


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# H O L L I N G S W O R T H      R E G I S T E R

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Well, here we begin our 21st year. We have backlogs of information on many families but not key families. Not families whose ancestors belong to our subscribers, who are hoping HR can bring forth a breakthrough. Who was Henry Hollinworth's father? Where in England was he born? Can we prove "Mystery Sam"'s lineage? How about George Hollandsworth of Wythe (pronounced WITH) Co., Virginia? Where are his roots? And for your editor's benefit: Where in England did our County Wexford, Ireland Hollinsworth originate? The answers elude us!

Benton - Calhoun County, Alabama Hollingsworth Records

Most of this data comes from Old Records of Estates and Administrations of Benton (Calhoun) County, Alabama (1977 et seq) in several volumes, published by North-East Alabama Genealogical Society, Inc., Box 674, Gadsden, AL 35902. The compiler: Cathrine Cleek Mann. Benton County was formed in 1832 and named after Thomas Hart Benton. But in 1858 the name was changed to honor John C. Calhoun (need we wonder why?). That was 3 years before the war. These are mostly the probate records of our family name.

(1) Jesse McBees estate, Aug 4, 1840. Henry McBees appointed Administrator, with Isham McBees and Benjamin Hollingsworth as security.

(2) James M. Mitchell estate, Sep 20, 1838. Benjamin and W. B. Hollingsworth having open accounts on Store Books; John Hollingsworth among those with notes supposed to be good when due.

(3) William Landers estate, Mar 7, 1845. Edmund Landers, minor over 14, selects Stacy Strickland his mother and natural guardian; appointed. Apr 22, 1850, receipts signed by several persons, E. B. Landers, G. M. Landers, Jesse A. Landers and Wm. M. Landers for \$300 ea, to Stacy Hollingsworth, guardian in full of shares of estate of Wm. Landers, deceased. May 7, 1860, Joshua Teague and James R. Black as secur. on guardian bonds of Stacy Hollingsworth, late Stacy Strickland as guardian of her sons Edward, Jesse A., George and Marion Landers, requesting she make final settlement. May 14, 1860 final settlement.

(4) John M. Love estate Dec 2, 1861. Buyers: J. D. Hollingsworth.

(5) John Gay estate Nov 9, 1838. Benjamin Hollingsworth appraiser. May 18, 1839 Col. Benjamin Hollingsworth, Jacksonville, Ala., appointed administrator. Petition of same to sell real estate. Apr 2, 1841, he makes final settlement. Feb. 24, 1840, W. B. Hollingsworth a buyer at the John Gay estate.

(6) Wm. Goddard estate Feb 9, 1836. W.B. Hollingsworth, S. Hollingsworth, buyers at sale.

(7) Meredith Hall estate Nov 22, 1856. John Hollingsworth app. administrator after renunciation of executrix Obedience Hall; petition to sell land Nov 2, 1857; Notice to file annual (?) settlement June 11, 1858.

(8) David C. Haslett estate Nov 7, 1856. James Hollingsworth was appraiser.

(9) Thomas Henderson estate Oct 15, 1857. J. D. Hollingsworth appraiser.

(10) J. D. Hollingsworth a juror, Dec 31, 1859, to try the validity of the last will and testament of Henry Amonne.

(11) Geo. W. Blackburn estate Dec 3, 1860. J. D. H. a buyer.

(12) George Box will (Book B, p. 85 Apr 8, 1840) witnessed by W. B. Hollingsworth. Apr 25, 1840, Benjamin Hollingsworth surety.

(13) George Broyles estate, sale Jan 24, 1860, P. S. Hollingsworth a buyer.

(14) Thomas Crutchfield estate, sale Jul 11, 1850, Samuel Hollingsworth a buyer.

(15) Joshua Draper estate, sale Dec 15, 1857, J. D. Hollingsworth a buyer.

NOTE: This ends incidental entries. J.D. Hollingsworth was James Daniel Hollingsworth, this we know from other sources. Now we give the Hollingsworth estates.

(16) Wiley B. Hollingsworth estate, Nov 5, 1840. Benjamin Hollingsworth and Warren Harris, administrators. Bond \$10,000.

