EDITORIAL: Dating Your Memories! Saturday, March 6, 1948.

Have you ever turned up old photos, or other memorabilia, which you know are treasures, but are at a loss to fix a date for them? (See the March issue, p. 17, for an example of luck with old pictures.) Another thing: young childhood or teenage memories may be very hazy if you have passed your "half-a-hundred" mark and want to set down some personal incidents but are unable to pin them down to a date. Your editor likes exact dates. (Picky, picky!) You know, some events are easily remembered because some documented national or statewide event is connected with the memory. But how about smaller events? Here is one remarkable example:

When I was a boy, I remember that a neighbor, Bill Quinlan, came across the street to install a laundry tub and shower plumbing in the bath house adjoining our main house. The installation, not much the worse, is still there. I wanted to date that day exactly. (Strange man, this HR editor! Who would care? I would!) I remembered it was after Dad (Harry Hollingsworth) died (Tues 4 Nov 1947) because Mr. Quinlan was finishing up what Dad had begun before he took sick.

Well, I seemed to recall it was after 1948, after Grandmother Hollingsworth (Mary McGovern) died on 20 December. (I was wrong.) I was 16 when Dad passed on, and am 56 next month, so 40 years is a long time to try and remember an exact day. The one thing I really recall is that it was Saturday, and I awoke late, near noon, hearing the pounding, and turned on the radio to hear the broadcast of the Metropolitan Opera, live. I knew it was Tannhaeuser, by Wagner, and that it was a real challenge to try to hear it all the way through--almost four hours of my kind of music, but not Mom's, bless her soul. (All our life together, whenever I played Sir Edward Elgar's music, or any symphonic music, she would get agitated and cry "please turn that down." It never failed. What if I had liked "Rock and Roll?" I think Mom was lucky.)

One day last year I realized that Tannhaeuser was the clue! I knew that a 4-hour Grand opera was a very expensive proposition and it would not have been repeated at the Met for many a season. Upon writing The New York Public Library (the Met Offices failed to reply), the answer came dated 16 Sept 1986. Enclosed was a page (16) from Opera News for 1 March 1948, giving the cast and scenes of Tannhaeuser, as performed on the Broadcast of the Week, Sat. March 6, 1948, at 2 o'clock, sponsored by the Texas Company over the American Broadcasting Network. Lauritz Melchior sang the title role, and Helen Traubel was Elisabeth, with Astrid Varnay, Osie Hawkins and Herbert Janssen in the other parts. Between acts were Opera News On the Air, with Boris Golovsky (think he still is there!), Regina Resnik and Robert Shaw (not the actor), and Opera Quiz, with Sigmund Spaeth and the great baritone 'trio' John Charles Thomas. There the approximate timings confirmed my memory: Act 1 began at 2:05 EST (11:05 a.m. in Inglewood) and the curtain fell on the final act at 5:32, or 2:32 here - 3½ hours, almost what I had remembered. Of course, Milton Cross narrated it all!

So now, the exact date that William Patrick Quinlan did his work as I desperately tried to hear that opera "live" for the first (and only) time in my life, is carved in a noticeable place in the old wash-room, Mother and Bill are gone to their long homes, and I, only, am left alone, to tell thee, er, you: "Saturday, March 6, 1948!"

Not really Isaac's, but a partition of his lands after his death. The same magazine cited above, Vol. 13, # 1, Winter, 1985, pp 96-97, in the series of Union District, South Carolina, Writs of Partition, book of writs, original pages 172-178, gives a lengthy description of the various parties involved and the land to be divided. To sum up, we learn that one Isaac Hollingsworth, deceased, before October 1818, had died intestate (left no will), "leaving at the time of his death neither wife nor child, but leaving 3 sisters, to wit, Ann Hollingsworth, Mary Hollingsworth, wife of Daniel Hollingsworth (sic: she had married her cousin, which we know from other records - Ed.) and Martha Hollingsworth. He had as his own demesne 2 tracts, the Mill tract on Cane Creek, and one on which he had resided. Mill tract was of 49 acres, called No. 2, and Tract No. 1, 170 acres. Cane Creek ran through the Mill tract. After this action was begun, Ann had married George

