WILLIAM AND ELIZABETH (LEE) HOLLINGSWORTH FOUND IN ENGLAND!

"What Took You So Long?" or "It Took a Long Time!" were other choices for a title to this article. Ticked by the entry (p. 57) in the Doniphan Co., Kansas 1870 Census, of Joseph and Athalia Hollingsworth, I consulted the Genealogical Society's IGI (International Genealogical Index) for Nottinghamshire, England and found the following:

Hollingsworth, William & Elizabeth Lee, (married) 26 May 1817,
at (Parish of) Winthorpe, Nottinghamshire (England).

That was easy. Twenty years ago it was impossible to use microfiche - or any facility - to solve a genealogical problem that quickly. On the inside back cover of our July 1965 issue (long since omitted in reprints), in our erstwhile query section, we published a request by then subscriber Algar H. Dole (1501 N. 5th, Arkansas City, Kansas 67005) for information about William Hollingsworth "from Mottram, England, to Quebec, Canada." Later it was found that he came from Nottinghamshire. In our first issues, we published all printed marriages from W. P. W. Phillimore's series for that shire. Phillimore usually cut off his extracts at the end of 1812. Hence the above entry from Winthorpe was not printed. The IGI ignores such arbitrary cutoff dates.

The original or filmed registers should be checked, to guard against copy errors (there are PLENTY in IGI) and to gather maximum data, such as ages of parties, sometimes parentage, and whether the wedding was by banns or licence. A licence or bond may yield more data. (The Nottinghamshire Marriage Licences recently published here did not cover 1817 though the Peculiar of Southwell did. Winthorpe lies just outside the Peculiar - tough luck.)

I suggested to Mr. Dole in 1966 various Nottinghamshire parishes to search. Attenborough was among them. I never heard if he had any success. The clue which I used in examining the IGI for double confirmation of this find is in Mr. Dole's communication of 3 Mar 1966. There he states that John Hollingsworth's tombstone in the Protestant Cemetery at West Brome, Province of Quebec, Canada, (a son of William and Elizabeth (Lee) Hollingsworth) gives 22 Sept 1818 as birthdate. (If you know what I know about 'attitudes' in Quebec, you would marvel wonderously that there could even BE a Protestant, let alone a Protestant Cemetery, in all of that Gaullist stronghold! It is also astonishing to know the inscription is allowed to be in English! 'Vive la France!' - Poooh! Nay: God Save Our Gracious Queen! England FOREVER!) The IGI gives this data:

"John Hollingsworth, son of William & Elizabeth, baptised 29 Sept 1819, at North Muskham Parish Church (Established - H.H.)."

Algar Dole believed the tombstone might be off a year. A manuscript sent by his cousin, Nellie Armstrong, to a correspondent of mine, stated unequivocally that the year was 1819.

The oldest child, Sarah, was baptised 20 Mar 1818 at North Muskham. This parish adjoins Winthorpe on the northwest, and is in the Peculiar of Southwell. One other, Ann, was baptised there 15 Sep 1823.

South Muskham is a companion parish. A curious thing happened. Your editor was reading the some 43 page file dating between 1964 and 1966, and discovered news of an estate and will of a testator who had lived at "South Markham, Notts., England," who left a bequest to Joseph Hollingsworth at Ashton, Kansas. The date of this letter is Nov. 8, 1965. The date this letter was re-read was Nov. 8, 1985! But although a search for this place revealed that there is no "South Markham" in Nottinghamshire, we did not realize that this probably is an error for "South Muskham."

Mr. Dole enclosed typed copies of two letters, one dated Mar 21, 1901, from the editor of the Severance, Kansas News to Joseph Hollingsworth of Ashton, Kansas, advising him of his good fortune. The 2nd letter is interesting:

Dear Sir;

In reply to yours of the 28th of June I received a letter from you in March 1901 respecting the claim of Joseph Hollingsworth to which I replied on April 26th, and though full instructions were given as to what he was to do to establish his identity to receive the small legacy due to him I have received no reply. I wrote Mr. Hollingsworth on the 2nd of this month requesting him if he claimed the amount to send me a certificate of his birth and a written declaration signed by two persons who had known him for many years that he was the person named in such certificate also to furnish me with the name of a bank to whom I could remit the money. When these are to hand I will deal with the matter.