(17) Benjamin Hollingsworth will, proved Sep 7, 1844. Dated at Walnut Spring, Benton County 1 May 1841 'having a long journey in view and expect to start on the second Instant...' Wife Joicy.. Benjamin Benton and Orlando (sons as we learn from other sources, but not so called in will) an education ... Arsenath and Doctor Allen have had a full share ... Stephen and Wyly in his life time both had share... when Mary An Kelly Hannah Balzare Benjamin Benton & Orlando shal have receiv'd ... \$700. then ballance to be Equally Divided between Stephen Mary Belzare (sic) Benjamin Benton Orlando and my grandson Thomas Hollingsworth son of Wyly B. Hollingsworth... Arsenath Allen has had more than her ... part. Wits: Selena Box, William X his mark Davis. Signed and sealed. Inventory 12 slaves and much stock, household and farm goods; notes on S.P. Hollingsworth and also due to Hollingsworth & Harris as administrators of W. B. Hollingsworth deceased for \$45.69 due 5 Jan'y 1842. Total valuation \$5,652.91. Joicy Hollingsworth, Executrix, oath 1 Oct 1844 on inventory.

NOTE: Above will is not in the publication we quote above. It appears only in Hollingsworth Register, June 1972, (8:45) pp. 45-48. It is from the original will at the State Library and Archives in Montgomery. Apparently no will book containing a recorded copy now exists at the County Courthouse at Anniston. In HR we made a full copy.

(18) Henry Hollingsworth estate intestate. Jan 6, 1846. Appraised by Nathaniel H. Mullins, Joel Burden and John H. Burton. William J. Willis, Administrator. Sale Jan 9, 1846. Personal property. Buyers James T. Williams, Elijah Teague, Wm. E. Kerr, N. H. Mullins, Rachel Hollingsworth, D. A. Jackson, Caleb Morgan, Elias Howell, Barney McCartney, John H. Burton, Elias Teague.

Jan 17, 1846. Petition of Rachel Hollingsworth for dower. She was lawful wife of Henry Hollingsworth who died Aug 18, 1845. Land West  $\frac{1}{2}$  of SW  $\frac{1}{4}$  of Section 9, Township 14, Range 9 - 80 and 37/100 acres. The children and heirs listed are: Joicy Witt, formerly Hollingsworth now wife of William Witt, of lawful age and resides in Cherokee Co., Alabama (married 19 Sept 1843 - Ed.); Mary Hollingsworth, lawful age,

and resides with Petitioner in Benton Co., Alabama; and Jacob J., Amadah M., Hannah G., John, Salina, and Joahua S. Hollingsworth, infants (a legal term for minors - Ed) under the age of 21 and reside in Benton Co. with Petitioner.

Mar 10, 1846 Writ to lay off dower. Done Mar 16.; Nov 6, Administrator, William J. Willis, states the Estate is insolvent; Nov 17, Petition by same, who is also Sheriff, to sell real estate to pay debts. Heirs listed as same as above. Mar 1, 1847. Report of sale of land to Rachel Hollingsworth. \$10.00. Nov. 11, 1847. Statement of final settlement. Heirs as listed above.

(19) Jacob J. Hollingsworth estate, intestate. Sep 5, 1854, Nancy E. Hollingsworth app. Administratrix, with Henry Gains. Bond \$500. Nov 3, 1854, appraisal by John M. Whiteside, Elias Teague and O.D. Whiteside. Nov. 4, 1854, sale of personal property. Buyers: William Whitesides (sic), Barney Mary (?), Nancy E. Hollingsworth (sic), S.L. Canon, Robert K. Waugh (?), O.D. Whiteside and Henry Mary (?).

(20) John T. Hollingsworth (also Senior) estate, intestate. June 13, 1865, James R. Hollingsworth app. Administrator with G. W. Leech, D. F. Shuford and W. B. Wynn. Bond \$1,500. Petition of James R. Hollingsworth same date, stating John Hollingsworth, Sr. died the last of April 1865. Left these heirs: Widow Mary, children of decedent's eldest son, Wesley Hollingsworth, whose names, etc., Petitioner is unable to state except that Wesley was living at the time of his death in Shelby Co., Alabama; Mary Glover, residing in Calhoun Co. and is over 21; William, last heard from resided St. Clair Co. Ala over 21; James R., over 21 - Petitioner, son; Susan, w of Wm. Bonds, resides in Calhoun Co. and over 21; Harrison, last heard from resided in Arkansas, and over 21; Samuel A., in Calhoun Co. over 21; John, last heard from, res. in St. Clair Co., over 21; Charles C., in Arkansas, over 21; and Warren G., Arkansas, over 21.