Perry, and Robert Underwood had wed her sister Martha, who then continued in the case as parties thereto. The above writ states that Daniel and Mary were entitled to a third of the land, and Ann and Martha the other 2/3ds, later, of course, George and Robert shared same. That writ was witnessed by Elihu Hall Bay, senior Associate Judge, at Union Court House, 3rd Monday in October 1819, and signed by Clendenan the Plaintiff's Attorney. On page 176 the two plats are entered. No. 2 of 49 acres, is bounded by George Hogan, John Thomas, Col. R. Sims, Daniel Glenn and Jarret Walker; No. 1 bound by Col. R. Sims, Daniel Glenn, Col. Mooreman and land surveyed for Danl. Hollingsworth.

Page 177 has the Commissioners report that the tracts could not be equally divided. Appraised No.1 at \$1500; and 2 \$250. Recommended to be sold by public auction, and that 1/8 of the money be paid in cash, there not being sufficient personal property to pay debts due by the estate of Isaac Hollingsworth, deceased. Page 178 the Court so ordered. End.

Looking back a long way in old HRs, we note that the above is of some help, sorting out at least one of some three Isaac Hollingsworths in Union County at around the turn of the 19th century. It appears that one Enoch⁴ Hollingsworth was the father of Isaac, Ann, Martha, and another child, Joseph, who apparently was dead by the time that Isaac above died. Consult HR Dec 1967, p.146. There you'll see the will of Enoch, dated 2nd of 11th month 1784, of Randolph Co., North Carolina, proved Dec Court that year. He named his elder son Isaac, (the above lifelong bachelor), and gave him his plantation on Cane creek in 96th District, South Carolina (this land had formerly been in Mecklenburg Co., North Carolina, before that, Anson Co., N.C.). When Joseph, the younger brother, would come of age, he was to have half of the land. He names his two daughters, Ann and Martha, both under the age of 18 in 1784. He gave his wife her bed and furniture for her and her heirs forever, but did not name her! Next, he gave his 2 sons to his brother Joseph Hollingsworth until 21, and his two daughters into the care of his (testator's) sister, Martha Hawkins (Hackins in copy will). He made his trusty friends and brothers, Joseph & Isaac Hollingsworth his executors. Joseph Comer, and Thomas and David Cox were witnesses. That will proves that Enoch was the son of Joseph³ and Martha (Haughton) Hollingsworth (Thomas², Valentine¹:Henrya). Joseph was only mentioned in Stewart, and then dropped completely. Incidentally, Enoch's will was published years ago in that dreadful mess on North Carolina wills by Fred Olds. But Freddie gives him as "Enoch Wallingsworth," so that he is among the double-yous, not the aitches, and then gives his wonderful "abstract" as follows: "son Joseph." Eleven names in the will - one abstracted! Yes: a mess! See HR Dec. 1967 p. 149 for more on Enoch. Apparently - still not proved - Enoch had another brother Jacob, whose son Daniel was the Daniel who married his first cousin Mary Hollingsworth in 1798, getting her disowned by Cane Creek Friends, since Dan was not a Friend, and a cousin at that.

This writ of partition proves the brother Joseph was by that time deceased, apparently leaving no issue who would surely have come in for a divided fourth of the lands. From this deduction (not final), we conclude furthermore, that no direct Hollingsworth lineage springs from Enoch, but perhaps through Perry and Underwood families. Have you met any?

Knox County, Indiana Cemetery Inscriptions

Years ago, HR published many records of Knox County, with the help of Miss Jeanne Coan of Bruceville, Indiana, our long time subscriber. (Having not heard from her in seven years, we fear that she has passed away.) This will just about complete our coverage, quoting from Book One of A Complete Survey of Cemetery Records (1973) on film # 908,781 of the Gen. Society of Utah, pp. 241, 246-251.