May I request that your clerk puts the proper amount of postage on, this is the second time I have had to pay upon your letters.

Unfortunately there is no further of this matter. In a later issue of HR we'll report on our 20-year-late followup. William and Elizabeth (Lee) Hollingsworth came to Canada in the mid 1820s and lived at Laprairie, P.Q. near Montreal, but supposedly later went to Brome Co. in the same Province. The descendants listed seven children. We have apparently found one more - the above Ann - who probably died before the parents left Nottingham. In order, the list is Sarah, m. John Jones; John, m. Sarah Stowe; William, m. Avis Kingsley (he was the stage driver at Beloit, Wisconsin in 1850); Henry Lee, m. Ann Maria Carson; Elizabeth, m. Peter Wells; Joseph, m. Lucy Athalia Vickery and Robert S., who m. Emily McCracken. We intend to make up for lost time and give you some further history of the family. (The name of Dole in Kansas, by the way, is a hot item these days.)

In other words, Dora Hollingsworth died in October, 1879, not 1880, because Mortality lists contained deaths of persons from 1 June to 31 May of the "Census Year" prior to 1 June 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1880. In HR June, 1983, p. 28, we printed Caddo Parish, from the HUNTING FOR BEARS INC. series, Box 278, Hammond, La., 70404, p.112. They have published nearly every marriage from every parish. The drawbacks to this system are manifest: name of officiant not given; book and page not given; and in a number of cases, it is not possible to tell bride from groom because of the 'Southern' style initials. (In our own lifetime we knew "J. T. Newcomer" and "D. A. Oxford," and the latter's dear old grandfather, "W. W. Martin," the last named called "Dubyah Dubyah." At one point in history legislation was surely introduced to curtail the useage of initials, because of the resulting confusion. It probably didn't get past His Honor, Judge E. B. Talliafero, J. R.! We were not able to find the book for Plaquemines Parish, or one other, known to be in this marvelous Hunting for Bears collection.)

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Note on Above: They rest in Fairlawn cemetery, a large and beautiful cemetery in the southeast part of Hutchinson, bounded by Avenue G on the south, Carey Blvd. on the north, Halsted St. on the east. The burials there were started in December, 1918.

A TORERO IN THE HOUSE!

If you know Spanish you know what a torero is. There are not many Anglo families who can claim to have one in their number. The Wexford, Ireland, Hollingsworths now do so herewith! Kirk Farrell is his name, and bullfighting is his game ... profession, that is. Kirk is the 33-year-old son of Clifford and June Virginia (Sladek) Farrell, of Homewood, Alabama. His mother's parents were Matt and Madge (Hollingsworth) Sladek, late of Newton, Iowa. Madge was the daughter of Jacob and Georgia (Titmus) Hollingsworth. And Jacob was your editor's **great-granddad's** next younger brother, both being sons of Immigrant Frederick Hollingsworth.

The Houston Post for Tuesday July 30, 1985 has a good story by staff writer Patricia Manson on two Houston (Texas) men who have taken to the bull ring to earn money. Tracy Viser and Kirk Farrell are the men spotlighted, purely, you see, because they are not Hispanics. The profession is dominated by Latins, of course, and most Americans are just as content as they can be about that fact. Aside from the brutality that is charged, it is, of course, hazardous to the torero's health as well. Kirk's first pro bullfight was held at Nuevo Laredo, Estado Tamaulipas, Mexico, on Saturday July 27th. The bull ran from him!

And we thought all bulls were brave! Yes: "The bull ran away from me," said Kirk following the corrida. "I chased him around the ring. He was a coward." But the beast did knock him down three times before he killed it. Farrell had praise for his fellow torero, Tracy Viser, who, said Kirk, "had more style than anyone in the ring."