There follow many re-statements of these heirs' whereabouts. On June 16, 1865 the inventory and appraisal returned; On Sep 6, Petition widow Mary Hollingsworth for assignment of dower. Land the East  $\frac{1}{2}$  of Southeast Quarter of Section 25, Township 14, Range 8. Petitioner and decedent married in 1854 in Calhoun Co., Ala (not mother of children apparently - Ed.). May 20, 1867 again list heirs and finally Mar 3, 1868. In 1867 list, all data same except Samuel Hollingsworth, then at Cane Break, Alabama, County not known (Cane Break not known either- Editor!).

(21) Rachel Hollingsworth (widow of Henry) estate, Intestate. Oct 7, 1871 App. to change order of sale of land. Dec 29, 1873 Pet. for Letters of Administration by John Hollingsworth and Hannah E. Turner, children and heirs. Rachel died at her residence in Calhoun Co. on Oct 17, 1873. Heirs: Joicy Witt, w of Wm. C. Witt, full age, resides at Howard P.O., Texas; Mary Willingham, w of John Willingham, full age, resides in Etowah Co., Ala.; Wm. H. Hollingsworth, minor son of Jacob J. Hollingsworth, deceased, Calhoun Co.; Amanda M. Roberts, w of Wm. Roberts, full age, res "Pontatauch" Co., Mississippi (Pontotoc); Joshua Hollingsworth, full age, Texas; Saline Hollingsworth and petitioners, all over 21 years of age.

Dec 31, 1873. Petition to rent land; sell personal property;  
Jan 22, 1874, list of pers. prop. sold. Buyers were Selina Hollingsworth, John Hollingsworth, H. E. Turner and Amanda Roberts and 23 others.

Case continues to go until Mar 15, 1877, listing heirs over and over again. (The last date is statement for final settlement.) The heirs listed June 19, 1874 are (1) H. E. Turner, widow of Turner, dec.; (2) John Hollingsworth; (3) Salina Steward, w of J.C. Steward; (4) Wm. Henry Hollingsworth, minor son of J.J. Hollingsworth, dec., said minor now about 19; (5) Joicey Witt, w of Wm. C. Witt, who res. in Bell Co., Tex., Howard P.O.; (6) Mary Willingham, w of John G. Willingham, res. in Etowah Co., Alabama; (7) Amanda M. Robards, w of Wm. F. Robards, who res. in "Pantaloch" Co., Miss. Poplar Springs P.O.; (8) J.S. Hollingsworth, at Russ P.O., Cherokee Co., Alabama. On Mar 15, 1877, J.S. Hollingsworth was at Smithwick P.O., Texas; Joicy Witt at Mofett P.O. Texas; Amanda Roberts at Elliston P.O. Mississippi; John Hollingsworth, Calhoun Co., Al; H. E. Turner, ditto; Wm. H. Hollingsworth and Mary Willingham, ditto; Celina Stewart, Cherokee Co., Ala. (From receipt, her husband was T. C. Stewart.)

CONCLUDED. To explain some of the above families: Benjamin Hollingsworth was son of Jacob and Mary (Brooks) H. of Franklin Co., Georgia. We are certain that Henry Hollingsworth (d 1845) is Ben's nephew, a son of Samuel and Mary (Garner) Hollingsworth who was a minor at the death of his own father, and chose said uncle Benjamin as guardian. This is a very valuable find. Son Jacob J. was doubtless a namesake of Henry's own brother Jacob J. Hollingsworth, another of Sam's minors. Wyly or Wiley B. Hollingsworth was a named son of Col. Benjamin Hollingsworth. This completes our understanding of the family from Franklin Co., Ga. (See Stewart, p. 145.) As for John T. Hollingsworth or "Senior" we have no idea of his lineage. Mr. Leonard B. Stephens, 22141 Raven Way, Grand Terrace; Calif. 92324, sent HR a full Xerox copy of the above file. J. R. Hollingsworth the administrator signs consistently as Hollinsworth in a crude hand. The Census of 1850 shows John born in Virginia, aged 65, living with wife Susannah, 63, also born Virginia. He married (2) Mary Watson on 22 Aug 1854 (see further). HR June, 1967 also shows his son Wesley, 43, born South Carolina, and son William, 39, born S.C. and their families in Blount Co., Alabama 1850. Son Samuel A. 22, born S.C., is in Benton County with family, a short way from his father. John, probably the son, 27, is also in Benton (now Calhoun) Co., also b. S.C. In HR June 1968, p. 70, we find Harrison Hollingsworth, 31, and W. G. Hollingsworth, 22, both born S.C. in Dallas Co., Arkansas, 1850.