ADDITIONAL DATA: The above is titled 'A Complete Survey,' for good reason. There was a survey of this same cemetery by members of the Francis Vigo Chapter, NSDAR, completed in 1940. It is also available to researchers here. Of the 59 entries given above, the 1940 record gives only 24! Only 3 above died after 1940, so, unless Nos. 57-59 died later than that, the DAR missed 32 stones, evidently quite legible, including No. 14, Bernard - a key stone since they got his wife and his children. (We are not privy to whether this, or other stones, have been erected by late descendants since 1940. If this is so, apologies are in order.) Here is a rundown on the differences between the 1940 and the 1973 lists. Incomplete or not, the older survey caught the inscriptions in a less worn condition.

Nos. 1-7 missed, but 1 & 3 not yet erected (not yet dead!); No. 8, died Feb 6, 1864. (9) No age given; (15) Nancy Ann, Wife of B., b Oct 28, 1871, aged 82 yrs (no mo or day); (18) died May 28, 1851; (19) left out day of death; (22) Mary Ellen, no birthdate, "Died Sept. 25, 1865, aged 31 yrs; (24) Carolina; (25) Died Jan 22, 1864, Aged 37 yrs.; (27) Died Jan. 6, 1864; (34) Consort of A. Hollingsworth; (46) Son of J.G. and M.J. but got No. 45 same, indicating J.P. is correct.

Dudman Springs Cemetery, Jasper County, Missouri

Patricia Hollingsworth, 611 N. Grover # 12, Liberty, Mo 64068, sent us this data in her letter of 5 Sept 1986. She was looking round some cemeteries near Joplin, in southwestern Missouri, and copied the following inscriptions for us. A kind gesture. She now is a qualified correspondent of HR! This is the proper place for Dudman Springs Cemetery following Knox County, Indiana cemeteries. Ferdinand Hollingsworth, below, was the son of Thomas⁵ and Mary Ann () Hollingsworth (Abraham⁴, Joseph³, Thomas² etc.). Said Joseph mentioned on p. 21. Miss Jeanne Coan's MS sent to us in 1966 gives Ferdinand as the 9th child, born May 24, 1808, and married Rebecca Hill Oct 26, 1836, but no more data. We don't know if Jeanne knew of this cemetery. While we were stewing about when to publish Knox, Patricia sent her data. The Knox material is lengthy, but they must be published together.

The cemetery is on Cedar Road East of # 9 County Road, Township 28N, Range 30 West, Section 33 (Congressional measure).

NOTE: Ferdinand above was a brother to Bernard, buried in Hollingsworth Price Cemetery, Item 14 on page 22, to Thomas, Item 30 but Miss Coan gave Apr 2, 1806 for his b.d., to Abraham, Item 33, and to Daniel, Item 31, who was killed by Indians in 1812 according to her.

NOTE: Most of these seem to represent Henry² Hollingsworth, son of Valentine Sr., through his son Zebulon³ Hollingsworth. Wealth seems to have dogged them, and it was from this branch that the Cornish myth reared up its ugly head.

Petition From Queen Anne's County, Maryland, 1728

This legislative petition is dated Oct 3, 1728, and signed by 251 of the inhabitants of St. Paul's Parish in Queen Anne's County, Maryland, the home of the descendants of John Hollingsworth who came to Talbot County in 1650. Had his descendants been as prolific as those of Valentine Hollingsworth, Sr., considering that he arrived on this continent 32 years before Valentine, his progeny would now surpass the latter's as the largest Hollingsworth family in the world. Actually, the two men were contemporaries, John being about seven years younger than Val. John had but 3 sons, while Val had 6 who had progeny. That head start seems to be the key to the whole matter. This petition has several of John Hollingsworth's descendants' signatures on it. Attention descendants of Vinson/Vincent of Ashe Co., North Carolina: A photocopy of this from the Maryland Archives at Annapolis would supply actual autographs of your ancient family. We may yet find proof that Vincent of N.C. was from this family. The names of our interest are:

(1) Thomas Hollinsworth, probably the son of the first John. This man wrote his will 30 Nov 1733 in Queen Anne's County. His wife No. one was Margaret Wells, and (2) Levania Jarman, a widow Fowler.