Kirk, whose professional name is "Miguelin," for Miguel - his full name is Kirklin Michael Farrell, born 15 Oct 1951 - first got interested in bullfighting when he saw "Blood and Sand," that 1941 Fox epic with Tyrone Power, Laird Cregar et al, from the novel by Blasco Ibanez. Although new in the bullring as a professional, he explained that in 1969 he had trained with a matador in Mexico for a year. In his not-quite-as-public 'other' profession, he is manager of the Montecristo's seafood restaurant in Houston. But he still manages to practice as a torero for 2 hours a day.

The bullfight was sponsored by former matador Rudy Morales, who founded El Calesero (this term was a positive headache for your editor to translate: even native Mexicans didn't know it and we are not sure that this club name means what our research shows: Calesero - the driver of la calesa - the calash, a horse drawn buggy with a folding hood probably in this case referring to the conveyance which used to bring the aficionados to see the bull fights), a Houston bullfighting club with about 40 members.

Miguelin is not yet a "matador." He is a novillero, or novice. It takes time to become a matador.

More than three fourths of the some 600 in the bull ring to watch the event were Americans, who got a great kick out of seeing Farrell and Viser at work. Four bulls "competed," the event was also sponsored by Cerveza Superior, and the action took place at the Plaza de Toros in the La Fiesta Bullring.

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OBITUARY: (1) RALEIGH POTTER HOLLINGSWORTH

Former HR subscriber and valued correspondent and contributor, died Sunday, 30 Jan 1983 at Mesa, Arizona. Raleigh P. Hollingsworth was born June 24, 1920 at Burning Springs, Clay County, Kentucky, a son of Elbert and Gertrude (Rawlings) Hollingsworth. He is survived by his mother, of Burning Springs, three daughters, Diana Niece, Anaheim, CA, Sharon Mallard and Lauren Hollingsworth, both of Seattle, Wash. Also survived by a grandson, and two sisters, Dorothy Hale and Ocie McGeorge of Burning Springs. Funeral services were held Mon. 7 Feb. 1983, at the Waverley Church, Fairhaven Memorial Park in Santa Ana, California, with Pastor Clement Shoemaker officiating, under direction of Fairhaven Mortuary. He was buried in Section AK, Space 1, Block 946. (From The Manchester Enterprise, Clay County, Kentucky, Feb. 1983, by kindness of Capt. Jesse C. L. Hollingsworth, 314 Elm Street, Franklin, Ohio 45005, and the funeral leaflet also enclosed in Jesse's letter of 20 October 1985. The letter itself reads, in part:-

Raleigh graduated from High School in Kentucky. After a series of odd jobs during the Great Depression, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1939. Enlisting as an apprentice seaman, he attained the rank of Chief upon discharge after World War Two. He was a decorated veteran

with six battle-stars including the Purple Heart. He served aboard the aircraft carrier USS RANGER and for two years and five months on the destroyer USS CHAMPLIN-DD601 in the Atlantic and Mediterranean.

The Champlin while escorting with other ships the Convoy UGS-6 eastward on the main line, New York - to - Casablanca sank the German submarine U-130 on 12 March 1944 near the Azores. On 7 Apr 1944, the Champlin in conjunction with the destroyer HUSE sank the U-856. It was a running battle in which the U-856 surfaced and was rammed by the Champlin. The captain of the Champlin, Commander Schaffer, was mortally wounded and Raleigh was one of three enlisted men who were wounded.

Following the war, Raleigh graduated from the University of Kentucky with a degree in accounting. Shortly thereafter, he joined the U.S. Bureau of Internal Revenue. At the time of his retirement he was Manager of the Bureau for the State of Washington.

His beloved wife, Gloria Whitman, preceded him in death.