On the other items of incidental worth, Stacy Hollingsworth is apparently the Susan Hollingsworth with Stricklins and Landers in her household, aged 47, born S.C. She is listed as Stacy, 58f, born S.C. in 1860 Calhoun Co. (HR June 1971 p. 62) living alone. J. D. Hollingsworth, or James Daniel, came over from Union Co., South Carolina after 1845. Your editor worked on his family in 1964 for Noel Hollingsworth of Mexia, Texas, who was his descendant. James D. was a son of Benjamin<sup>6</sup>Hollingsworth, Jr. (Benj.<sup>5</sup>; Elias<sup>4</sup>; Jacob<sup>3</sup>; Thomas<sup>2</sup>; Valentine<sup>1</sup>; Henry<sup>a</sup> Hollinworth).

There you have it. This is a fine collection. Now the marriages which will add more to your knowledge:

In letter 14 Jan 1963 from Mrs. M. C. Wheelwright of Des Moines, Iowa, (professional genealogist we hired) quoting a Story County Cemetery book by one Mrs. Sass of Ames, Iowa. Center or North St. Peter and Paul Cemetery, 6 mi. north of Gilbert west of Story City, Iowa. She adds that Benjamin married 2nd 1891, Jane (Pennington) Platt. Pierce Hollingsworth, his son, m. 1893 Julia Reischaur; Elizabeth, his daughter, m. 1884 Calvin Johnson and had children Rhoda Maud, Myra Merle & William Grover, all apparently buried in Center Cemetery 1885-1897. Benjamin not found in 1885 Iowa State Census for Story County. This is from our Frederick Hollingsworth file folders, which often have other unrelated lines mixed in. Sorry it took us 23 years to publish it!

HOLLINGSWORTHS IN BIBB COUNTY, GEORGIA

This is all from one record, Book C-3 of Deeds (1830-1834). It is on microfilm 48911 part 12 at the Genealogical Society of Utah. There is the original and a typed exact copy of same on the film. We read the whole book page by page. We hope to get more soon.

- (1) p. 70. Indenture 2 Mar 1827 Eli S. Shorter, Putnam Co., Ga. to John Hollingsworth of Bibb County. \$2500. Part of Lot 1 in Square 4 of town of Macon which will be and remain after taking off from the whole of said lot 30 ft. from the s.e. corner in Bridge St. and running in a direct line to the back line of the same so as to strike it 30 ft from the n. e. cor. thereof etc. Wits: Cornelius Townsend, John W. L. Daniel and Thompson Bird, J.P. Recorded Aug 23, 1830.

(2) p. 71 Ind. 2 Mar 1827, Eli S. Shorter of Putnam Co., Ga. to John M. Fuller, \$500. Lot 1, Square 4, Macon, s.e. corner said lot etc. Recorded Aug 23, 1830.

(3) p. 72. Ind. 6 Aug 1828 from John M. Fuller, Houston Co., Ga. to John Hollingsworth, Junior of Bibb Co. \$200, all that part of Lot 1 in sq. 4, Town of Macon. Begin s.w. corner said lot on Bridge Street thence in westerly direction along said st. 30 feet thence in direct line to northern boundary line of sd. lot thence 30 ft and n.e. corner said lot thence to beginning corner. John M. Fuller (LS). Witnesses James Hollingsworth, Henry B. Hill. James Hollingsworth sworn 23 Aug 1830 before Richard W. Ellis, J.P. Signed James Hollingsworth. Recorded 24 Aug 1830.