(2) Vincent Hollinsworth, son of William and Sarah (Boulton) Hollingsworth (this family seems to have spelt their surname Hollinsworth as did our Co Wexford line, if autograph signatures are any proof!), which William was another son of the original John. One John Boulton signs the petition also.

(3) Jno. Hollinsworth, not certain, but probably not the son of that name of the original settler. Probably brother of Vincent.

(4) Chas. Hollinsworth, not certain. The Baltimore (1676) immigrant, George Hollingsworth, who died in 1703 there, named a son Charles. We are unaware if George and the first John were in any way kinsmen except for the surname. There were at least two Hollinsworths earlier on in Maryland, named Charles, back in the 1660-80 period.

On the same date as the petition, 3 Oct 1728, St Luke's Church, its membership, was listed (HR Mar 1968:37) in a "membership list" in the vestry minute book. The church, at Church Hill, still stands and is in use. The petition was in favor of dividing St. Paul's Parish and erecting the new parish out of it. The division occurred 1 Dec 1728. (This makes us think that the "membership list" was really an abstract of the petition. The same Hollinsworth names appear there. Well, that is not unusual. But wouldn't a membership list show women and children's names too?) From The Maryland & Delaware Genealogist XXIV, Summer, 1983, pp. 67, 83.

A Constitutional Bicentennial Moment! Henry Hollingsworth was a member of the delegation assembled by the Maryland Convention, Apr 28, 1788, which ratified the Constitution of the United States. George Platter was the President of the Convention, William Harwood the Clerk. Apparently he was Col. Henry⁴ Hollingsworth of Elkton, Cecil County, found in Stewart's book at page 39, son of Zebulon³, of Henry². He was born Sept 17, 1737 and died 29 Sept 1803. He was Lt. Col. of the Elk Battalion in 1776, under Washington, and was an able public servant (See M & D Genealogist, July 1980 (XXI, p. 75).

Congratulations, Zeb! What are your future plans?

That would probably be just one of the many nosy queries demanded of Zebulon Hollingsworth on Tuesday, 18 Oct 1752, if "the press", mainly TV reporters, had then existed. In that day, however, the following notice appeared in the Virginia Gazette for Oct.19, 1752: Zebulon Hollingsworth, from Frederick (County) for Murder (was) acquitted by the Grand Jury at a General Court held on Monday & Tuesday last when (the)criminal (was) brought to (his) trial. (Virginia Magazine, Vol. 24 (1916) p. 412 from a manuscript of extracts from the VG, 1752-55, at New York Public Library.)

If I were a reporter, rudely shoving my mike in Zeb's reluctant teeth and waving the 1st Amendment and the Freedom of the Press all over the place like the fool I would be as all such reporters are, I would at least ask him one pertinent question, drawn from a line heard in every TV drama ever written, to-wit: Who the hell are you? He would undoubtedly respond with another wornout cliché line: What do you want from me? After two hours of searching Stewart and other sources, your editor cannot place who this Zebulon Hollingsworth, accused murderer, can be in the scheme of things. Exasperating, but then, maybe you readers should breathe a sigh of relief at that outcome. The actual text of the notice in the Virginia Gazette reads "from Frederick, for murder." Because it is the Virginia Gazette, we are, perhaps, wrongly assuming it was Frederick Co., Va., and not Maryland. Then it surely would bring to bear the possibility that it was one of the Cecil County, Maryland Zebulons, related to the Henry, Constitutional Convention delegate, above mentioned. Who knows, let him come forward.

I, William B. Hollingsworth of the Borough of Grampian County of Clearfield and State of Pennsylvania do make, publish and declare this my last Will and testament hereby revoking and making void all former Wills by me or at any time heretofore made.

Second. I will and bequeath to my daughter Jennie May Guiher all my

household goods as now in her possession.

Third. I will and bequeath to my son George M. Hollingsworth my large arm chair now in use by me in my work shop.

