also a sister, of Los Angeles, and Lee Hollingsworth of the same city.\*

Mr. and Mrs. John Hollingsworth celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in Lennox two years ago, at which time scores of their friends gathered at their Lennox home for an all-day celebration.

Mr. Hollingsworth had been a member of the Odd Fellows lodge and also of the Foresters.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the chapel of Hammond and Mispagel on Hyde Park boulevard. Services will be read by the Rev. Wilt of the Lennox Community church and interment will be at Inglewood Park cemetery. (From The Lennox Tribune, all files now believed to be lost, probably Wed. 14 or Thurs 15 June 1933. Cutting owned by the late Anna Belden, sister of deceased and found in her possessions when she died in March, 1961, in editor's files since then.)

\*NOTES: He was born at Rockford, Illinois, 10 Feb 1861; married at Minneapolis, Minnesota 4 Nov 1880 (see page 18); was the father of four children (see item 2); and Henry son of Harry is your editor. Left out was a brother Charles D. Hollingsworth, also of Los Angeles. The writer of the obit was probably Bernice Hollingsworth, his granddaughter, who, at that time, it is said, was on the staff of the Lennox Tribune. She was a step-daughter of Albert, editor's uncle. For more details in the life of this pioneer, see HR 2:87 (1966) in which this obituary was also printed.

(2) William Edward Hollingsworth, Waseca, Minnesota - 1882.

"Mr. John Hollingsworth buried a child of nine months yesterday."

(From "Local Dashes" column in the Waseca paper, the Minnesota Radical, dated 30 August 1882, page 4, column 1. The name comes to us from the word of mouth of Mary (McGovern) Hollingsworth, the infant's mother, grandmother of your editor (1865-1948) and the death certificate at Waseca County Clerk's office. This child was not mentioned in the obituary of the father, per Item 1 above. He was born 26 Nov 1881 at Minneapolis, and died 28 Aug 1882 at Waseca. No stone ever has marked his little grave in Woodville Township cemetery there. For that matter, no stones mark the graves of any of his family, father, mother, sister or brothers!)

(4) Charles Edmund Hollingsworth, Kitchener, Ontario, Can.-1980.

HOLLINGSWORTH, Charles Edmund - At the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital, on Monday, February 25, 1980, Charles Edmund Hollingsworth, aged 68 years, of 201 Sydney Street S. Kitchener, Ontario.

During the Second World War, he was a Flight Lieutenant with the Royal Canadian Air Force, from 1941 to 1945, and was a member of the RCAF Association 404 Wing. That Sam was born in 1837 at Ballycanew, Co Wexford, Ireland, son of Thomas and Alice (Robinson) Hollinsworth (sic), both natives of Co Wexford; Said Thomas Hollinsworth, born 1803, son of Nicholas and Mary Hollinsworth of Ballycanew.)

(5) Mrs. Cleo Lorena Hollingsworth Fieldcamp, Des Moines, Ia-1976.

"I want to report to you the death of my sister, Cleo<sup>10</sup> Lorena Hollingsworth McClintic - Fieldcamp, July 31, 1976 age 89 years and 5½ months old. She was born 1 Feb. 1890. She had donated her body to the School of Osteopathic Medical Science, she was not buried. Her daughter Gladys Sloan has a memorial service for her in the Church of Visitation (Catholic) in Des Moines, Iowa. Sis was in the Des Moines General Hospital at the time of her passing. She was the mother of two children, Gladys<sup>11</sup> and Herbert Charles<sup>11</sup> who passed on Mar. 16, 1964 age 50. Notes On "Hollingworth Hall" and their Inhabitants.

"Forty Miles Round Manchester," (1794) by Aiken, tells us that "Hollingworth Hall, or as it is now generally called the Old Hall, is a very ancient, strong stone building, situated by the side of the moors about half a mile from Mottram. It is surrounded with gardens and excellent meadow land and enjoys a pleasant prospect. It still belongs to the family of that name but is now in the occupation of Henry Cardwell, Esq., a very useful and active member of society ... Still further, on the very boundary of the moors, is another Hollingworth Hall, the property and residence of John Whittle, Esq., it is a large stone building with spacious rooms in antique style and provided with extensive and commodious outhouses."

Indeed, there were, in 1794, and for centuries before that, two distinct and separate halls by the name of Hollingworth. The former is still standing, and called Old, or Nearer Hall. A photograph of it is in our HR of 1972, Vol. 8, p. 22 opposite. The latter, residence of Daniel Whittle in 1794, is the renowned, and controversial, building pictured in the front of Stewart's book, which, sadly, was demolished in 1944 to make way for "water projects."

"Annals of Hyde," by Thomas Middleton, written in 1899, gives us a bit of solid information under "The de Hollingworthe Family," stating up front that "This ancient Longdendale family was seated in the township of Hollingworth as far back as the reign of King John...One branch of this old family terminated in a female heiress about the time of Edward First. Through the reigns of Edward III and Henry IV and other sovereigns, the old name, however, figures as owner (another family supposed to be descended from the same parent stock)... The estate passes on, from father to son, in the old line until the middle of the last century, when Jacob Hollingworth sold the manor and manor house to one Daniel Whittle. In the present century the Whittles conveyed them to Robert Hollingworth, who was descended from the early lords of Hollingworth, and who assumed the old name, De Hollyngworthe. This (man) was a captain in the 6th Dragoon Guards ... in India. He was a Deputy-Lieutenant for the County and a magistrate, much respected in Hyde. He died Jan 31st 1865. Capt. De Hollyngworthe left the estate and hall to his brother Dennis Hollingworth who sold them the following year 1866.

"An account of Hollingworth Hall from the 'Manors of England and Wales' published some years ago stated: The Hall is very ancient and retains its original site, and remains of stonework bearing Edwardian origin yet exist; but the general character of the building refers to the period of Henry VI. It was originally a quadrangle with chapel, great hall and gate house tower, the latter is still standing. A few relics of ancient armour, old pictures and stag antlers of great size hung upon the walls of the old dining hall, and many of the rooms still retain their tapestried hangings." A glimpse inside the legendary hall!