Using deeds of record and maps, Raleigh and I in the past several years made field trips to the important counties of our direct line. We stood upon land owned by our ancestors in Clay County, Ky., Morgan County, Indiana, Gasconade County, Missouri and Ashe County, North Carolina. Now, perhaps I can make it to Maryland in honor of my friend and nephew, Raleigh Hollingsworth.

Raleigh loved to travel both overseas and in the States. In his last letter to me dated 9 Jan 1983 the first paragraph read:

"I am here in Apache Junction, some 20 or 30 miles east of Phoenix. The fabled Superstition Mountains are about 10 miles to the east. They look about 2 woods and a long iron away. Wierd!"

It was there in Arizona that he died in his trailer.

We entered a plea for information about the passing of Raleigh Hollingsworth in our June issue, and Capt. Hollingsworth has satisfied all of our wishes. In his letter quoted above, Jesse explains that his father, Daniel Boone Hollingsworth, was twice married. The first wife was Emily Lunsford, who died 22 Oct 1908 in Clay Co., Kentucky. Elbert Hollingsworth was a child of that marriage. Daniel then married Jane Lewis, who was the mother of Capt. Jesse C. L. Hollingsworth. Therefore, as Jesse says, Elbert was his half-brother and Raleigh was his half-nephew.

And also of Isaac Hollingsworth, (brother of Jacob) (b. 1780, N.C. died 1866, Newton Co., Miss.) are buried there. Andrew Jackson Hollingsworth, son of Isaac and grandson of Jacob Hollingsworth, settled in this area and married Mary Jane Riser, daughter of David Riser and Nancy Hollingsworth. Isaac Hollingsworth (3), a brother to Andrew Jackson Hollingsworth, married Catherine Riser, a daughter of the same couple, and also granddaughter of Isaac Hollingsworth, Sr. also settled in this area. This was two blockswest and one & 1/2 blocks south of the W. I. Hollingsworth Bldg. we mention on page 51, although not yet constructed. Did W. I. Hollingsworth go to see his (very, very distant cousin) in the show? Who can say now!

(6) The Hawthorne Advertiser-Press of June 28, 1972, found by your editor (found and lost for a decade) an article titled Tours explore phone company's facilities, mentions Ralph Hollingsworth. He was one of the Hawthorne branch of PT&T's Community Relations Team. The Hawthorne Chamber of Commerce and governmental officials toured the company's facility at 12722 S. Birch Avenue.

"Onetime Largest Poured Concrete Building in the World" is Gone!

Built about 1903, the once elegant building stood for 83 years. Anybody who has visited the Biltmore Hotel at 5th and Olive in downtown Los Angeles has looked across northeasterly and seen the Temple Baptist Church, or, lately, the closed up former home thereof. Those here before 1965 remember it as the Philharmonic Auditorium, home of the L.A. Philharmonic Orchestra for ever so many years, and predecessor of the new Music Center. Yes, at one time it was the largest of its kind anywhere - poured concrete. Yup! It is now ... a parking lot! Your editor saw the wrecking ball hit it the first day, Monday, 18 March 1985. He was attracted by the horrendous noise the impact of the huge ball made. The north wall was so stout the damage seemed to be slight! He alerted all news media. Why?

Well, Nan (Crawford) Hollingsworth, editor's mother, made her last legitimate stage appearance on the stage of the Philharmonic in Los Angeles. It was the week of May 11, 1942 when the Los Angeles Civic Light Opera Association opened the 1942 season at the Philharmonic with The Vagabond King, music by Rudolf Friml from the old play "If I Were King," (remember the 1938 movie starring Ronald Colman and Basil Rathbone?). It starred John Carradine as King Louis XI. of France, the so-called Universal Spider, and Bob Lawrence as Francois Villon the vagabond poet of Paris (legend) in the late 1400s.