CONCLUDED. (It is unusual for a deed like No. 6 above to be written in the lifetime of the father named therein. James did not die until over 20 years after it was set down.) Mrs. Byron W. Frizzell of Johnson City, Tenn. is a descendant of this James Hollingsworth, Sr. He married Elizabeth Newberry from Cumberland County, North Carolina. We have speculated about his parentage. Stewart has it dead wrong! The late Mr. Paul Munger of Arcadia, California, believed James comes from Cumberland County, N.C. also, but never lived to find how. The 1884 book by Wm. Baker Hollingsworth asserts he was a son of Jesse, who may be the Jesse who was in Twiggs County, Ga. in the early 1800s. We have never seen a clear record of James's birthplace or age. He was apparently dead before 1850, when his wife and younger children had removed to Yazoo City, Mississippi. Elizabeth born 1790 in North Carolina, may have been the daughter of Isaac Newberry of that state.

We marked him "not found in 1850." John M. Hollingsworth was a son of James and Elizabeth (Newberry) Hollingsworth of Macon, Bibb (formerly Twiggs) County, Georgia, Stewart, p. 157 concurs. See also HR June 1967, p. 53, Mississippi 1840 item 8, where he is shown in Holmes Co, Mississippi p. 247, and March, 1979, p. 11, where the family record of James and Elizabeth Hollingsworth shows second child John M. born Dec. 25, 1814, (a date hardly anybody would forget) matching the above.

Your editor personally searched Holmes County, Yazoo County, Hinds County, Miss., 1850 Census over again (after 20 years) but still did not find John M. Hollingsworth. We examined other families to see if, somehow, the surname had been garbled. No luck. An examination of the Alabama 1850 Census Index by AIS gave no hope either. John M. Hollingsworth is not to be found. One peculiarity in the Yazoo Census of 1850 may account for this: The enumeration was carried on from 6th Sept to 12th Oct 1850 (pp. 481-497 Federal copy), but for reasons unknown to us, was interrupted until 2 June 1851 and completed 31 July of that year. John M. Hollingsworth may have somehow been overlooked during the 8 month hiatus. This is one of two men of our surname we know to be missed. The other is Addison Hollingsworth, youngest son of Isaac of Newton County, Mississippi in the 1850. As a known head of family there, his name and those of other members of the family are omitted in the Population Schedule. However, as seen below, he is enumerated as a slave owner there.

JOHN CLIFTON HOLLINGSWORTH

John Clifton Hollingsworth, longtime Yazoo City alderman, was born in the county Feb. 17, 1865, the son of Isaac Gordon and Amanda Melvina Hollingsworth. Hollingsworth attended public schools of Yazoo County until 11 when he became associated with his father's mercantile business in which he worked until his father's death in 1887. Then Hollingsworth worked as a brakeman on the Illinois Central about 18 months, clerked in a mercantile store four years and then spent two years in railroad construction on the Yazoo & Mississippi Valley line and the Gulfs Ship Island Railroad.

He was in the general merchandise business in Yazoo City from 1892 until a few years before his death. He was widely known as a cotton buyer. He served 12 years on the city board of aldermen at Yazoo City, representing the second ward.

On Dec. 14, 1887 he married Molly Eleanor Bustin, daughter of Benjamin Hunter and Martha F. Bustin of Sumter County, Alabama. The Hollingsworths had seven children, Douglas Gibson, May Melvina, John C. Jr., Evelyn R., Isaac Hunter, Lucille and Bessie. (From Yazoo County Story (1958) p. 66 Col. 1.)

NOTE: Isaac Gordon Hollingsworth was another child of James and Elizabeth (Newberry) Hollingsworth and brother of John M. Hollingsworth.

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#### HOLLINGSWORTH MISCELLANY:

(1) Your editor suddenly got the desire to see what the original edition of the Authorized, or King James Version, of the Holy Bible, published in 1611, looked like. Our L.A. Central Library had a hard time filling our request. Persistence, and a changing of librarians in the Religion/Philosophy Dept. brought success. Here is the 11th chapter of St. Luke, from the so-called New Testament, Verses 1-4:

AND it came to passe, that as he was praying in a certaine place, when hee ceased, one of his disciples said vnto him, Lord, teach vs to pray, as John also taught his disciples. 2. And hee said vnto them, When ye pray, say, Our Father which art in heauen, Halowed be thy Name Thy kingdome come, Thy will be done as in heauen, so in earth. 3. Giue vs day by day our dayly bread. 3. And forgiue vs our sinnes: for we also forgiue euery one that is indebted to vs. And lead vs not into temptation, but deliuer vs from euill.