Fourth. I will and direct that the remaining portion of my personal property together with my real Estate shall be sold by my Executor hereafter named, as soon after my death as practical, and after the payment of my just debts as heretofore provided. I direct that the proceeds of such sale be divided equal between my six children namely - Henry C. Hollingsworth - Charles A. Hollingsworth Caroline B. Spencer wife of Miles S. Spencer - George M. Hollingsworth Gregg C. Hollingsworth and Jennie May Guiher, wife of William Guiher.

Sixth (sic: no fifth). I hereby nominate and appoint A. C. Moore of Grampian Clearfield County and state of Pennsylvania to be the Executor of this my last Will and testament with full power to sell convey and deed any or all of my real Estate without applying to the Court - In witness whereof I William B. Hollingsworth the testator have to this my will set my hand and seal this 30th day of March A.D. 1900

We don't have the date of probate of this will, but we can go it one better: We have the death record of the testator. Correspondent Floyd W. Kolley Hollingsworth, of 368 W. 55th Street, Clarendon Hills, Illinois 60514 sent us all this data 20 Feb 1985! (We do get to your kind submissions, readers. At the moment, your editor has a pile of material in 2 folders 4 inches thick, trying to decide what's next! But that is only a tenth of what has not been published, in "those other folders!") The death record, issued on 8 Feb 1985, by the Clerk of the Orphans' Court of Clearfield Co., Penna., shows William Hollingsworth, 82, mw, widower, born Penna., occ: shoemaker, died (Tues) Feb 17, 1903 (calendar for 1903 same as 1987-Ed.), of pneumonia, in Penn Twp., and his illness had a duration of 2 months. He was buried on 19 Feb 1903 at Haggerty Roads cemetery. (Typed out on a pre-printed form by said Clerk in 1985. Form does have spaces for names of the father and mother but these are left blank, showing that the 1903 form (as with most states except Mass., Virginia and Wisconsin that we know of, offhand) did not require such data.) Robert J. Allison of the Clearfield County Historical Society wrote Floyd stating that the deceased was interred in Cross Roads Cemetery, Beccaria Township. According to the newspaper (which is not named) he died in Grampian at the home of his daughter, Callie Spencer, aged 82 years and 6 months. Services at her home on the evening of the 18th and again next day at the Methodist Episcopal Church in Glen Hope. No mention of other children. Allison thought the distance the body was taken for burial might be that his wife was buried there. He said he (Allison) had personally recorded the burials of Cross Roads, but neither states that he did not see a marker for William Hollingsworth, or anything more, but gave the son's data: Henry C. Hollingsworth, 1854-1941 and the son's wife Rachel (Groom) Hollingsworth 1863-1948. (Was "Groom" actually on the stone?) We hope to have more later on this man.

A Hollingsworth Coincidence?

Uncanny things do happen. Perhaps factual answers elude us on purpose, because we want to believe supernatural forces are at work. Harleian Manuscript 433. folio 233 b. containing letters in the reign of King Richard the Third, has one from Lord Dynham to the Lord Chancellor in Sept. of 1483. "My speciall good lord, I recommaunde (me) to your good lordship. Please it the same to knowe that I sent worde unto the Kinges grace by Blanc-Rose of the dethe of the Frenshe king within ij. houres (2 hours - Ed.) after the thidinges come to me... He died the xxv^{ti} (25th) day of August at after none (noon)." The 'Frenshe king' was the famous Louis the Eleventh, "the universal spider," so-called. Blanc-Rose was the York Herald, Rouge-Blanche Pursuivant, THOMAS HOLLINGSWORTH, who had, only in April of that year 504 years ago, also attended the funeral of King Edward the Fourth of England. (He would also have gone to a funeral for King Richard III. had there been one!) So, a Hollingsworth (spelling is from copies: we have never seen original document to check spelling, if Hollingsworth) reported on the death of Louis XI. The mythical legend of Francois Villon, "The Vagabond King," dates from that period of history. Your editor's mother, Nan (Crawford) Hollingsworth, appeared in the play of that title, with music by Rudolf Friml, in the Spring of 1942 (last time she appeared in a play and the only time this writer ever saw her act) as "Margot" the tavern keeper, opposite John Carradine as King Louis the Eleventh. A Hollingsworth and King Louis - again? (Coincidence?)