Mother played Margot, the tavern keeper, and was third in order of appearance in the opening act. Others in the cast were Melville Cooper, John Davidson, and Arthur Q. Bryan, to name those our readers might remember from old movies or see on the Late Late Show. Bryan was the creator of the voice of "Elmer Fudd" in the "Bugs Bunny" cartoons. He bought your editor, then **ten** years old, a bag of hard lemon drops on the train bound for San Francisco the next weekend. (Yours truly was sick with measles when the play was on in Los Angeles, so Mother took him to the Curran Theater - still there - in San Francisco for a look at the show.) At that time, Carradine was the familiar, gaunt and "cadaverous" chap we see in some of Universal's Dracula-Frankenstein epics. He seemed to be half amused by a ten year old boy's imitation of Hitler with the comb and side drooping hair. Forty years after the incident we twice wrote to him to reminisce about it - no answer. At the time the show was in the now gone Philharmonic, Carradine had visited John Barrymore at CBS Radio, and found him dying.

We have a couple of the printed Playgoers ('The Magazine of the Theatre') from the occasion, one signed only by Rudolf Friml!

Farewell, L.A. Philharmonic! Bienvenu! One more parking space.

FOOTNOTE: In the Broadbent Ballet, the premier dancers included Paul Godkin! As you know, the Godkins came from Co Wexford, Ireland and were related several times by marriage to our "Hollingsworths." What a shock to see this name today as we studied the programme!

By kindness of former subscriber, Mrs. Jane Brent of Raymond, Mississippi. The marriage took place about 1967.)

(3) Elston-Hollingsworth. Susan Kym Hollingsworth and Robert Trevor Elston, both of Kingston (Ontario, Canada) recently (1976) exchanged wedding vows in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police chapel in Regina, Saskatchewan, Rev. Dr. Martin officiated. Given in marriage

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by her brother, Brian Hollingsworth, of London (Ontario) the bride was attended by Miss Laura Elston of Kingston as maid of honor. Miss Krista McCreary of Carleton Place was the bridesmaid.

(1) Richard Hollingworth, Boothby, Co Lincoln LCC 1615/177.

6 June 1615. Richard Hollingworth, Boothby Pagnel. Soul to God; to be buried in the church or churchyard. Four ewes and four lambes and four ewe hoggs at Estwell to sister Barbara Welliner of Great Ponton to haue them at hir disposing. Three pounds ... I have bond for of Hugh Bidkin (?) of Wordlee? to Thomas Willm. and Elizabeth Welliner ... to be putt forth ... untill they come to sixteen years... eight shepe at Estwell to Willm. Hollingworth's 6 children... eight sheepe to Elizabeth and Richard Pearsonal hir son...a ewe and a lambe that was Katherin Daniel to Mary, dau. of Thomas Spraggin... 3 shillings 4 pence to Dorothy Thornton... 3 shillings 4 pence to Mary Wagstaffe. Item. I giue one paire of my shoes & a Cloke and a hatt and the rest of my corparrell to George Welliner. Item. I giue all the rest of my goods vnbequeathed to Henry Hollingworth, whome I do make my full executor to see my body decently brought to the ground... Richard Parcifall ten shillings...5 shillings to Anne Spraggin ... 5 sh. to the poore of this parish and I doe giue fiue shillings for a winding sheete and I do giue xij d. to the Church And I do giue v s. to be bestowed in bread and drinke at my burial. RICHARD HOLLINGWORTH his marke. Witnesses Thomas Spraggin, Daniel Lambe. Proved at Grantham, Lincolnshire xiiijth die mensis Junij A.D. 1615. (June 14th - Ed.)

More soon. The above Henry Hollingworth is another possible equal for Henry Hollinworth, father of Valentine. Estwell is probably Eastwell, a parish in Leicestershire near the Lincolnshire border. Boothby Pagnell is nearby, and also near Grantham and Great Ponton.

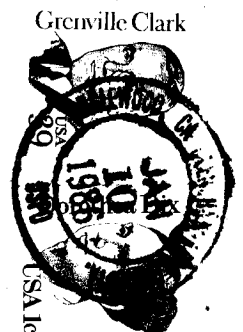