Now you see, if you compare this to the present text, the meaning of the statement on the cover of most KJ bibles: "with the former translations diligently compared and revised." That referred to the 1611 (above) text, but it's easy to tell that this revision has been revised! (Above from the so-called Great She Bible.)

(2) The New York Daily News has a column called Harry's Picks in

the sports section. Harry Hollingsworth (not your editor) is the man. Seems he's correctly predicted the outcomes of 22 of 29 college football bowl games against the spread the past two years. Now he's tabbed correctly one of the games with Bowling Green and Fresno. (Your editor's weakest subject is math, so that can't be him.) From N.Y.D. (4) Darrell Hollingsworth is the new head basketball coach at Blanchester High School, Wilmington, Ohio, News Journal of Aug. 28, 1985, reports. He had coached at Wilmington, Ohio for nine years, four as freshman basketball coach and five as boys reserve coach. He has a 36-20 record in South Central Ohio League reserve contests. He graduated in 1970 from Clinton-Massie High. His former boss, Wilmington High athletic director John Gayhardt praised Darrell calling him "everything you ask for in a coach." (Sent to us by correspondent Martha B. Hollingsworth of Wilmington, Ohio. Blanchester is a small town in the southwest sector of Clinton County, a few miles northeast of Cincinnati.)

(5) Eileen H. Gray of Florence, Oregon, reports that an episode of ABC TV hit THE FALL GUY aired Sat. 4 Jan 1986, was directed by Hollingsworth Morse. We have yet to contact him about his first name. We first heard of him in 1960 when cousin Madge Sladek in Newton, Iowa wrote asking who he was. (We're slow!)

(6) Eileen also says that a Sgt. Steve Hollingsworth, of the Portland, Oregon, police dept., was on KOIN TV in early January 1986. \*

(7) In trying to get the marriage lines (as they used to say in Ireland) of Great-grandparents William Crawford and Alice Birt (or her Americanized name Burt) in 1854, we are looking for the registers of the Bloomingdale Methodist Episcopal Church, which stood, even as of 1941, at 253 West 43rd Street, Manhattan, New York. So far, no luck (although we have a brief extract made in 1880 for Alice's pension on Bill's Regular Army service). 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### John T. Hollingsworth

A prominent and thrifty farmer and stock dealer of the county is the sixth of a family of seven children born to Joseph and Elizabeth (Palmer) Hollingsworth, mention of whom is made elsewhere in this work. He was born near where he now lives Nov 1, 1846, and was reared on his parents' large farm. He secured a very good common school education, and when 21 years of age married and settled on his present farm. He has been quite prosperous in his business ventures, and now owns 218 acres of very fine land, well improved. He deals in live stock of all kinds, and is an extensive shipper. He is a member of the Christian Church, and his wife is a Presbyterian. He has always been a firm and zealous Democrat, and has deservedly won the respect of his fellowmen. He was married Oct 12, 1871, to Louisa Simpson, of Bruceville, who died Nov 17, 1879, after having borne 4 children, all of whom are deceased. Nov 29, 1882, he took for his 2nd wife Maggie Patterson, of this county. They have one child, Anna E., now over 2 years old. (From History of Knox and Daviess Counties, Indiana (1886) Goodspeed Pub. Co., Chicago, p. 560 from Palmyra Twp., Knox County section.)

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

The photos may have been made about 1919, when the hall was sold, not just before its demolition in 1944 and not for Frederic Attwood. We still have copies for the \$10.00 offer.

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At present we are trying to get more information about Michael Harrison of Marlea (now Maharlave) Co. Antrim, (now Northern) Ireland, (d 1683) the man who seems to figure prominently with Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr. in Ireland. He was somehow related to Valentine Blacker, neighbor of Hollingsworth's (Blacker's wife was the daughter of another Michael Harrison). He purchased Ballyvickcrannell farm from the Copes and sold it outright to Hollingsworth. He was nearly murdered in the Rebellion of 1641 and also had dealings with the St. Johns, who held Tanderagee, where Ann Wray Hollingsworth was born.
